

1870.

July. Lahainaluna

Thurs 14th. This is the fourteenth anniversary of my birthday. I have now graciously spared to live fourteen years in this beautiful world, and my life now opens before me with the best of prospects, and I have very much to be thankful for. I am neither wealthy or talented, but I trust I have something of far greater value than these. I feel that I have a Heavenly Father, who cares for me, and a trust in him, which increases every day. To him would I devote my heart, my life, my strength, my all.

Fri 15th I have studied today and performed my usual round of duties. I do not find time to do all I wish to, and at the close of each day, it does not seem satisfactorily completed. I study Latin, Algebra, and Riddle of Common Things.

At sunset this evening I went with Onella and Florence to see Lott, our native woman, who died.

Sat 16th. Another week has gone, and as I enter upon a new one, I hope that it will be spent in a more satisfactory manner than the past one. Prof. Kip-

quis came up this morning to give us music lessons, as is his wont every Saturday. Annie Halsted has spent the day here, and when she returned home, I went down with her, to take a portfolio, which I made for her mother some time ago.

Sat 17th. This morning Father preached from several

different texts. The lesson was addressed particularly to the Freshmen class. He explained to them the character of a well mannered man, and showed them that the great aim of this school is, to educate and mature men who will be able to occupy high stations in this nation.

Mr Bishop had the Bible class this afternoon. He is taking in course the history of the Jewish kings. I am continuing to memorize the book of James, and recite it at family Sabbath school Wed. 20th. Wrote a composition in, The Benefits of Traveling, and this afternoon went over to the chapel with my brother and sisters to the singing class. It is the second lesson that Prof. Higgin's has given the students this term.

Thurs. 21st This morning Doro came to work again, after an absence of about a week. A vessel came in, bringing a large foreign mail, but to our disappointment, there were no letters from Lucy and Samuel.

Fri. 22nd Mother has been quite sick today. It seems like the beginning of one of her sick turns, which she used to have quite frequently, but she has not ^{had} one for two years. This afternoon we received two large boxes of pineapples from Hawaii, and began to cut them up for the purpose of bottling.

Sat. 23rd This morning we finished cutting the pineapples, and this afternoon put up twenty-five bottles for Mother. It is no better, having been confined to her bed all day.

1870

July

Sat. 24th Mrs. Bishop preached from Is. 10th. ch. 11th to 5th sec. She described in his discourse the Great Example, exhorting his hearers to embrace Him as their pattern Father. I conducted the Bible class. We are now in the book of Exodus under his teaching. I have spent a day of real pleasure, and I hope that the evil influences which have surrounded me, may strengthen me for the working day of this week.

Wed. 27th Wrote two notes, one to Miss H. B. Judd, and one to Lizzie Pogue. I was unable to go to singing school, for Mother is not quite well enough to have the care of household affairs yet.

Fri. 29th Mrs. Lawrence came up and made a long call this afternoon.

Sat. 30th Florence is ten years old today. The students have had a feast, trying to celebrate their Independence day. At tomorrow, the 31st, is the Sabbath they have observed it a day before. A vessel came in from Honolulu, this afternoon, bringing Rev. Mr. Fiske and his family, who are to make a visit at Mr. Bishop's.

Sat. 31st Mr. Fiske preached this morning from Rev. 2: 17th: "To him that overcometh will I give to eat of the hidden manna." The Bible class was led by Mr. Bishop. We have commenced to learn the shorter catechism, and recite it to Father at evening Sabbath school.

1870.

August.

Mon. 1st Mr. and Mrs. Gates came over and called this evening. He intends to start in my around this island tomorrow.

Tues. 2nd Mrs. Halstead has been up and spent a part of the day with Mother.

Wed. 3rd This morning a post came in bearing a long letter from Samuel. It was written from Flint Mich. He gave a description of their journey overland, and though they narrowly escaped having trouble with the Indians, they had arrived safely at uncle Lyman's, and seemed to be enjoying themselves.

The Honolulu dentist, Dr. Whitney came to Lahaina in this vessel, accompanied by his wife. He was injured by a fall from his horse a few months ago and he wishes to recruit at Lahainaluna. He was so unwell however after leaving the vessel that he remains in Lahaina tonight.

Thurs. 4th Dr. and Miss. Whitney came up before breakfast. They intend to stay here until he is well enough to go to Capt. Mahe's plantation for whom he is engaged to perform some dentistry.

Fri. 5th This evening we went to hear Kauaaloa, the Micronesian missionary, who spoke at the chapel. He gave a brief history of the progress of the mission at Micronesia, and then entreated the students to give heed to the call which came from there for more missionaries. He was very earnest in his manner, and he shows that this

heart is in the work. He hopes to get some missionaries, and return in a few months.
 Sat. 6th. Dr. Whitney is worse today having intense pain in his head. Mother, Luella, and Florence went down town this afternoon. I feel much in need of a day of rest.

Sat. 7th. Father preached from Ec. 5:185. and Lpt. 4:22. Mrs. Bishop conducted the Bible class.

Mon. 9th. Mrs. Whitney went to Lahaina with Mrs. Bishop this afternoon, to attend the christening of Mr. Mason's child.

Wed. 10th. Wrote a letter to Samuel and Lucy. We have been blessed with a succession of refreshing showers this afternoon.

Thursday Went to walk this evening up on the land above us. We are having extremely summer weather.

Fri. 12th. Rose up to the Pribble, home with

Dr. S. Mrs. Whitney, Mr. Bishop started for Wilcox.

Sat. 13th. After finishing our music lesson we girls went up into, and strolled about, in the Lahaina valley. Mr. Fobes has returned from his tour, and brought news of the drowning of Capt. Cobron Longmire at Makawao.

Sat. 14th. Mr. Fobes preached from Pro. 31:17. The Bible class was led by Father.

Sun. 15th. Mr. Bishop returned today from Wilcox. Dr. Whitney has today put the finishing touches into an upper set of teeth which he has been

making for teeth, commenced filling some of my teeth, which have begun to decay.

16th Tues. Dr. Whitney continued operating on my teeth. I feel unwell, from a sore throat this evening.

17th Weds. My teeth are finished excepting one little filling, and Dr. Whitney has begun Lusk's and Haenle's.

18 Thurs. Our guests are making preparations for going around to Capt. Market's place in a whale boat, but the plan appears rather dubious to Mrs. Whitney.

19 Friid. They have changed their minds this morning, and think they can bear the journey over the mountain better, than Father and Mother offering to go with them. The whole party started at about noon, their trunks going in the whale boat.

Mr. Forbes with his family started in a vessel for Honolulu this evening.

21st Sat. Knack preached from James 1st 21st. Mr. Bishop led Bible class. Have been reading Element of Rome to the children.

23 Tues. My parents returned a little after noon. They found great excitement for all that Capt. Mr. Bonil saved from his first fire has been again burned, and as these fires are incendiary, no one feels safe.

24 Weds. Wrote a composition on "Gossip," and went to singing school this afternoon.

1870

August.

26. Fri. Mother went down town this afternoon to help Mrs. Houghton, who is preparing to go to Honolulu.
27. Sat. Received a large American mail, and among others, a long letter from Lucy, written at Springfield, Mass. They were intending to go from there to Boston and New York, and then to Ohio.
28. Sat. Father preached from Ep. 4.3. Mr. Bishop led the Bible class.
29. Mon. I feel unwell today, being oppressed with lassitude and weariness.
31. Wed. Mother spent the afternoon again in helping Mrs. Houghton.

September.

1. Thurs. Mr. Needham has been up here and made a long call this evening.
3. Sat. Mr. Dwight with his daughter from Molokai spent several hours with us. Late this P.M. some ladies called on Mother. Lono went to Lanai today, to make a long visit.
4. Sat. Mr. Bishop preached from 1st. 53. 3. This P.M. communion service was kept in the chapel. Several young men were received by letter from various churches on the different islands. I trust that I have experienced a day of blessing.

1870.

September.

5. Mon. Went to Monthly concert this evening.
6. Tues. Received letters from Miss Gads and Minnie Hobson.
7. Wed. Wrote a composition on Sleep. Mother has spent the day down with Mrs. Maeker.
8. Thurs. Have had several refreshing showers this afternoon. We need a long rain.
10. Sat. When we children had finished our music lessons we started on horseback to take a jaunt. We first went up onto Mount Ball, down on the south side, and into Kauaula valley.
11. Sab. Father preached from 1 Cor. 22.26. Mr. Bishop conducted the Bible class. Truly our weeks are crowned with Sabbaths, and our lives would be dreary indeed without these seasons of spiritual rest and communion.
14. Wed. Wrote a letter to Lucy.
16. Fri. Received an American mail but nothing from the absent ones.
17. Sat. Harriet Acheyong came up this morning, to stay until Monday morning.
18. Sab. Mr. Bishop preached from Rom. 8.14. Father conducted Bible class. We have rec'd the ten commandments. Many new thoughts have been suggested to me today, and I have learned some lesson which I hope will be of much profit to me.

1870.

September

- 27th Wed. Wrote a composition on "Calvin".
22nd Thurs. Kuaca, who went down to Honolulu a few weeks ago to be married, arrived here this morning by a schooner, with his bride. She is a girl from Miss Bingham's school, is well educated, and is much beloved by her teacher and schoolmates.
23. Fri. Received letters from Samuel & Lucy, who were at Mount Caroline's, and about to enter Oberlin. At about noon Father started for Makawao, having been called there to a trustee meeting.
24 Sat. The wind is blowing violently this evening.
25. Sat. So has rained all day so that we have not been able to go to church.
26. Mon. Father returned home this morning arriving at about ten o'clock.
27. Tues. Mrs. Kuaca spent the afternoon here. We are very much pleased with her.
30. Fri. Threefourths of this year is gone, and as I review the path in which to have been led, it is with thankfulness. I have made many failures and mistakes, but I still have a steady aim before me to which I must press yet closer. O, that the remaining quarter may be spent peculiarly for him whom I adore!

1870

October.

