

Hawaii Nov, 15th 1860

My dear son

I told your father a few days ago that I would write you this month. We received your letter written at your uncles & on the second of this month. We were very glad to learn of your safe arrival and that you were in time for that birthday party. It was very pleasant for you as well as your relations. We are anxious to get the letter you speak of and an account of your visit to Norfolk and Coleridge also of your first visit to New Haven. We see by the papers that there have been some changes there in the Scientific School. We hope that some of your deficiencies were looked over and that you entered a year in advance, but perhaps you did
