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## The Hawaiian Mission Children's Society Library

The Hawaiian Mission Children's Society was organized in 1852 by the sons and daughters of American Protestant missionaries, sent to Hawaii from 1820 to 1848 by the American Board of Commissioners for Foreign Missions. In the nineteenth century, the Society supported missionary work in the Pacific. Today, the HMCS operates the original mission houses in Honolulu as the Mission Houses Museum, and maintains the Hawaiian Mission Children's Society Library. The Society is a private, non-profit, educational organization.

The Hawaiian Mission Children's Society Library was established in 1922, when Territorial Governor George Carter donated his large Hawaiiana collection to the Society. The Library collections have continued to expand, and today its resources include more than 12,000 books and pamphlets, as well as large manuscript and pictorial collections.

In addition to general Hawaiian history, the Library collections include the following material:

1. Archives of the Hawaiian Evangelical Association (now called the United Church of Christ, Hawaii Conference);
2. Unpublished letters, journals and reports of the Protestant missionaries to Hawaii;
3. Hawaiian-language books;
4. Micronesian-language books.

## MISSION CHURCH, BOSTON

Constitution and Records, 1819 - 1860

The Mission Church, also known as the First Hawaiian Church, was organized in Boston, October 15, 1819. It conducted the whole business of the churches until 1830 when the government and organization were broadened to give more power to the stations. The collection contains the original constitution with the signatures of each member, a manuscript of "The Form of Government and Discipline for the Churches . . .", original letters of transfer of missionaries from American churches and one bound volume of the constitution and records of meetings.

The following Form of Government and Discipline for the Churches in the Sandwich Islands.

I. Of Churches & Church Members.

1. Jesus Christ, who is now exalted far above all principality and power, hath erected in this world a kingdom, which is his church.
2. The Universal church consists of <sup>those</sup> persons, in every nation, together with their children, who make profession of the holy religion of xt, and of submission to his laws.
3. As this immense multitude cannot meet together in one place, to hold communion, or to worship God, it is

reasonable, and warranted by scripture example,  
that they should be divided into many particular  
churches.

A particular church consists of a number of pro-  
fessing Christians, with their offspring, voluntarily asso-  
ciated together, for divine worship and Godly living  
agreeably to the Holy scriptures; and submitting to a  
certain form of government.

5 No person shall be admitted as a member in order  
to communion in all the special ordinances of the  
gospel, but such as exhibit a sound and experimen-  
tal knowledge of the fundamental doctrines of the  
Christian Religion, and to a judgment regulated by the  
word of God, are persons of real holiness and honesty  
cordially professed subjection to Jesus Christ.

6. Each particular church has a right to choose its  
own officers; and being furnished with such as are  
duly qualified and ordained according to the rules  
of the gospel it has authority from Christ for exercising  
government, and of enjoining all the ordinances of worship  
within itself.

## II. Of a Confession of Faith.

7. As to what appertains to mineness of judgment in matters of faith we esteem it sufficient that ch'k acknowledge the scriptures of the Old and New Testaments to be the word of God & the only infallible rule of faith and practice, and sincerely to receive and adopt the Confession or Catechisms shorter and larger, compiled by the Assembly at Westminster as containing the system of doctrines taught in the Holy Scriptures.

## II. Of the Officers of the ch'k.

## VI. Of Communion of Churches.

1. ~~Under~~ Particular churches ought not to walk so

distinct and separate from each other, as not to have  
a care and tenderness toward one another. But their Par-  
ticulars ought to have frequent meetings together, that by  
mutual advice support, encouragement and brotherly  
intercourse, they may strengthen the hearts and hands  
of each other in the ways of the Lord.

2. No particular church shall be subordinate to another,  
each being endued with equality of power from Jesus  
Christ. And no ~~one~~ ~~of the said~~ particular churches their officers  
or officers shall exercise any power, or have any super-  
iority over any other church or its officers.

3. Known members of particular churches may have occasion  
al communion with other churches in the ordinances of  
Gospel, unless that church with which they desire com-  
munion have just exception against them.

4. One church ought not to blame the proceedings of another  
till until it ~~hath~~ shall have heard what the ch ~~hath~~ been  
charged, its ~~particular~~ officers or messengers can say in vindica-  
tion of themselves from any charge ofingular or in-  
jurious proceedings.

6. Every church ought ever to be willing and ready  
to give an account of ~~its~~ proceedings to other churches  
when desired, for preventing or remonstrating any offences  
that may arise among them. Also to give the  
right hand of fellowship and walk together ac-  
cording to gospel rules of communion of churches.