- 1st. Sat. Charles Baldwin from Kohala called here this afternoon.
- 2^d. Sab. Mrs Bishop preached from Ps. 5.4. She chiefly dwelt on the infinite holiness of God. The Bible this afternoon was on the ten commandments. I have to day conceived of higher ideas of the greatness of my God.
- 3rd. Mon. Went to monthly concert this eve.
- 5th. Wed. Wrote a composition on Composition.
- 8th. Sat. This week is ended, and one which has been accompanied with peculiar blessings.
- 9th. Sab. Father preached from Ps. 66. 18. The principal heads of his sermon were: How much of the prayers which is made in the world is useless, because the petitioners regarded iniquity in their hearts.
- 10th. Christ's chief mission on the earth was to root out evil from the hearts of mankind, and to establish holiness.
11. Tues. We had the pleasure of waking this morning to find the new Kilanea in the harbor. Mrs. Mokua came from Honolulu in her. Her husband died last Sabbath, and she brought the corpse with her. Mother and Tamer went down to call on the afflicted widow.

1870

October.

12. Wed. Lorin is thirteen years old today.
Rev. Bishop and Kauaea went down to
Mokua's funeral which took place at 4 o'clock.
P.M.
14. Fri Prof Higgins came up and gave us
music lessons this afternoon, as he has
to move tomorrow to a new house.
16. Sat. Mr. Bishop preached from 1 Cor. 7.10.
and Father led the Bible class. Mr. Bryan
is very low.
17. Mon Received a long letter from Sam-
uel, written from Oahu, giving a descrip-
tion of their school and other affairs.
- 18 Tues. The Kilanea brought three China-
men from Waimea who wish to enter this
school. Mrs. Bishop takes one for a cook,
and Mother takes the two others. Mr.
Bishop started by the steamer for Honolulu
this afternoon.
23. Sat. The Lahaina parish being left
without a pastor by the death of Mokua,
Father and Kauaea have determined for
the present to perform the duties of a
minister. Father went down and con-
ducted the services this morning while
Kauaea preached up here. His text was
from Cor. 7.1. A good name is better than
precious ointment. He is a very fine speaker.

1870

October.

24. Mon. Maria and Luella have spent the day in the woods gathering quavas and came home with over two bushels of them.
25. Tues. Received a long letter from Lucy. Mr. Bishop returned in the steamer, bringing his sister and her two children, and also Mr. Reed's Witchcock, school examiner.
27. Thurs. Mr. Witchcock has been examining the schools all about, from Ohuahu to Lake ina and Latai, for the past two days, and tomorrow he goes on towards Halaheku.
29. Sat. There has been a very large freshet down in the valley this afternoon.
30. Sab. It has been given me today to conceive in a small degree how deeply seated is the sin of my heart, and with humility and penitence I consecrate myself anew to my Saviour, in whom is my only hope, with an earnest resolve, with His help, to root this evil out of my heart more diligently, and to walk purely and steadfastly before my Unseen Witness. Father preached from Robt. 1:13. a sermon which will be effectual & hope in the hearts of more than one of those who heard.
31. Mon. Another month gone so quickly!
"So teach us to number our days, that we may apply our hearts unto wisdom."

1873.

November

- 2nd Wed. Wrote a composition on Air.
- 3rd Thurs. Went with Suelia and Florence to see Father working with the boys at the ^{head} of the upper watercourse, which was entirely torn away by the freshet.
4. Fri. We girls went down in the valley to bathe, as we have not had the privilege of a bathhouse since the freshet. After dinner went up again to see the progress of the water course. Father expects to get the water down tomorrow.
5. Sat. Went down town with my parents, and called, for the first time, on Miss Florence Freeman, and also on Mrs. Halstead, to thank her for a present of a dress which she sent me yesterday.
6. Sat. Mr. Bishop preached from Rev. 3:20. This evening I expressed to my dear parents my faith in Christ, and asked their advice as to making a public profession of it. My father gently counseled me, and said that he would have me join the visible church, as he believed that I had been brought into the family of Jesus Christ. My heart is thrilled with unspeakable joy. It is so sweet to feel that my Beloved is mine and I am His!
7. Mon. Went this evening to Monthly Concert.

1870

November.

9. Wed. Wrote to Lucy.
 18. Sat. Father preached from 2 Sam. 16. 23.
 Mr. Bishop led the Bible class.
 15. Tues. Received letters from the absent.
 16. Wed. Wrote to Samuel and Lucy.
 20. Sat. Mr. Bishop preached from Ps. 36. 1.
 The last sermon which we shall hear at
 Lahainaluna until next term. Father was
 so ill from rheumatism, that Mr. Bish-
 op led the Bible class also.
 21. Mon. Mother is preparing to have Lella &
 I to go with Father around the island, start-
 ing next Wednesday, the first day of va-
 cation. Our vacation begins today.

December.

30. Fri. What a long time has elapsed since
 I last communicated with you, my journal!
 During this time I have been to Hana, and
 back again, which journey occupied two weeks.
 Then, two or three more, were spent in preparing
 for Christmas; and this week, I have com-
 menced my studies again. This term I
 take, Science of Common Things, Andrews
 Caesar, and begin Greek. We have had a
 vacation in music also, and this term Prof
 Higgins has changed his day for giving us
 lessons, from Saturday, to Friday afternoon.

1870.

December.

31st. Late The year is ended, but is it finished? Have I learned in this year all that I could, or ought to have learned? Have I spent every month, week, and day, of this year, as months, weeks, and days that never come back, should be spent? Alas! I am weighed, but am found wanting. As I review the past, it seems full of failures and shortcomings, and, not living up to my high privileges, but still I review it with thankfulness. In that I have been kept through the year in somewhat comfort, and with nothing to distract or molest. But I have a greater reason for thankfulness, for in this year my heart has been expanded, and my eyes have been opened, to see and understand my relation to my God, and I have been permitted to taste of the sweetness which springs therefrom. Surely this has been a year of jubilee to me! The past is gone never to be recalled, but the hopeful future is before me, and though I cannot tell what it may be, yet I am perfectly content to leave it in the hands of One who has so wisely dealt out the past to me. O, that in the coming year I may live closer to him!

1871.

January.

1st. Sat. This year is commenced with a Sabbath, and I hope that the influence of this Sabbath may continue through the year. Mr. Bishop preached from Ps. 90. 12, a New Year's sermon. He also led the Bible Class, for Father had to attend both services down to Lahaina, Huaea having gone to Keauapali.

4th. Wed. Wrote a composition on "Dress".

6th. Fri. Prof. Higgins has changed his day for giving us music lessons, and came up this afternoon for that purpose.

7. Sat. Miss Florence Freeman has spent the day up here.

8. Sun. Father preached from Mat. 22. 42. He shewed forth the character of the Messiah, and entreated his hearers to choose whether they would take him for their Savior or not. Mr. Bishop led the Bible Class.

11. Wed. Wrote a letter to Samuel.

14. Sat. Another week has passed, and it has been a very busy one too. During this week, two of our Chinamen have left, but a new one which Mr. Bishop has been trying, has come to work for us.

15. Sun. Mr. Bishop preached from Job. 1. 26.

Separate from sinners. Father led the Bible Class.

17. Tues. One of our Chinamen came back to

day and Father I engaged him to come and work for us all the time, as his object is, to earn money.

18. Wed. Wrote a composition as Exercise.

We received a letter from Samuel, written from Flint, Mich. where he and Lucy are spending their winter vacation, with uncle Squaw family. They are attending a day school, and do not intend to return to Oberlin, but prepare themselves for Ann Arbor.

Thurs. 19. Mrs. Parker Mabee, and Miss Mabee made a long call.

21. Sat. Mr. Horace Freeman walked up here this morning, and has spent the day with us. Father and Mother went down town this afternoon.

22. Sat. Father preached from John 21.21. Showing how much a man owes to his Redemer, and how Jesus wishes us to work for him, of which with many are entirely regardless, giving themselves away to the satisfying of their lusts. I have spent a day of sweet communion.

23. Mon. Wrote a letter this afternoon, to Minnie Hobson.

25. Wed. Wrote a letter to Mary Sesters.

26. Thurs. Went down town with Mother this afternoon, calling on Mrs. Halestead and Freeman.

1871.

January.

27. Fri. Went this evening to Preparatory Lecture. Father took as the subject of his discourse 1 Cor. 21.3 & 27, showing how a church member may partake worthily or unworthily of the symbols of our Lord's body.
28. Sat. Florence Freeman came up here before breakfast this morning, and we have spent the day in rambling about in the valley.
29. Sat. I have this day made a public profession of my faith in Jesus Christ, to all his and belong to him now and for ever. This was a solemn act, for by it I am placed under greater responsibilities to my God, my fellow men, and myself. But oh! what unspeakable joy in the thought that God will lead me through this life, which once seemed dreary, and that I have but to place my hands in his, and be guided by him. Mr. Bishop preached this morning from Heb. 13.20. "Through the blood of the everlasting covenant." This afternoon Bob. Kaha, and myself were received into this church, and also four others, from other churches.
30. Mon. Received a small American mail, but nothing from Lucy and Samuel.
31. Tues. The first month of the year is gone, and I think I have made progress, but oh! I hope that I will make still more in a new one.

1871.

February.

- 1st Wed. Wrote a composition on "The Hand".
 Father, Mother and Tamar went downtown.
- 2nd Thurs. Mother went down and called on Carrie Dickenson who has been gone to Cal three months, and also on Mrs. P. M. Kee who is going in this trip of the "Murray".
- 3rd Fri. Father killed a bullock this afternoon.
- 4th Sat. Mr. Bishop exhibited his Magic Lantern this evening, to the school.
- 5th Sat. Father preached this morning from John 3:1. He explained the origin and result of the family, how God gave it in the beginning of the existence of mankind in the world. He showed the resemblance of the ordinary family to that of the Lord Jesus Christ, and how He draws those who will come, into his family so that they are called "the children of God." He then exhorted those who are called by his name, that they should live more worthy of it. I have felt my Savior's voice to me.
- 6th Mon. Lorrie, Luella and I went with Florence Freeman this afternoon to Black Rock for a ride. Went to Monthly concert this evening.
- 7th Received a letter from Lucy this morning.
- 8th Wrote to Lucy and Samuel.
- 9th Tues. Father started in the "Nottie" for Honolulu this evening, to attend to some business.

1871.

February.

10th Tues. As Father has gone, and I cannot review Latin and Greek, I spend my time in writing for Mother, who is preparing to go next week to Wailuku.

11th Sat. Edward Bishop exhibited the Magic Lantern again this evening.

