staid for two days there examining facts represented to me from church members. I am quite sorry he had been neither faithful nor wise so as to have been rejected by people there.

In consequence it should be natural effect that our efforts might be interrupted by his doing too. In my idea, hereafter Japanese workers of the Master on these islands must be more faithful and influential than they had been a few years ago, because after the Japan-China war, many educated Japanese have come to find out better occupations in this country as well as a number of wicked people have come over too.

Besides it is the fact that plenty priests of Buddhism are working in connection with the head

quarters in Japan.

It, therefore, should be important to maintain the Christian influence over the multitude of 2000. If so, first of all, Japanese workers of Christ ought to be influential spiritually or materially upon all the Japanese while critical minds which had not been so sharp among them before the war as they are now need evidently good workers on these islands.
