Dear Sir,

You know repairs  
on Kawaihae church have been  
fire for months - years it is -  
from Rev J. Kalina's time until  
now. You also know that last  
Oct. the John Samoa asked for \$100 -  
to be raised for Kawaihae mka  
church - as they wished to have an  
iron roof etc. To help them out I  
asked what material would be  
required & the list was placed in  
my hands - - You know who  
was instrumental in collecting  
the needed funds - What division  
was made of the money reported  
at the Kona Meeting - & how John  
Samoa was authorized to collect  
the amount which was remained  
\$40.00 to make up the \$100. - and

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perhaps he let you know that he  
seized \$46.00 before returning home.  
Then - Z. Paahiki was appointed  
as we supposed, an additional mem-  
ber of the Committee or one to follow  
the others up - I don't know which.  
The K. U. people had their plans  
all laid before he came on the  
scene & I had the list of material -  
and forwarded the same to Rev  
Sw. Kekuewa who was one of the orig-  
inal Committee - as he was ac-  
quainted with Hinds of the Hawi  
Co - & would be able to get the  
material at a reasonable price  
& the Co: would place the same  
at the church.

Unfortunately between times  
Z. P. took a trip to K. U - and  
began a new plan entirely - besides  
saying the money raised should  
be redivided - giving Kaweikae  
a larger share - &c - So you  
see - the fat is in the fire.

acting on the supposed authority of the Assoc. I placed the \$ 1000 which was in my hands with Hauhi Store - who were furnishing the lumber.

Some one is in a hornet's nest - tho' I see no occasion for their buzzing round so lively. Kekuenua was one who was acting for the church with J. S. & J. K. Nakanelua.

Perhaps the Assoc - intended Paalikri to take over the whole work - If he planned to repair Kaweihae church his own self alone, why is he so anxious lest K. K. should get a bigger slice than K. - of the goodies passed around. K. was to have all the sum pledged and as yet uncollected. so it promised to have enough and to spare, with P. to back up the

Bills & W.H. to do the carpenter's work.

Too many cooks spoil the broth & Z. was one too many for K. H. & no doubt I should have kept my fingers out - but one does tire of this sweet by and bye fashion of working. when every thing could be finished in season to report at the next Assoc.

We do not forget our experiences with church & paeson age here - How S.H. H. - & Z. P. favored church repaires - quite a bill - money run short, and \$1.00 <sup>more</sup> was assigned to each committee to collect and the \$30. Z. P. said, - we, Mahukka & I will assume - each of us will pay fifteen dollars - " Not a red cent from that day to this from those men on those repaires. Z. P. gave the munificent

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sum of five dollars for the  
small house used at fiesta  
passenger but not one share  
has he in the large building.

Perhaps all this is to be laid  
at his wife's door - for she  
holds the strings of the money  
purse - when the contents are  
from rent of her land.

I hope it will all come out  
right - We certainly have to  
be possessed of a wonderful  
amount of patience when  
dealing with Hawaiians -

Shall leave the Kawaiahao  
church alone probably - though  
I would have helped them tho'  
without when the money had  
come in.

If you have  
an opening for John Samoa, why  
do you not quietly call him to  
the place, and then fill the vacancy  
here.

Except two be agreed — you know  
the rest. — I have not wished to  
say any thing; as long ago I had my  
say. When there ~~is~~ was a move to  
call J. S. I said that I should help sup-  
port whoever the people united in call-  
ing — but <sup>was not</sup> ready to undertake  
calling any one.

There is some difficulty between  
J. S. & Z. P. Does Z. P. suggest any  
one for the place. The article in  
the Home Rule did not help matters I  
presume. If J. S. wrote it — he better  
have left his pen alone.

The Kawaihae & Kawaihae wher  
churches were the ones who made  
out the call but you shoudt have  
sent some one else to find out  
what was really wanted - & not  
Paahiki. It would be against  
all rule no doubt to have a  
man come from Korea and  
take a look - they do when politics  
are concerned. — and latec report  
to you. A Field Seccy is needed  
to look carefully into these matters  
in the out of the way places. — &  
keep ahead of Mormon Elders or  
Catholic priests. A revisal would  
tend to unite people quicker &  
more effectually than any thing  
else - some common ground  
on which to meet drawn by our  
earnest desire.

make for peace - & be best for the Master's  
cause.

Perhaps he will smooth  
matters over.

Le Samoa is interested  
in his out parishes and  
encourages the work on  
the churches. It has been  
slow - we have been  
at a disadvantage - but  
commend them for  
persevering in it.

The church members of S. Kohala  
are supposed to be invited -

How will the question of  
Pastor <sup>well</sup> be settled.

When a call is being made  
- is it signed by church mem-  
bers only, or has any one who  
attends service the right to  
place his or her name on the  
list? Is this Call passed  
around like a subscription  
paper from house to house,  
or is there a public church  
meeting where the names  
are written..

I have not seen the call  
which was said <sup>to</sup> be in cir-  
culation here - I knew one  
came - but thought - the time  
had not come to act -

After Assoc - we heard that  
J. Samoa went around with  
the paper himself. Is that  
in order? Let all things be

done decently and in order

If there is a rule - why  
not stand by it - I wish  
I was better posted

Really how can a person  
with so crude ideas be able  
to have charge of a church -

Perhaps there is no discipline  
these days in churches - each  
follows his own hearts desires

- You have seen how  
Dowrie is laying it down  
to the Methodist-Brethren -

We need such as he to utter  
the truth fearlessly here -

The people resent it - to  
be told that the church is dead  
heat - a tree full of life will  
produce something -

I felt the other day that I

Would P. wish his repu-  
tation ruined?

can be done — You will  
say the notice is too short —  
If the meeting is Apr. 26.  
& any one coming hither  
must take the steamer  
next Tues.

Would the money for the Organ

be included as from the church  
for it was raised by Mrs Sam Spence  
efforts - by means of <sup>large</sup> Concerts. She  
is not connected with the church.

these churches were from peo  
ple outside the district. He may