12. Sat. Mrs. Bishop has conducted both services today, for Kuaoa went to Oahu. Mr. Bishop preached this morning from Eccl. 11. 9. I learned for a Sabbath school lesson, the last part of 6th chap. of Cor. O how deep and rich is the Word of God! It satisfies the hungry and thirsty soul, and maketh it to rejoice.

13. Mon. We received a letter from Father this morning. He intends to start home again tonight in the steamer, but the wind blows so hard that Mother feels very anxious about him.

14. Tues. The "Kilauea" brought Father this morning; though her voyage was longer, because of the weather.

15. Wed. Mother excused me from writing a composition today, as she wished me to help her.

16. Thurs. Father, Mother and Florence started for Wailuku at half past twelve this P.M. Father intends to return to Saturday, then Gorrie will go over on next Monday, and return with Mother and Florence, on the next Saturday.

1871

February.

18. Sat Father got sick home again this evening before dark. He has been prospers
19. Sabbath Father preached, from 1st. 57. 16. He first remarked upon the apparent negligence which is visible at the present time in this school, on the subject of religion, & therupon urged the scholars to prepare the way that the Lord might come among us, and to remove the stumbling blocks which prevent His coming to work with power. Mr. Bishop led the Bible Class.
20. Mon. Last night at about ten o'clock we were visited by an earthquake, which was so terrible as to tear down many parts of Mr. Bishop's house, and it also did some damage to our house, cracking the corner off Father's room, and pulling down the plaster, and also cracking off some plaster in the pantry. Mr. Bishop's house appears to be scarcely inhabitable. Lorin started early this morning for Waukesha. Luella and I spent the whole day morning in clearing the house which was dirtied by the settling down of dust whiteras &c.
21. Tues. This morning the steamer brought news that the earthquake was not felt so severely there as it was here, but

considerable damage was done. This afternoon Father received a letter from Mother, and also a bag of soiled clothes brought by a boy. She wrote that Lorin was six hours on the way over owing to the soreness of his horse's feet, that every one was much frightened by the earthquake, though it did not do much damage.

22. Wed. Wrote to Lucy and Samuel.

23. Thurs. Today, the teachers and scholars of this school have kept, as a day for prayer in behalf of schools! The teachers presided over two meetings, one in the forenoon and the other in the afternoon. I went this P.M. to the prayer meeting. I hope that the Holy Spirit may be abundantly poured out upon this school, to the conversion of many souls.

24. Fri. The steamer was much delayed in her passage down from Hawaii, by a head wind. She did not get to Bahama until this evening, but brought word that there was little injury done by the earthquake and it was not very severe.

25. Sat. Mother, Lorin, and Florence got home at about sunset this P.M. They seem pleased with their visit both in Makawao and Wailuku.

1871.

February,

26 Sat. Mr. Bishop preached this morning from Ps 55. 1. He showed that true repentance does not consist in self reproach or confession of sin to God, neither in good works or fear of God's judgments, but in entirely forsaking our sins and seeking God with all our heart and desires, and how that when any one does truly repent, and turn to God he will surely be accepted of Him, and his sins will be freely pardoned. Father led the Bible Class. I have been fed today with spiritual food, which I trust has united my soul more closely to my God.

28 Tues. Received letters from Samuel and Lucy this morning. Dr Hitt ledge also came up on the Steamer with Miss Carpenter, a teacher whom he got in the States, for the East Maui Female Seminary. They did not stop, but went right on to Malaca so as to get to Maka was as soon as possible.

1871

March.

1st Wed. Wrote a composition on "Hair".
 3rd Fri Father made arrangements several weeks ago to go over and install the church at Halepalua, and therefore of a boat comes for him tomorrow he intends to go taking Luella and I with him.

4th Sat. No boat came today from Lāna'i and so we are still at home.

5th Sat. Father preached this morning for Col. 3.13. He first remarked the fact that scarcely any of the high and most responsible positions in this nation are held by the natives. He then showed that the reason why the representatives of those nations which are called Christian nations have these responsible positions all over the globe, is, that they have the foundation of Christianity under them, doing all things as to the Lord. That all those who love Hawaii should do all things with their might and do it well. Mr. Bishop led the Bible class.

8th Wed. Luella's birthday. She is twelve years old. Mr. and Mrs. Needham, who came to Lahaina yesterday, came up here this evening to spend the night at Mr. Bishop's.

1871.

March.

10. Fri. Florence Freeman came up this afternoon, so as to go up to Mount Retreat with us children for a ramble.
 11. Sat. We started at about nine o'clock this morning, and arrived home again at four P.M. I think we all had a good time generally. Father started with Mr. Bishop yesterday to go to a Trustee Meeting at Makahao today, and we expect him home tonight.

12. Sat. Father reached home about nine o'clock last night. As Mr. Bishop, who went with him did not return yesterday, Guara preached this morning. His text was Gen 41:38. Father led the Bible class.

13. Dr. Kittridge and Dr. Nichols came over the mountain today, and arrived here at about 3 o'clock this P.M.
 14. We children went up in the valley with Dr. Nichols this morning and rambled about.

15. Wed. The two Doctors left this morning. Dr. Nichols starting for Waileka by way of Hakeakuloa, and Dr. Kittridge going the ordinary way over the mountain.
 As we lost our recitations yesterday we omit compositions today, and take our usual studies.

1871.

March.

18. Sat Walked down to Lahaina with Luella and Florence and after staying at Mrs. Halstead's a while I went with Florence Freeman to see the Roman Catholic Cathedral. When we came home we found Mr. Pogue who came from Wailea to day.
19. Sat. Kurea preached this morning from Rev. 3. 11. Mr. Pogue preached till P.M. His text 1. Cor. 6. 20. The leading thoughts of his sermon were: What God placed man in the world for; why man should glorify God; and how man should glorify him.
20. Mon Mr. Pogue went to Oahu this to see about a pastor for that place, and returned this P.M.
21. Tues Mr. Bishop, who went down to Honolulu last week, came back in the steamer this morning bringing Mr. Hitchcock with him, for the purpose of seeing what repairs are to be made on our houses.
22. Wed. Wrote a composition on Earthquakes and also a letter to Samuel.
23. Thurs. Mr. Pogue went down to Honolulu tonight in the Panahi.
24. Fri. Mother is making some clothes for me and therefore I use my study time to help her.
25. Sat Father & Mother went downtown this P.M.

1871

March.

26 Sat Father preached this morning from Col 3.16. He remarked that there were three thoughts which prompted people to sing hymns. First, because it was pleasing to the ear; second, because it is one of the forms of worship, and they use it only as a form; third, from a real desire to praise God and rejoice in Him. He then showed the uses of singing, and asked his hearers to take advantage of these uses and profit thereby. Mr. Bishop led the Bible Class. I have been reading for a few Sabbath's past a book with the title "The Power of Prayer; an account of the origin and first year of the Fulton St. and other prayer meetings," which is intensely interesting.

28 Tues. The Steamer did not come in today, and we think that she waited to bring the mail of the Cal. steamer.

29 Wed. The Kilauca brought a large American mail; letters from Lucy and Samuel. Mother and I are very busy these days sewing for myself, for next week I am going to Wilukiu to take painting lessons of Mrs. Brewster, and stay five or six weeks perhaps.

4. Tues. Lorin and I were over the mountains today, and arrived back to Mr. Welford's at about dark. Lorin lost his hat on the way, but is so firm that we can never well.

5. Wed. Lorin went hunting this afternoon. I have done no painting today, as when I saw Mr. Welford he did not know that I had come and had nothing prepared. Called on Mr. Head down.

6. Thurs. Begun to paint a bunch of orange mangos which Mr. Brewster sketched for me yesterday. Called this P. 16. on Mr. S. W. & Mr. Bailey and also on Mr. and Mrs. Stephen.

7. Fri. Brought my painting from school so as to paint tomorrow.

8. Sat. Painted two or three hours.

9. Sun. Went and heard a sermon read by Mr. C. Bailey in the foreign church.

10. Mon. Minnie Hobson's birthday.

Neither Lorin, Annie, and I went to a candy pull at Mr. Bailey's this evening in celebration of its. Received a letter from home this morning, and wrote one to home finding his P. 16.

11. Tues. Have worked on my picture steadily this week and it is nearly finished.

18 Th.

April

15 Sat. Received a letter from home by Mr. Bailey, who went over to invite Father and Mother to go and take charge of the C. M. F. Seminary. They have decided to go. Went this P.M. with Flora to ride to Whipple and call on Doctor Rich and son.

16. Sat. Went to the foreign church and heard a sermon read by Mr. Alexander.

17. Wrote to the dear ones at home. I have begun today ^{to paint} a convolution, and also worked a little on my other picture. Called this P.M. on Mrs. S. Bailey, who I found Mrs. Thurston, and called it so on Minnie Hobson.

18 Tues. Received several letters from home.

21. Fri. My ranges are completed, and I have advanced my second picture this week.

22 Sat. Helped Mrs. Wilfong about cooking this morning, and after dinner, Flora, Nathan, Annie and I went up in the valley for a horse back ride, and had a delightful time.

23 Sat. Went with Neal Wilfong and the girls to the foreign church, and this P.M. to a funeral at the native church.

1871.

April

- 24 Mon Wrote letters to Lucy, and to home
friends. The Moi went out this evening to
see Miss E. Bailey who is going to Sat. &
Dr. Nichols who is going to Niles.
- 25 Tues Received letter from home and from
Lorenzo and Lucy.
- 26 Wed. Mrs. Bishop and Della came over
today to stay until Saturday at Mrs. Heathman's.

6. Sat. Lorin went over to Milwaukee for me yesterday. I invited Annie to come home with us and stay a week, and this morning she received her father's consent. We started at nine o'clock this A.M. and taking it leisurely, arrived here at about two P.M. Old Mr. Hitchcock is here making a visit.

7. Sat. Kusa preached this morning, and Mrs. Bishop this afternoon.

8. Mon. Here spent the day in preparing for Examination, which begins tomorrow.

9. Tues. The Examination began at ten this morning. This evening the Nettie came in bringing Mr. Pogue and Miss Carpenter the teacher that came out from the States for the E.M.C. Summary.

10. Wed. Examinations continued today.

11. Thurs. We all, excepting Mother, went down to the Exhibition at Wauke church.

The ten graduates delivered orations on various subjects, and received diplomas. Annie & I went to ride towards evening.

