

Lahainaluna Nov. 12th 1838

Dear Sister Meloa,

You ask what has become of us. Probably you have heard before this time or will before this reaches you. Your note came with letters from Hon., one week after date, I think I will send this that way as there may be no opportunity to send to Hawaii soon. The Clementine came in some time since and was expecting to go to Hilo immediately. I wrote and sent a jar a board and they remained there about a fortnight when they were sent I suppose by the Becket. Letters for you were sent also by way of Hailua, so that I think you will see us in due time. — Am glad to hear that your health is better. My own is improving slowly I think. Have felt better for a week past than for many months before. — Nothing new since I wrote you. Sister Cooke writes that her health is no better. She was too feeble to come here and they spent two or three weeks in the valley of Kianai but experienced no sensible benefit. — Do you write many American letters. Two ships are in bound for the United States but I shall not send more than one or two letters. Sent two or three by one from Honolulu last week. — Suppose you have had a visit from Br. Forbes and, How did she appear. Was her health improved by the journey? How long did they stay? — Br. Bliss staid with us longer than he expected. Think Sister S. must have felt anxious about him, at least if I may judge by myself.

Nov. 15th Br. Conde and family are at Lakeina. Arrived
last night in a small vessel. They had written that
they talked of coming in a canoe and took a three weeks.
Sister C. has not been very well. Became too much
fatigued during their late tour in walking up peaks