#### VII. Of Church Union.

1. The church session consists of the Pastor or Pastors  
and the male members of the church.
2. The Pastor of the congregation shall always be the  
Moderator of the union except when from per-  
sonal reasons it may appear advisable that  
some other minister should be invited to preside:  
in which case the Pastor may with the concurrence  
of the church invite such other minister as they  
may meet to preside in the case.  
*In case of absence of the Pastor a Deacon of the  
church shall preside.*
3. The church session is charged with maintaining the  
spiritual government of the congregation: for which  
purpose, they have power to enquire into the knowl-  
edge and Christian conduct of the members of the church;  
to call before them offenders and witnesses, being mem-  
bers of their own congregation, and to introduce other

witnesses, where it may be necessary to bring the process to an issue, and when they can be procured to attend: to receive members into the church; to admonish, to rebuke, to rebuke, or exclude from the sacrament those who are found to deserve censure; to concert the best measures for the promotion of the spiritual interests of the congregation: and to appoint delegates to the higher judicatory of the church.

4. The Pastor has power to convene the session when he may judge it requisite.
5. Every ~~session~~<sup>Ch<sup>n</sup></sup> shall keep a fair record of its proceedings, ~~and~~.
6. It is important that every church session keep a fair Register of marriages: of Baptisms, with the names of persons admitted to the Lord's Table and of the deaths & other removals of ch<sup>n</sup> members.

#### VIII. Of Convocation & Council.

1. That the <sup>Pastor or</sup> Pastors of a particular church with the consent of the brethren of the same, have power, and ought to exercise church discipline according to the rules of the gospel in relation to all scandals that occur in the same. ~~but it may be~~

3) desirable in all difficult cases for the respective  
pastors of the churches particular churches to advise  
with the pastors of neighboring churches before they  
~~proceed to~~ ~~concur~~ in such cases.

II. That the churches in the Sandwich Islands shall  
consecrate for mutual affording to each other such mu-  
tual assistance as may be requisite upon all ec-  
clesiastical canons ecclesiastical. And that the Particular pastors  
and churches in the said Islands shall constitute  
one consecration for the end aforesaid.

III. That a standing council of this consecration shall  
be formed consisting of the Pastors ~~of the~~ <sup>and delegates chosen</sup>  
~~by the churches (each church affording one delegate)~~  
of the churches and one delegate <sup>chosen & sent by each church</sup> from each of the churches.

IV. That the council have power to receive and issue ap-  
peals from church unions, and references brought  
before them in an orderly manner: to license candidates for the gospel ministry  
remove, and judge ministers: to resolve questions of doc-  
trine or discipline seriously & reasonably proposed: to  
condemn erroneous opinions <sup>to license</sup> which injure the purity  
and peace of the church: <sup>to unite or divide</sup> ~~to unite or divide~~ <sup>the</sup> churches  
~~at the request of the people~~ and in general to order what  
pertains to the spiritual welfare of the churches under  
their care.

V. When any case is orderly brought before the council of the churches it shall there be heard and determined which (unless orderly removed from thence) shall be a final ~~cuse~~ and all parties therein concerned shall sit down and be determined thereby. And the council, no hearing, and giving the result or final issue, shall ~~act~~ in this determination v. judgment duly executed and attended in such way or manner as shall in this judgment be most suitable and agreeable to the word of God.

VI. That, if any pastor or church obstinately refuse a due attendance and conformity to the determination of the council, ~~that has the cognizance & determination of the~~ after due patience used, they shall be reputed guilty of scandalous contempt, and dealt with as the rule of God the word of God in such cases provides & the sentence of non-communion shall be declared against such Pastor & church. And the churches are to approve of the said sentence, by withdrawing from the communion of the Pastor & church which no faith to be had.

VII. That in case any difficulties shall arise in any of the churches which cannot be ironed without considerable disquiet, that church in which they arise (or that Pastor or members aggrieved by them) shall apply

to the council of the consociated churches, <sup>I the concurred</sup> who if they  
soe cause shall there upon convene hear and determine  
such cases of difficulty according to the word of God.

VIII. That ~~a~~ particular church in contradiction in difficult  
cases, may if they soe cause call a council of the  
consociated churches before they proceed to pass  
sentence: but there is not the same liberty to  
an offending brother to call the said council  
before the church to which he belongs proceed to  
excommunicate in the said case unless with  
the consent of the church.

IX. That if any person or persons <sup>or</sup> ~~who is a~~ openly complained  
of to a council, or ~~that are witness~~ to such com-  
plaint, (having regular notification to appear) shall  
refuse or neglect so to do, in the place, and at the  
time specified in the warning given, except  
they ~~or~~ be give some satisfactory reason thereof  
to the said council, they shall be judged guilty  
of scandalous contempt.

X. It shall be the duty of the council to keep a full  
and fair record of its proceedings.

XI. The council shall meet on its own adjournment:  
and an emergency shall require a meeting sooner

than the time to which it stands adjourned, the  
Moderator, ~~or in case of his absence~~ shall call a meeting  
special meeting.