12. Fri. Mr. Pogue and Mrs. Hitchcock returned to Milwaukee this evening in the Nettie. Miss Carpenter and we children have been up to the Dible House.

We are to go to Makawao next after next.

May.

- 13 Sat. Annie Wolfgang went home ^{this afternoon} with her father, who came for her last night.
- 14 Sat. As it is vacation we have not the privilege of public worship on the Sabbath. I have found this day rest for both body and soul.
- 15 Mon. Have occupied my time in house work & sewing. Father has packed the books.
- 16 Tues. Sewing and packing.

June. Mahawo.

20 Tues. How long it is since I have recorded anything within your pages, my journal. But during this long time we have been busy in the confusion of packing & moving, and settling down in this over new home. This is nearly accomplished and we are ready to take scholars as fast as they probably will come at first. The first one came today, Pokine, Abenjo's daughter. Oh! what a great work is before us, that of training immortal souls! Oh, that this school may be a blessing to this nation!

21 Wed. Mrs. Wilfus and baby, Mrs. Mott and baby, Helen, and Lorbie Thurston are here to spend the day, and Mrs. Thurston will come down this afternoon after she has finished her school duties.

1871.

June.

- 23 Fri. We have had a good many callers today Mr. Thompson of Hilo, Pres. Alexander, Mrs. Holoway Sharat and Father & Grindler
- 24 Sat. Miss Carpenter and I were invited to tea at Mrs. Green's, and we had a very pleasant visit. Mrs. Needham who has come up with her children to stay a month at Makawao, came and spent the afternoon here. She wishes me to give Hattie ^{music} lessons while she is here.
- 25 Sun. There were no services in the foreign church this morning, as they paid extra to seats yesterday. This afternoon Mr. Bishop, who came over the mountain yesterday, rode up from Mr. Baldwin's to spend the night here.
- 26 Mon. Pres. Alexander is getting up a party to go to the top of Haleakala and Miss Carpenter and Mr. Bishop have consented to go. He returned home today and is coming back tomorrow to go up with the party one ~~week~~. Began to give Hattie Needham music lessons this morning.
- 27 Tues. Pres. Alexander went up today into the mountain to make some surveys and prepare for the rest of the party.

1871.

June

- 28 Wed. A large party started for the top of Haleakala this P. M. but the weather looks rather dubious.
- 29 Thu. Father, Lorrin and I went to the examination of the Haleakala schools. The party up the mountain came down this P. M. having had a splendid time. Mr. Bishop went right on to Wailea on his way home.
- 30 Fri. Went down and spent several hours at Capt. Hobson's. This evening wrote to Annie Willoughby.
Half the year is gone, and with the new half I enter upon a new kind of work. It is a greater work than I have yet undertaken, and I need much grace to aid me in it. Eph. 3: 16-21.

1871.

July.

1st Sat. The second scholar came to-day.
Harriet Naauao from Waimee.

2nd Sat. Mr. Green preached a Fourth of
July sermon.

3rd Mon. Miss Carpenter began school this
morning. Three new scholars; Horpila,
Kapela & Lydia Sniffin. This P.M.
Nathan Willfong came up and said that
all the family were coming up to spend
tomorrow. Edward Bishop also came
over the mountain to spend the several
days here.

4th Tues. Nathan Willfong, Edward, Lorin,
Luella, and I went to a picnic at
Loikoe, and afterwards rode through
the woods around back of Piholo.

Capt. Willfong, his wife & Try came up
to breakfast this morning and returned
this P.M. Nathan & Edward are going
to start in the night for the top of the
mountain.

5. Wed. Prof Higgins came over the
mountain yesterday, and today he has
tuned the piano and given each of us
girls a music lesson. Nathan & Edward
arrived here from the mountain early
in the afternoon, and the father went
right on to Waimee.

1871.

July

6th Thurs. Prof. Holquist returned to Lahaina this A.M. Mother went to a sewing society at Mrs. Hobson's this afternoon, and Edward, Miss Carpenter & I went down & spent the evening.

8 Sat. This afternoon Edward and we children took a ride in the woods out to the sawmill.

9 Sat. Miss Carpenter and I stayed at home this morning and she went with the girls to native services this P.M.

10 Mon. Edward Bishop returned home today, a new scholar came from Wailuku this morning.

12 Weds. Two scholars came today, one from Waimea and Brewster's daughter from Molokai.

14 Fri. I am fifteen years old today. I can scarcely realize it, but thus the days, the months, the years are going, and show us that we ought to be improving. I fear that I have not gained much in the past year, and I feel that I need divine help for the future.

We are to have Friday for our writing day, and have been writing to Samuel and Lucy, for we have had so little time since we have been here for writing to them.

1871

July

28th Fri During the last two weeks five more scholars have come. Two from Wailehu, two from Molokai, and one from Lahaina. No great changes have been made and nothing important has happened. A week ago today I wrote a composition on the subject: "The Nations of the Earth." Today I have written to Mary Sibley, and begun a letter to Grandmother. Mother heard by the last mail of the death of Miriam Clark, my cousin.

August.

4th Fri. Kahale's daughter came this week from Wailehu to school. I commenced giving Helen Thurston music lessons today. Have written a composition today on "Lessons." Father went to Wailehu this morning. He has agreed to go down every Friday and teach a class in the Theological School.

8th Tues. A school teacher from Hanalei brought his daughter twenty years old to school today.

9th Wed. We have had a severe northwesterly storm today, and the windward side of the house has been completely drenched

10th Tues. Have spent the most of the day in clearing up the effects of the storm. Miss Carpenter has had no school, and this afternoon washed the girls clothes. Helen Thurston came down and reported that much damage was done by the storm at the Haleakala school. Another scholar came ^{today} from Capt. Bo-
hori's plantation whom Mr. Tellman is going to support here.

11. Fri. Wrote to Samuel and Lucy.

12. Sat. Went with the girls to Kalena to bathe.

14. Mon. Miss Carpenter had the girls wash to day. Hereafter our writing day is to be Mon.

15. Tues. Mrs. Parker was here to dinner to day. A little scholar was brought.

16. Wed. Did not receive anyone to day for neither wished one to help her.

18. Fri. Father went down to Wailea as usual, and brought up Miss Bingham this evening. She came up to Maui last Tues. in the Steamer with Emma Napoleon one of her scholars, and has been staying at Wailea.

19. Sat. Cleaned house as usual this forenoon, but did not go to Kalena this P. M.

1871.

August.

25th Fri. Two girls by the name of Huston came down from Hawaii today in the steamer to come to this school. We all enjoy having Miss Bingham here, and she seems to enjoy it herself, taking rides with Miss Carpenter, etc.

31st Thurs. A scholar was brought from Honolulu today.

September.

1st Fri. Another scholar from Waikiki.
 2nd Sat. The trustees of this school had a meeting here this morning. Six out of the nine were present. This P.M. Mr. Sanford of Waikiki brought his two little girls to school.

October.

1st Sat. The last quarter of this year only remains, and I do hope to make great improvement in it.

2nd Mon. Our school has increased considerably during the past month, and now numbers 28! Miss Bingham left us last Friday for Lahaina.

3rd Tues. For a composition today, I made a translation of a passage in Caesar.

4th Wed. Minnie Hobson came up this P.M. and made a long call.

6th Fri. Miss Carpenter and I went

out for a ride this P. M. which we enjoyed very much.

14 Sat. Went to Kalena with the girls.

13. Fri. Mother and no children went down this evening to Capt. Hobson's on invitation, to hear some minstrels who lately came down from Cal. The music was beautiful, but they deteriorated it by acting. Most of them were blacked and dressed as negroes, and did many outlandish performances.

16. Mon. Mother went up to see Mrs. Rodgers who is laid up with a hurt knee. Miss Gray made a short call.

17. Tues. Wrote a composition on "The superiority of Men above Animals."

20. Fri. Went with Miss Carpenter, to call on Mrs. Spencer, and Hobson.

21. Sat. Went with the girls to Kalena.

25. Wed. Received a long letter from Lucy. She writes from Flint, stating that Samuel has gone to Ann Arbor. It is truly refreshing to hear from our absent ones, especially from Lucy. she has been silent so long.

28. Fri. Father started early this morning to go down to Maalea bay to get a little girl who came down from Hilo in the steamer and came back by the way of Waileuku.

1871.

October.

and met his class as usual.

28th Sat. Went with the girls to bathe.

30th Mon. Four scholars were brought today from Kular.

1873.

January.

1st Mon. It is two months since I last communicated with you, and I am determined not to neglect you any longer; my journal & am determined also to improve in the performance of many things that I have neglected in the old year, and I hope this new year will be a great blessing to me. This schools numbers 55 today. It is as large a number as can be taken on account of the smallness of our dining room. Mr. & Mrs. Sharatt, and Mr. & Mrs. Spencer made New year calls here today. I wrote as a completion today, a Synopsis of the Second Book of Paradise Lost.

2nd Tues. Howard Johnson went home this morning. His P. Mc Kate Gray and Minnie Holow called. I become impatient with myself nearly every time I am called upon to entertain visitors, for I know so little, and am so unused to society that it is quite embarrassing to me, when I am obliged to take part in conversation.

3rd Wed. At about dark this evening Mrs. Wilfong and her daughters, Minnie & Foy rode up to the door quite unexpectedly, and we have had to exercise a good deal stooping away, to make suitable places for us all to sleep. I feel more and more the importance of maintaining a proper dignity before these scholars, for

so many of them are inclined to be very familiar, especially the half castes, if I am not the least familiar with them.

4th Thurs Luella and Florence have omitted school today to entertain their visitors. They all went over to Mr. Green's and spent the afternoon.

5th Fri. Mrs. Willford, and her daughter returned home this morning. I have not learned to gather up the ^{lose} minutes, and use them to good purpose, yet I feel that I waste a great deal of time, which goes almost without my knowledge. I must be more careful.

6th Sat. I went with the girls to Kalena this P.M. but I will not undertake the management of so large a number again, for it is so hard to control them while on the way. The majority of them behaved very well but some few unruly ones tried my patience a good deal. The first week of the year is indeed, but I cannot say that I am satisfied with the way I have spent some of it. I hope I have made improvement in some things, but I feel that I must make still greater improvement. I find that regular habits and a proper division of my time is a great help to me.

