Dear Sister,

I have time  
to write but a few words  
but as there is an opportunity  
to send to Kauriwha  
to night I will just say  
I know something of your  
pleasure in seating your  
self at your own desk in  
your own room to write.

Mr. P. arrived at Sahamauna  
on Wednesday evening hav-  
ing been out but one night.  
It was about twelve when  
I heard him knock at  
Mr. Clark's door and suppo-  
se it was him as I had  
been expecting him for a  
day or two, and happily were  
we to meet. I enjoyed my-  
self very well during his

absence having plenty of  
work had my house cleaned  
furniture at large ready  
for keeping house when Mr.  
H. came. The next day we  
took supper in our own  
house and it was pleasant  
to sit at our own table  
though our family was  
smaller than formerly.  
I think you have been  
doing important business  
at Hilo. hiki warve no.  
Suppose Mr. Lyons is keep-  
ing house by this time.  
Write me all you know  
about Hawaii it seems  
a long time since I heard  
from there. — Thank you  
for the pineapples &c.  
The basket is a very conve-  
nient one just such as  
one as I want. Mr. P. said

me a few specimens of coral  
I shall be obliged and will  
pay you in whatever is a  
agreeable. I wish to send  
home a box this season.  
Please to send a few  
pumpkin seeds.  
Mr. S. has left all his  
things in the care of Dr.  
Baldwin who will  
send them over. Mrs  
Rogers has a son born  
last Saturday. He weighed  
8  $\frac{3}{4}$  pounds. She is very  
smart more so they all  
say than any person they  
ever saw, no more at
