Honolulu Jan 21st 1837

My dear Sister

I rec'd your letter dated 1st and thank you for it - I must answer it on a steam boat sort of a way as I am really sick.

First about the butter I rec'd a pair of butter from you - No letter I think. I had no impression whatever that I was to send part to Mrs. Fins - and therefore she was minus - I shall try to make it up to her have sent her a little and shall more as I am able to obtain it. I returned the pair ^{to deposit} and suppose it has got on as things are usually put in their own boxes there and it has not been there of late. I think Mr. Cooke sent to me for it and I told him I could not write then but would you - week after week has passed away and no letter

I am very very sorry that you have had so much trouble about getting your things from the depository - Mr. Cooke has been engaged for several weeks in assisting Mr. Boardman about getting up the time clock. He finds a great many difficulties - frequently they change the hour of sailing or conclude to go some where else - and not unproperly he loses a chance from being before ~~from~~ out when the information arrives that a vessel is to sail - or for some other reason. I hope you have got the ships before this. And

I hope he will be more punctual in future. I believe he works as hard as any of the missionaries. Still many things are not done. Thus my life is better down

The fact is Mr. Cook and myself are with my h worn out - The spirit is willing however and we will try to do all in our power for the comfort of my brothers and sisters - I suppose the missionaries here begin

to feel the loss of Bro Hall.

Now about butter I send a pair to replace the one lost - also another larger that I should like to get you to fill for me. You must weigh it and charge it. I keep a couple of boarders to turn our expenses the found ourselves about \$50.00 dollars in debt at the end of the year. - Bro Hall did not care about paying the rent of the house he is so poor.

I do not want you to furnish me butter to keep boarders and not be paid for it. We have had some of Mrs. Whitney's butter at 3 rials per pound - can you sell it as cheap? I pay 50cts for what I buy here

My eyes are growing out and I can not write you as I would like. Regarding Attribt - I told Mr. W. that we did not feel any desire to hinder him if he thought it duty - Then quickened by him I said that I did not think that I should wish to go under the circumstances still I thought that no one could tell how he should feel about it till brought to the test of experience. I have sympathized with you deeply under Mr. W. also and I did not feel that I could willingly be added to his and your trials. May God support you both and may the went grace you both to have been guided by His ready wisdom.

Once more are you coming to Gen. Meeting? - If you are how would you like to occupy our study with your family - It is divided into two rooms. and could be tolerably convenient. I will furnish the rooms cook your food etc. You need not bring any thing but mattocks knives & forks & spoons. a sick-~~the~~ nothing - I thought perhaps that would suit you better than to sit at the table with so many little children to sit at the table with all about it. It is mention at Penahoue I hope your boys are well

Puna how often so I have not seen them often.