7th Sat. It has been windy all day, and while the girls were gone to church it began to rain so that they got wet in coming home. I have been greatly impressed with the great

love of God towards his chosen people, in reading the last chapters of Deut.

8th Mon. This is a writing day for us children, but giving music lessons & practicing besides my other duties have taken up nearly all the time.

Emily, a girl from Waimee, ran away this afternoon at five o'clock. Father sent Kohueva after her but it became too dark for him to see and so he returned without her. I hope she is under shelter tonight, for it is very cold. She has been very homesick lately, which ^{probably} feeling led her to do such a thing. It is the first case of the kind that we have had, since school opened.

9th Tues. Father went down to Waimee today and saw Emily's brother who said that he would bring her back again.

10th Wed. Oh! that I had more time at my disposal! I would wish the days to be about twice as long as they are, that I might accomplish all I desired to. I see so much to be done, and so much to be improved, and so much undone, that it makes me restless whenever I think of it. I suppose I must improve what time I have, and ^{use} make time, as it were, by using what I have now, to good advantage.

11th Thurs. I think I have succeeded a little better today in using my time to advantage. I wonder how it would seem to have time hanging on one's hands, when the chief pursuit

of life is to "kill time," as is the case with so many people in the world.

15th Mon. Giving music lessons, practicing, and writing have been the order of the day. I finished off a letter to Lucy this afternoon. Heard today that Mrs. McElroy had a little girl.

16th Tues. Mrs. Thurston came up in the Steamer from Honolulu this morning, having been gone a month on a visit to friends there. Luella and Florence have been off all day with Lavin, who went with the cart to get taro, guavas, &c.

17th Wed. Mother took all the girls out to walk this afternoon, and they went up to Mrs. Thurston's. Mrs. Johnson came from Wailupalakua today to see her little girls.

18th Thurs. Miss Carpenter, Luella and I went down to Henry Baldwin's this afternoon and, came home by moonlight.

19th Fri. Father started off early this morning to meet the Steamer for the purpose of going to Kona Lulu. He intends to stay until the return of it, and do a good deal of business. Miss P. M. Miss Kate Gray and Miss Lewers called.

20. Sat. Mrs. Johnson is very entertaining, and moreover is so kind and true apparently that I enjoy her company very much.

She has a good many English manners, and is always perfectly at ease.

1872.

January.

21st Sat. It has been rainy all day, so that it has been quite hard to keep the girls quiet and occupied.

22nd Mon. Storming all day, so that Miss Carpenter could not get her clothes out. Mother felt very anxious about Father, who was to return ~~tonight~~ on the Steamer.

23rd Tues. Still storming, and as the Steamer did not come we think she must have waited.

24 Wed. The storm has abated and it seems good to have some quiet. Mrs. Sayre called and said that the "Kibanea" would probably start tonight.

25th Thurs. Father surprised us by coming in very suddenly about 9:30 A. M. He was from Lahaina, having left the Steamer and rode over the mountains. He did a great deal of business in Honolulu, and reports ^{that} the "Morning Star" arrived here ~~last~~ week from Micronesia bringing Mr.

and Mrs. Bingham, and some native missionaries. He says that there is deep religious feeling felt at Honolulu at the present time. Oh! that it may be blessed to many souls. Mrs. Thuerston and Helen came down, ^{this evening} and Miss Carpenter read to us a journal written by Mrs. Snow on the voyage of the "Morning Star."

We received letters from Samuel and Lucy, & also other friends.

1872.

January.

26th Fri Oh! that I was more mature, more steady, and knew better how to act. I care about every day, and feel repaid with myself that I have been so thoughtless, so seemingly unkind and disrespectful! How earnest should I be to improve!

27th Sat. Mother was sick all the morning, and therefore at good ^{chadoward} of the experiencing of the work fell upon me than I am accustomed; therefore I feel very tried tonight. What a blessing that we have the Sabbath to refresh our bodies as well as our souls!

28th Sat. Again returns the day of rest.

Mother has a prayer meeting with the girls of the 1st & 2nd dormitories, every Sat. eve. All seem very willing to come, but they show so little real desire to assemble as such a meeting, and seem to regard it so lightly, that it seems almost as though they considered laughing and praying as the same thing. Yet we hope that a few of them have some ideas of the solemnity of drawing nigh to God by means of prayer, and we hope that many more will have it yet.

29th Mon Miss Carpenter has changed our writing day to Wed., therefore we have studied as usual today. My daily studies occupy all the time I have for them, & and I have little time for extras; so fully is my time taken up.

1872.

February.

Jan 14 I began a composition yesterday but it was only a beginning, for I have so little time on writing days.

3rd Sat. This afternoon Mother, Mrs Thurston and I went down to Mrs. Holton's to call upon her and Mrs. Gray. The former has been absent from hence the last two weeks taking care of her first grand child, Minnie Bailey. Father has a foreigner working for him now by the name of Silver. He is a young man, has been a sailor several months, but was brought to Honolulu after the calamity of whale ships up North, by ice. He boards and sleeps in Mrs. Walls new house which he has just built opposite here. He and Lorrin went shopping this P.M. and brought home a few odds.

4th Sat. Mr. Smyth came from Wailupalakewa to see his daughter today. We are very much troubled by these white men breaking the quiet of our Sat. by coming to see their children, on that day.

5th Mon. I have begun to study Virgil's Aeneid, & did not finish Caesar, but have read four books of it, and Miss Carpenter thought that I was far enough advanced to begin Virgil.

6th Tues. Studied, as usual.

1872.

February

7th Wed. This P. M. Mrs Thurston and Mrs. Thomas called. The latter is a lady from Cal. who went to the top of the mountain Mon., and is staying a short time with Mrs. Thurston.

8th Thurs. Went with Hannah and Harriet to Mrs. Thurston's, to carry her some things, and then to water the horses.

9th Fri. Father and Mother started off before daylight this morning for Waileahe, and spent the whole day there, reaching home again at 7.30 P. M.

10th Sat. Went with a part of the girls to Kalua but the Haleakala boys bothered us by staying on the bank of the valley, so that we were quite late and did not get home till sunset. The girls behaved very well, and I was glad that they kept their dignity, and did not take notice of their insulting speeches.

11th Sun. We wrote compositions Wed. and Miss Carpenter intended to have us read them last evening, as Mrs. Thurston was coming down, but she was giling and therefore we did not read them. Father went to Waileahe today, but he is going to discontinue this practice, for he has so much to do at home. Mr. Bailey wishes Luella to go down and stay with her a few days. Luella wishes to go very much.

1872.

February.

- 17th Sat Walked up to Mrs. Thurston with Florence, to see if Luella could go down with Lorrie Thurston to Wailuku when he goes to school next Monday.
19. Mon Lorrie Thurston called at seven o'clock this A. M. and as Luella was all ready they started immediately. Mrs. Thurston & Helen came down this evening, and we read our compositions.
23. Fri Lorrie Thurston came home this P. M. and brought a letter from Luella to us. She seems to be of use to Mrs. Baile and therefore she stays there longer than she intended. Mrs. Thurston came down this evening and went with Miss Carpenter to take a moonlight ride, and call on Mrs. Prof. Alexander who is staying at Makawo for a time.
24. Sat. Mr. Smyth of Ulupalukua sent for his daughter, and she went home this afternoon. We are very glad to have her go for she has proved to be a bad girl. Mother went to walk with the girls this P. M.
28. Wed. Miss Carpenter and I are going down to Wailuku to hear a reading by a Mrs. Panceford, who has given one or two readings there lately.

1872.

March

4th Mon. Miss Carpenter and I were intending to go to the reading Wed. eve. and then stay in Wailea until Fri. afternoon, & then come up with Luella. We enjoyed the reading very much, and also our visit, but as we were starting for home, Fri. we discovered that Mother's horse, which Miss Carpenter had ridden up in valley the day before, was lame, and it was concluded that I should stay down until today and come up with Father Alexander. My horse was not to be found however, this morning and I was obliged to borrow one. 5th Tues. Kekuewa was sent down to the bay this morning to take a horse to Mr. Theodore Gulick who is coming here to fill some teeth for us. Mr. Gulick arrived a little before dinner, and Kekuewa at dark. The latter has been to Wailea and got Mother's horse. Mr. Gulick examined my teeth this P. M. but only found one filling to be done, which he immediately did.

Wed. Mr. Gulick polished the filling he put into my teeth yesterday, and cleaned my teeth this morning, and worked on Parry's and Florence's during the day, and spent the evening at Mrs. Thurston's.

1872.

March.

8th Fri. Luella's birthday. She is 15 years old. Capt. Holton came up here to the Seminary today for the first time since school was opened. Mrs. Henry Baldwin also called. Mr. Gulick found two small cavities on the inner surface of my teeth and tried to fill one with gold, but he did not succeed and therefore put a bone filling into both. I have learned to esteem him very highly even in his short stay with us, as an active and devoted Christian man. I believe that he is one who fulfills the injunction of Christ to all his disciples, "Abide in me."

9th Sat. Miss Carpenter went with the girls to Kalama today.

10th Sat. Mr. Gulick preached at the foreign church, by invitation of Mr. Green. A little boy in the Haleakala school died of lock-jaw last night, and the funeral took place this P.M. at the native church. This eve. Mr. Gulick addressed the girls, and later I enjoyed an hour with him in examining different passages of Scripture, which time I enjoyed exceedingly.

11th Mon. Father and Mother took a long ride this afternoon, with three of the girls. Minnie Holton called on me. Mr. Rutherford Hitchcock, who is in Makawao at present,

March.

was here to supper and to spend the night. Pali and his wife from Ebou are here also. He addressed the girls this evening.

13. Wed. We received letters from Samuel and Lucy last evening and today I have written some today. Mr. Gulick has finished all our teeth, and is working on Carrie & Hananah Johnsons today, he intends to return to Honolulu this week. Mr. Curtis Lyons is in Makawao now, and boards here.

14th Thurs. Mr. Gulick went down to Wailea this afternoon, so as to go from there to the Steamer, tomorrow morning.

16th Sat. Went to Kalena with the girls, and immediately after coming back, started down to Capt. Porteus with Miss Carpenter, and spent the evening there.

17. Sat. It has rained all day and as the girls could not go to the church, Father had service here with them, at the house.

