

Punahou February 23 1850.

My Dear Mrs Wilcox.

I have been intending to write you before this, but some thing or other would happen to prevent. How are you and the children? I hope you are quite well. This is the last term, and three weeks of it have already past. It will not be a very long time before it is time to go home,

It has been very stormy here for a few days past, and the wind blows quite hard to day, I suppose you have a great deal of ruin at Waioli these days. There has been a very strong wind at Lahaina, it blew down 150 houses. The vessel on which Mr Clark & Miss Ogden went to Lahaina, was out six days, they went out shore, and after the wind commenced blowing they attempted to go to Peanai, and on raising a sail they were capsized, owing to want of ballast. We heard that the captain and several others were lost, but 2 or 3 natives were saved.

Perhaps you would like to know what I ^{am} ~~study~~ studying at Punahou. I study History & written arithmetic in the morning. In the afternoon I recite in Colburn's Arithmetic, and attend to reading or ^{speaking} ~~speaking~~ writing singing & drawing. Thursday afternoon the girls write compositions and recite poetry. The boys recite. I have been practicing on the Melodion, and have learned several tunes.

Mrs Dinwiddie baby was buried last sabath, about 5
weeks ago she took it out to ride, she thought it took
cold, it had a very hard cough and they thought it
had the inflammation of the lungs.
I think I must close now.
