

Sakamakana Dec. 4th 1838.

Dear Sister W.

I received your two notes of the
11th and 23rd three days since and the jar of
guava jelly for which you have my sincere thanks.
I was however surprised that you received no note
with it as I knew that it went on board the Clem-
entine with the jar. The vessel was then expected
to go on to Hobo immediately but after staying in
the harbor two weeks the things were changed
to the Harriet and probably the note left through
forgetfulness. But perhaps you will get it in
the course of time. — As to the sugar I was think-
ing of preserves instead of jelly as I had just been making
a few. or I should have put in more. I suppose
it must have settled or been taken out as I filled
it about two thirds full. The jelly I saw had
been tasted by some one since it was put in but
not more than two or three spoonfuls taken out.
The jelly is very nice and I hope sometime
to be able to do you an equal favor. —
As you say nothing of your health I conclude it
is as good as usual! My own is much better.

Mrs. F's babe. It was a fine little girl as pretty
a babe as I ever saw, but it now lies in the cold
grave. It lived 8 days, was baptized about 3 hours
before it died. Its name was Sarah Diana.
I have been with it two or three nights and some
days and never had my sympathy so much
excited for any human being I ever saw. Its suffer-
ings have been most intense. All medical &
mechanical means were of very small to save its
life. It was examined by Dr. B. after its death
and such was its formation of heart it was impo-
^{for}sible to live. This is one of the mysteries of Provi-
dence which we know not now but we shall
know hereafter. — Mr. Andrews spoke from the
passage containing these words yesterday afternoon
at the funeral. — The mother has been very
much confused during its sickness though both
the parents feel it much.

Dr and Sister Pind have gone to Milwaukee they spent
about a week with us. — Sister Anna who was
with us has been here 4 days comes without her
husband as he could not consistently leave & she
came with her babe as he is sick in consequence of teething
He is now better but she will stay till next week
and perhaps longer. — Sister Mrs. Donahue is very
smart begins to go about — She has the care of her
family and was her own nurse as Mrs. Clark said,
though Sister C was there a few days and Mrs. B. in
every day.

than when I wrote you. It has improved for some weeks especially since the cool weather commenced. — You ask what is the matter? I do not know that I have any particular disease, at present — I am inclined to think my complaints have arisen from weakness and debility brought in by too much fatigue and exertion. But perhaps I am not correct. I have no reason to fear any thing of the kind you mention, I begin to flatter myself that I shall again enjoy good health, I feel that all will be reserved for the best whether it should be sickness or health that is to be my lot. We have a friend who knows far better than we do what is best for us.

You have had more earthquakes than is common have you not? We thought we experienced a few shocks some weeks since. —

I suppose you will get the news from Honolulu before this reaches you. Dr. Dickey's family are in pitiful circumstances he having been dangerously ill. Their principles are put to the test and they still adhere to them not even suffering a native to draw their little boy in a cart. They have a daughter, I intend going down this morning to see Master Charles McDonald! He will be two weeks old on Friday night. Sister McD. is very uncomfortable indeed,

We have had a pleasant visit from Dr. and Sister Conder. It is three weeks yesterday since they arrived at Lahainaluna. Sister P. was with sister Allie one week after her confinement. They are now at Ololokai and expect to spend a little more time with us on their return. The principal object of their visit is to benefit Sister P's health which has been rather feeble for some time. She accompanied her husband in one of his trips and exerted herself too much in climbing the falls. Fainted away at the top of the last and was confined to her bed several days after being carried home. Little Samuel runs about and is a good little boy. Stay'd with me two days after his mother went down to Dr. McDonald's.

We have had some strong Homa winds here recently so that native vessels have not been able to stay in the harbor and two whale ships were blown off day before yesterday. They hoisted sail and went to sea after being blown off toward Rano. One mate and two other men have been drowned in the harbor having gone out in a boat to the assistance of a ship that was in danger. It was in the night and the boats came together and one was dashed to pieces.

15th Your note has lain by some days and has been accidentally torn but as I have not time to write it over you will excuse it. I did not visit Sister McDonald the day I wrote as Mrs. Hitchcock was sick and her children with me. I went the next day after being up much of the night with