22. Fri. We received a large box of things sent from Boston as a present to the Seminary, containing books, Bibles, mottoes, Scripture texts, pictures, tracts, &c. It is a very valuable box, sent by different individuals through the influence of Miss Rice. A handsome brown clock arrived yesterday for Lurin, as a

premium for getting subscribers to the
Youth's Companion.

13. Sat. It has been stormy all the week,
and only at short intervals that we have
had any pleasant weather at all.

Father and Mother were obliged to go down
to Capt. Hobson's to acknowledge a deed
this P. M., and Lorin & Florence accom-
panied them. They got very wet coming home.

25. Mon. O! the pride of the human heart!
It seems as though the more I try to overcome
it, the more resisted and vain are my
thoughts, and yet I despise myself for it.
God resisteth the proud, but giveth grace
to the humble. "I must have less of my
own righteousness and more of Christ's,
strive to tread in the footsteps of the weak
and lowly Jesus."

26. Tues. Mr. Bishop of Lahainaluna called
here yesterday and ate dinner with us. It
seemed good to see him, he is a genial, and
such a earnest friend of this school, and
speaks so encouragingly of it. Mrs. John-
son, son of Ulupalakua came today to make a
visit here. Mother, Lorin, and Olive have
spent the day at Capt. Hobson's.

30. Sat. Mr. Johnson came today, to open
the Sabbath, I suppose.

1872.

April.

^{1st} Tues. Mrs. James Alexander and his wife called this afternoon. We received letters from Lucy and Aunt Caroline.

^{2d} Weds. Mr. Dwight and his daughter, Sarah's father, Haine, Dorcas' father, and Matai from Molokai, came today to visit the schools.

May.

^{29th} Wed. This is the first day of vacation, which is to continue to the first of July. The scholars have been departing to their several homes since last Friday, and only three are left. Mr. Bishop & Johnny came over from Lihue Sat. and staid here over the Sabbath, on their way to Hanau. Mr. Bishop invited us all to visit him next week before they go down to Honolulu.

Mrs. Carpenter left us this morning for Kahului to go to Honolulu by the M&L, where she is to spend the vacation.

June.

^{1st} Sat. We have been quite busy during this week. We four children intended to go to Lihue early Monday morn. and stay until Wed. Mother thinks she cannot leave, though I wish very much that she would go.

^{2d} Sat. We all went to church this morning excepting Luella. I intend to go every Sat. this vacation, as we have no service at home.

1872.

July.

14th Sab. Ah! my Journal, how art sadly neglected, and I must strive to treat thee in a more comely manner, while I begin a new year of my life. Today I enter my 17th year, and as it begins with a Sabbath, I hope that a sacred influence may pervade and hallow whatever I undertake during this year that is consistent with my Master's will.

15th Mon. Last Saturday Mother went to Uteepala-kua to spend a week in recruiting. Florence & Luella began studying this morn, but I will not commence for a week yet, or longer if I am of any aid to Mother. There are 37 girls here now, but they come in very slowly.

16th Tues. Today I have done considerable sewing, but it seems very tiresome to spend all ones strength in preparing food to eat and clothes to wear! The girls are taught sewing two afternoons in the week, and singing two afternoons.

17th Wed. Commenced giving music lessons.

18th Thurs. It astonishes me that these girls know so little about the Bible, and are so indifferent to it. I think however that I have got one girl to take an interest in this precious book. Oh that it might be very precious to her, and that many might have the value of it, and become wise unto salvation! We need God's Spirit more than anything else.

- 1872 July
- 19th Fri. Mr. Kavanaugh went to Alpena lake this P.M. to return with Mother tomorrow.
- 20th Sat. Mother got home a little afternoon, very tired from her long ride, but after a good visit.
- 21st Mon. I don't wish to begin my studies this week, for I feel that I can assist Mother in her many cares. Annie Willough and Susanna Lake have spent the day here.
- 24th Wed. Mother took charge of the washing yesterday and the ironing today, while I looked after affairs upstairs.
- 26th Fri. Mrs. Holton called this afternoon, found the larger girls in the dining room, Mother teaching them how to cut dresses, went into the kitchen, remarked how clean it looked, &c. I propose to begin studying on Mon. I have begun to read Watt's Improvement of the mind, and like it.
- 27th Sat. Went with the girls to Calmar, and afterwards, went to ride with Miss Carpenter, and winding up by calling on Mrs. Thurston. I remembered that three years ago a lady in Calmar in speaking of how little I went from home, asked me when I would begin to go out more. I replied, "When I am sixteen years old." But I feel as little, and less inclined to go ^{now} as I did then, and this is the first time I have set foot off from the premises since my birth day. I have no inclination to be constantly "on the wing."

1872

July.

28th Sat. How cold my heart has been today! The reaction from yesterday's exertion has made me feel dull and senseless. Truly, the spirit is willing, but the flesh is weak, and too often the spirit yields to the flesh!

29th Mon. Mother has been sick in bed nearly all day with her poor head. There is nothing that depresses my spirits so much as to see Mother low-spirited, and just at dusk this evening, my long pent-up, tired feelings, burst forth in a flood of hot and bitter tears. How childish! How selfish!

30th Tues. Began the day with a kind of general failing such as I commonly have after shedding ^{many} tears, but it has worn off and I feel more like myself now. Mother is much better, and has turned to oversee the washing soon. It is Florence's 12th birthday.

August.

3rd Sat. Now that I have begun studying & find scarcely any time for writing. Went with the girls to Kalena. Mother, Miss Carpenter, Mrs. Hunter went this P.M. and called on Mrs. Boston, Baldwin and Alexander. Lucia, Florence and Helen walked down to Mrs. Wilbur.

6th Tues. Mrs. W. W. Hall and family, with Miss Lucy White, and young Dinsmoor came up from Gloucester in the Steamer today, and they are going to stay a few weeks at the "Corporal" house. Lucy arrived late, and ate supper here.

1873.

August.

14th Wed. Father and Mother spent the day at Waileia. Mother's ear and head have troubled her so much of late that she felt that she ought to consult the doctor. Dr. Saunders has but lately begun to practice on Maui, and Mother said that he seemed like a very pleasant man.

Mrs. W. W. Hall, young Deinard and Henry Baldwin started yesterday to go to Haupo after the crater. Mrs. Hall and Lucy White spent this eve. here, played, sang, played "proverbs" &c. 15th Thurs. I recited the first fall number of lessons today that I ^{had} ^{study} this term. I know it worries Mother to see me spend any extra time in homework, and she tries to plan so that I will have more studying time, still I wish to relieve her as much as I can under the circumstances; and improve my time whatever it is. Mrs. Hall dined here today.

16th Fri. Mother and we children went to an entertainment given at the foreign church by a Prof. Plummer, who is traveling for his health, and consented to come to Makawao for a night. He recited poetry, comic pieces, &c. and his power of changing his countenance in acting out different characters was truly wonderful. I enjoyed the evening exceedingly.

17th Sat. Something has got into me, that I can not account for. I feel so restless, and oft

1872.

August

I cannot tell what I want, so hungry, longing for something, yet I know not what will satisfy me. The excitement of last evening's entertainment roused me in such a manner that I cannot think of it without having that same hungry feeling. It has rained some today.

18th Sat. Rainy all day, so that the girls did not go to church. Mr. Read brought up from Wailuku, Annie and Hannah Johnson who came down from Hawaii on Fri. with their brothers who are going to the Kalakala school.

19th Mon. Have studied nearly all day.

Mr. Bailey came from Wailuku today, and intends to spend some time in Makawao, occupied in surveying land.

October.

24th Thurs. Received two letters from Lucy, one written from Ocelia where she and Sam. were finishing up the visiting of their summer vacation, and the other a journal letter written after their arrival at Ann Arbor, giving her first impressions of college life. Dr. Saunders and Dr. Brooks called today to see little Mary Beers who has been sick several weeks, and ate dinner here.

25th Fri. Mother went down to Wailuku this morning with Mrs. Thurston to

stay until Mon. Mrs. Hitchcock spent the day at Mrs. Wilburs.

26th Sat. It has been rainy all day so that we did not go to Kalena. Several girls are unwell.

27th Sat. Rainy, but Corin and Luella started for church, though they found only two persons there, Mr. Sayre and Henry Alexander, so that they had the pleasure of coming back in the rain. Of course the girls did not go to meeting.

28. Mrs. Mrs. Hitchcock who has been making a visit here of several weeks, went to Wailuku this A.M. on her way to the Steamer for Hawaii. Mother returned this eve. from Wailuku, but I fear her short visit has not done her much good, as she has suffered a good deal of shivering.

^{Nov.} Father sent yesterday to Waiahu for the Dr. for Mary Beers was alarmingly worse, and Dr. Brooks came up today. She seems some better, and he thinks her attack was a kind of crisis to her sickness, from which she will continue to improve.

November.

2^d Sat. Went with girls to Kalena.

3rd Sat. Went to church this morning.

5th Tues. The weather was sultry and preparing for a rain, though the day has been good for drying clothes.

7th Thurs. We have had a hard Kona rain today, which has sent the water into the cistern.

8th Fri. Miss. Arms, three of the girls and

myself went with Miss Carpenter nearly to Hailakai, when beginning to rain we started back while she went on to Sam Alexander's where she expects to stay and come up to meeting next Sunday on her way back.

9th Sat. Rained this P.M. so I did not go to bathe. Messrs. Rodgers & Silver called down this eve.

10th Sat. Miss Carpenter came up to church on her way home but got caught in a rain so she did not stop to meeting.

11th Mon. Rainy all the afternoon.

13th Tues. Mother got the clothes out this morning, but after hanging in the rain all day they were put to soak until more favorable weather. Went up with several large girls to get

slips from Mr. Kavanagh to plant in the fence on the side of the road for a hedge. Sam Alexander recently sent up over thirty young cedar saplings, which if they grow and live will make a fine avenue.

15th Fri. Mrs. Gray called today and also Mr. Kavanagh and Mr. Green. Mr. Beers came this A.M. to see Mary, and after dinner went down to Maalike to get her mother, and another relation who had landed from the Keimau there.

16th Sat. Mr. Beers and train went to Molokai this afternoon, to return to Molokai. Miss Carpenter took Mary on horseback to see Mrs. Thompson this P.M. accompanied by Luella and Florence.

1872.

November.

- 17th Sat. Rainy, so we did not go to church.
- 18th Tues. Washing day, but it has rained hard all day, so the clothes had to be left until another day.
- 20th Wed. This P. M. Mother, Miss Arms and I went up to Mrs. Thurston's to call, and then Miss Arms and I went & took a ride which proved a very pleasant one.
- 21st Thurs. Took a long walk with the larger girls.
- 25th Mon. We received a large American mail this morning & this P. M. I went with Mother & Miss Arms to call on Mrs. H. Baldwin & Mrs. James Alexander. We had hoped to see Father Alexander, but were disappointed, for he has just returned from a voyage to the Macronesian Is. and he had left for Walla Walla with his wife. We then called on Mrs. Hobson, Miss Gray & Minnie Hobson, the former of whom has been making a visit at Home, and the latter have just returned from "the coast" - with them they went five months ago. Minnie has been homesick and is glad to get home. Father left today to go to Molokai for the purpose of attending the meeting of Presbytery.
28. Thurs. Hawaiian National Holiday, also Thanksgiving giving, in celebration of this great day, we had a grand dinner, the Kekahaka teachers, and Mr. Harrold, gracing us their presence. This evening assembled in the parlor, the girls enjoyed a social hour in singing, playing, chatting &c. which ended the ^{day}.

1873.

January

1st Feb. A new year opens before me, with bright and glorious prospects. With deep gratitude for the blessing that have surrounded me during the year that has past, I enter upon the new one with the earnest purpose to live a higher and better life. though it was distance of time in which I trust, after its very faithful I think I have for some time past lived too narrow a life, too selfish, and limited, the natural result of which is this egotism and pride with which I have hitherto lived. We had a very pleasant Christmas. Mr. & Mrs. Gulick, with his wife, and little Chinese girl, came up from Wailuku that day, and continued with us until the 31st, which day our "Woman's Society" met, and listened to Mrs. Gulick, who gave some account of their labors in China.

2nd Thurs. The girls this morning finished the large ironing which they had not time to complete yesterday. I have given one music lesson and painted a little; a sprig of beach flower. The trees are literally covered with blossoms at present.

3rd Fri. Began to give drawing lessons to a class of six girls, Father wishes me to teach the rudiments of drawing. Also began teaching Singh and Keattie Akana music, besides teaching Annie Johnson and Lilla. Mr. Kavanaugh said "Goodbye" to us this eve. We have not yet heard who will take his place. A little girl was brought to school from Wailuku

1873. January.
- 4th Sat. Went with the girls to Kalaona.
- 5th Sat. Mother has spent the whole day in her room resting as quietly as possibly under the circumstances, and I am glad she has done so for of late she has been much worn, and needs rest. I hope this year that each Sabbath may be spent in learning more of the Bible, and of my God.
- 6th Mon. Dr. Brook called today. This afternoon Annie and boy Willings came up from Mailuku to stay until Thurs.
- 7th Tues. Luella & Florence don't study now while their company remains. They have been to Mrs. Green's & eaten dinner bringing back some elegant robes.
- 8th Wed. The girls have gone to ride in the woods.
- 9th Thurs. Annie and I went home this morning, though the weather looked somewhat threatening.
- 10th Fri. Rained considerably during the day. I gave a drawing lesson this afternoon. Three lessons a week are all that can conveniently be taught.
- 11th Sat. Raining, so I did not go to Kalaona.
- 12th Sat. We went to church and heard a sermon from Rev. Thos. Bullock, who is now visiting the Islands before he goes to his future missionary field in Spain. He preached from Deut. 32. It shewing the superiority of the Christians, above any other, as displayed in the conduct of enemies themselves. It was pure enjoyment to listen to him, he was so animated.

1873.

January.

- 13rd Mon. Began to study rhetoric. I will recite two or week. My book is "Rhetoric," borrowed from Mr. Hess.
- 14th Tues. Finished off letter this evening to Lucy. The new king was enthroned on the 9th. There are some doubts as to whether he will control his appetite for drink so as to be able to fulfil his duties in a proper manner, but he has chosen good ministers.
- 15th Wed. Mr. and Mrs. Gulick called and spent nearly an hour and a half here. Mother took ^{still in} them around the house, and they took such a hearty interest in everything, and seemed so cheerful and full of life, that it was a real pleasure to see them. May they be prospered in their work.
- 16th Thurs. Mother and Florence went up to Mrs. Thurston's this evening. Mrs. L. arrived home last night, after a vacation of several weeks.
- 17th Fri. Luella and I went up to Mrs. Thurston's and spent about two hours this P. M.
- 18th Sat. Went to Helena with the girls & Mother. Miss Carpenter went down to Helena while Luella and Miss Arms called on Mrs. Wilbur and Mrs. Brown.
- 19th Sat. Mrs. Green preached from 2 Cor. 3.18.
- 20th Mon. A large American mail arrived today. Three letters came from Samuel and Lucy. The latter gave quite an account of Thalaborious' studies, which tax all their powers to conquer, and are very fatiguing.

21st Tues.

January.

It has been rainy all day so that the drying of the clothes was postponed until tomorrow.

22nd Wed. Mrs. Cooper has given me permission to go to their house while they are away during the week, and practice on their cabinet organ.

23rd Sat. Went to Kalemaz with the girls, afterwards to New Haven to borrow some books.

Mrs. Thurston had spent the afternoon here.

26th Sat. Went to hear Mr. Green preach.

27th Mon. Ned George Lura called this afternoon.

29th Wed. Mother took the girls up to Mrs. Thurs ton's to call. Mrs. James Bailey and little boy are visiting there, & recuperating their health.

30th Thurs. Mother spent the day at Capt. Hebron, and towards night Father, Miss Arms, Lucy and I went down, and came back with her. Mother Bailey is visiting there.

31st Fri. Miss Carpenter had gone down to Capt. Hebron, to make a short visit.

February.

1st Sat. Ned Thurston and Mrs. J. Bailey with her little boy have spent the afternoon here. It was so windy, I did not go to Kalemaz.

2nd Sat. Went to foreign church. Miss Carpenter came up to church, and then home with us.

3rd Mon. Mrs. Hebron, Kate Gray, Mrs. Cornwall, and Miss Everett called. The lat-

of February.

He wishes to go up on Haleakala with a party going up tomorrow morning. Uncle Wilson came up from Wailea & got and near dark Mr. and Mrs. Kennedy visited here, some California people, who lodge here to night, and go in the same party tomorrow. George, Bella & Florence went down to Hilo. We hurried to the christening of their baby this evening by Bishop Willis and Whipple.

4th Tues. The party started for the mountain at 3 o'c. M. and got back at 1 P. M. having had fine views and pleasant weather.

We learnt this afternoon of the death of Jessie Armstrong, by typhoid fever. It will be a great affliction to the parents to lose their oldest child. Mr. & Mrs. Lether, Mother, and Florence went down to Wailea with Mrs. Thurston to perform Armstrong's funeral, and returned in the evening. Mrs. Bailey came up from last evenings, ate dinner here, and went to Mrs. Green's Fri. Mrs. Bailey rode in here today on her way to Mrs. Thurston's. Mother walked over to Mr. Green's for a wonder, though it is very warm.

8th Sat. Miss Lydia Bingham came up from Wailea today, to make a visit at the Seaside Inn. I went with the girls to Kalena, Kati Bay and Sosaina Lake. Mrs. Baldwin and Mrs. Alexander called while I was gone.

1573

February.

- 15th Sat. Went to church with the others.
- 16th Mon. Mrs. Bailes and Mr. and Mrs. Green called this afternoon.
- 15th Sat. We have had a good deal of rain this week, but it has been delightful today. Miss Carpenter, Miss Amanda Whig, Boligham went down to Henry Ball with this morning and then to other places taking with a big ride. I went with the girls to Malone. The rain has filled it up so that it is all flowing and running down the valley.
- 16th Sat. Another beautiful day. Went to church.
- 17th Mon. Made preparations for getting up a party to the top of the mountain. We are all going except Father and Mother, and Carrie and Hannah Johnson are going with us. The plan is to leave at one o'clock tomorrow morning and go up in time to see the sunrise.
- 18th Tues. Four o'clock this morning found us on our way up the mountain. We soon over-took Mr. Silver and Mrs. James Bailes who had started from the Hatchabala school, to accompany us. We reached the top just in time to see the sunrise. The morning was unusually warm though there was frost on the mountain. We started back at nine o'clock, taking it leisurely, reached home at four P.M. We are all pretty well exhausted.

1873.

February.

19th Wed An American mail came last night. Samuel's letter dated Dec 31st 1873 was received with others. It was written during the vacation at the Christmas holidays. He was remaining at Ann Arbor, while Lucy had gone to Lintonville to spend the vacation. He inclosed in his letter a photograph of his club consisting of four members, Easton, Looker & Peck and himself.

20th Thurs A very cold day. This morning the thermometer at 52°. There has been snow on the mountain all day. Mother and Miss Bingham are spending the afternoon and evening at Mrs. Burdstone's. Mr. Hitchcock has just brought a new teacher to that school called Mrs. Clark.

21st Fri. Mrs. Norton sent up for Miss Bingham to go down and make her a visit. Miss. Easton went with her. We are having very cold weather now. Mr. Silver spent last night on the mountain and brought down a quantity of snow this morning. This evening Adella and I made some ice cream. Mrs. Bailey & Mrs. Green called this P.M.

22nd Sat Mother has been quite sick today. The noise troubled her head so that I took the girls to Kalmar as soon as possible after dinner, and kept them there as long as possible.

23rd Sun Mother still poorly. I did not go to church.

1973.

February.

- 25th Now. Miss Bingham and Miss Arms returned yesterday, going to church on their way.
- 26th We, Mother, Miss Bingham, Florence, Loring, Mrs. Thurston, and Helen went after dinner to a valley in Hamakua to see some falls. While they were gone we had a severe thunder storm, which however did not reach them, and they came home dry.
- 28th Fri. Mrs. Green invited Miss Carpenter, Miss Bingham, Miss Arms and myself to tea last night. What a very pleasant visit. This morning Miss Bingham, Miss Carpenter and Lorin rode down to Waimea, the former in Tong Leumann's wagon, and the two latter on horseback. Tomorrow they expect to go from here to Hāna, Miss Bingham by steamer and Miss Carpenter and Lorin over the mountains. In a week Miss Bingham intends to return to Honolulu, and after two weeks Miss Carpenter will come back here. I will have a vacation while she is gone. Mrs. Xaragh came in suddenly upon us last evening. She had come to settle up his affairs at Neakauao preparatory to leaving the country for Japan. She spent this evening in the basement sorting and packing his things. Luther has bought several articles, and he has given a number of old books to us.

1873.

March.

- 1st Sat. Mrs. Harranagh departed this morning. Went with the girls to Kalina. Soon after my return Mrs. Willford and Mrs. Armstrong rode into the yard in a brougham. They are going to spend the half-term here. They said that Mr. Theodore Bullock came to Milwaukee yesterday by the "West." His family will probably follow soon to continue on Miami a few months.
- 2nd Sat. Taught the girls their Lat. Sc. lessons and went to church with them this P.M. I have not done such a hard day's work for a great while, and am thoroughly wearied tonight.
- 3rd Mon. Mrs. Willford & Armstrong spent a part of the afternoon at Mrs. Green's, and later Mrs. Thurston and Helen came down to tea.
- 4th Tues. We finished the washing in good season. Lorin got back from L-hina at 8^oc this A.M.
- 5th Wed. Mother and Miss Thurston have spent the day at George Baldwin's. His sister Emily is visiting there now, who is to be married to Mr. Atwater, La hina, in a few weeks. Father did not have school with the girls and they finished the ironing before noon.
- 6th Thurs. Father and Mother "in Wedding" Lorin gave them a few presents which he had obtained at La hina.
- 7th Fri. Mother made over a hundred

tumbler of jelly today. I am preparing to go down to Waileka tomorrow with some girls, and stay until Monday.

10th Mch. I went to Waileka Saturday, and staid at Capt. Wilfong's, while the three girls went to Waikiki; that is Mary Ann, Keala and Hannah Johnson. That afternoon I made calls &c shopping &c. Sabbath morning, attended the foreign church, and heard Mr. Gulick. He preached from John 3.7. Ye must be born again. The chief heads of the sermons were, A. Who are addressed in the text. B. The necessity of the new birth. C. What it is to be born again. He then propounded these two questions. How can a man be born again? and, Are you born again? Sunday evening, Mrs. Robert Andrew, and Anna M. Alexander went to Capt. Wilfong's and we sang hymns. This morning I called on Mr. Gulick at his office, and for nearly an hour I was favoured by listening to him as he earnestly conversed with me concerning religion. His patient, Mrs. Everett then came in and interrupted the conversation. It does me good, when varied with my own, and the apparent indifference of others to come in contact with a strong and earnest nature like his.

1873.

March.

12th Wed. The girls finished the ironing this afternoon, and after dinner I went with them for a ramble and bath on Father's new ranch, the Wilcox's place. Bedford, Toitscock, Mrs. Clark, Mrs. Thistleton and Helen came down to supper and spent the evening.

13th Thurs. Father went down to Wailuku to teacher's convention this morning to return on Sat. We received letters from Miss Larunter today. This P. M. made over 50 tumblers of jelly. Mrs. Gray and Lousaria came at dinner here.

14th Fri. Florence has been sick a bed with a strange eruption on the skin. Lella and I find some of the girls are affected by the same. We cleaned Lorin's room this morning, and Mr. Seyred has been white-washing it. Carrie Wilcox has come here to school 15th Sat. The disease proves to be the chicken pox. Florence suffers a good deal. Miss Larunter and Mrs. Hobbs came up with Father this afternoon, having spent last night at Wailuku.

16th Sat. Mrs. Hobbs preached at the foreign church, but neither of us girls went, for fear of spreading the chicken pox.

17th Mon. Mr. Hobbs returned to Lihua.

March.

today. Mrs. Hobson and Mrs. Sharatt called this afternoon, but Meagher was absent taking a ride to Honolulu with Father Loring it taken by the chicken-pox after all.
 19th Wed. Received an American mail but there were no letters for us.

21st Fri. Arrived last night and this morning, and is still stormy. Mother made over 50 tumblers of jelly again today.

Carrie Smith's father came from Hawaii in the steamer today and is staying here tonight.

24th Mon. It has been stormy for the last few days, though it cleared up yesterday sufficiently to go to church comfortably, yet people did not go out much. Mrs. Smith and a Mr. Cooke who came Sat. spent the Sabbath here. They will go back to Hawaii on the steamer tomorrow.

25th Tues. A Miss Parks who is traveling on the Islands came up from the steamer today and will stay in Makawao a few days.

Mrs. H. Baldwin called this afternoon with Capt. Ballot and his wife, the captain of the "Morning Star." Lorin Thurston came up on the "Lilac" to spend his vacation at home, also Minnie Hobson, her Chickering a Punahoa teacher, and Mrs. Theo. Gulick, to join her husband at Waikiki.

1878.

March.

26th Wed. Capt and Mrs. Heallott and Mrs. Chickering came up this afternoon to spend the night here, and go up on the mountain tomorrow accompanied by Miss Park.

27th Thurs. The weather was dubious this morn but the party went up, though we fear that they are having a hard time tonight as it is quite stormy down here.

28th Fri. Mrs. Chickering came down this morning and reported that the rest of the party were going to remain on the mountain another night. We made 14 tumblers of jelly today.

29th Sat. The party came down this morning completely drenched. They had a hard time last night, and started down early this morn
30th Sat. Miss Arms, my mother and sisters left and Mrs. Heallott went to church though it was rainy.

31st Mon. Kate Gray and Minnie Hobson called this afternoon. Rev. Bishop came in upon us at breakfast very unexpectedly, and left again for home at about 10:30. Mr. Lubberts went over to Mrs. Green's to tea. It has been a magnificent day. The first quarter of the year is gone. I have had wonderful and blessed experiences during this time for which I praise my God.

1573.

April.

- 1st Tues. Capt. and Mrs. Heallit went down to Mr. Baldwin's this morning.
- 2nd Wed. Father, Mother and Miss Park took a long ride going to Waikou by way of Kihouse and were gone nearly all day. Capt. Heallit and his wife had just arrived at Sam-Alexander's house when they reached there. We are having very cloudy weather, and for the last two evenings, magnificent sunsets.
- 3rd Thurs. Capt. and Mrs. Heallit returned this P.M. We played croquet after tea.
- 4th Fri. Capt. his wife and Miss Park went to ride this morning down to Capt. Hobson's.
- 5th Sat. A party of seven, including our guests, went to some falls in Hamakua and have been gone nearly all day.
- Miss Lamb went down with Leanne Wilcox to call at Capt. Hobson's. I went with the other girls to Kalena. A most beautiful day.
- 8th Tues. Went to Woman's meeting at the church this afternoon. Capt. his wife, and Miss Park spent the evening at Capt. Hobson's.
- Mrs. Bailey came up from Waimea today to make a visit.
- 9th Wed. Our guests went out riding to a water-fall mauka of Piiloa.
- 10th Thurs. Capt. Heallit and his wife and Miss Park went to Laieiaaluna today.

April.

the two former to make a short visit and return and the latter on her way to Honolulu. We four children were invited to a party at Capt. Hobson's in celebration of Minnie's birthday. We had a very pleasant time, playing games &c. until after nine o'clock.

15th Fri. Mrs. Bailey turned his face home-ward this afternoon.

16th Sat. Went to Kalena with the girls. We received an American mail and three letters from our absent ones. Lucy has been sick, first with congestion of the lungs, and immediately after with an abscess in her ear. She sent her picture, which is very fine.

16th Wed. We washed yesterday but it rained all day, so that the clothes have to be dried today and the ironing deferred until tomorrow. I went up to Mrs. Thursdons with a number of the girls this afternoon.

17th Thurs. Capt. Hobson sent back the horses they rode to Lahaina a few days ago. The "Meomi-
ity Star" is to sail soon and he is obliged to return immediately to Honolulu.

21st Mon. I finished the second part of Arnold's Latin Prose composition last Friday, and as Miss Carpenter advised me to leave the magazine until I study the reading of Prose, I began Greek today with Father.

1873.

May.

1st Thurs. We went last evening to an Abolitionary entertainment given at the foreign church by a Mr. Demarest who is traveling. He is very young, not appearing over 20 years old, and over acted his pieces, though he seems to have the elements of a good Abolitionist, and may prove the st after a few years.

The girls have had a holiday today. Father equiped three ox carts and a few of the girls rode on horse backs, and went to the woods at the Gordon place, which Father has recently bought in company with Mrs. Cooke, from Hawaii. There is a plantation of three thousand trees, from which we picked several bushels of coffee, and then had a picnic under the Java trees. Miss Carpenter was there all day, and Luella, Florence and Helen went over during the forenoon. Mother and Mrs. Thaxter, here at the farm, were making jelly.

Mrs. Hobson and Miss Gray called this P.M.

3rd Sat. Father and Mother went down to Waikuku and were gone all day. On account of the rain, we did not go to Kailua 10th Sat. Miss Carpenter went down to Capt. Hobson's this forenoon. After dinner I went with the girls to Kailua, and came to Capt. Hobson's with Carrie Wilcox and returned in the evening with Miss Carpenter.

1873.

May.

11th Sat. Went to hear Mr. Green. He preached from Mat. 3.10.

19th Mon. Seventeen Seabainaluna students including four of this year's graduates called beginning to visit the school and house. The yearly examination of S. luna occurred last week. Father has a few boys from there to work for him during the vacation.

17th Sat. Went with the girls to Kalaeloa.

18th Sat. It was rainy this morning, but Seville Lepine and Miss Arms went to church. I regretted much when they returned that I had not gone, for Mr. Theo. Gulick preached. He is at H. Baldwin's house with his family. I went to the native church this afternoon with Miss Carpenter and the girls, and we got quite wet in going.

19th Mon. Father and Mother went down and called at Capt. Hodson's and H. Baldwin's.

20th Tues. Miss Carpenter and I called this P.M. at Henry Baldwin's, and ^{also on} Mrs. J. Alexander. Mr. Gulick is operating there now, and expected his interview to come up here with his family this week. He came to Makawao last Thursday.

23rd Fri. Mr. Gulick and his family came up this afternoon to make a visit with us. Miss Carpenter and Mother were gone to ride in the woods when they came.

1873.

May.

- 24th Sat. Mrs. Gulick has been operating on Al's teeth today. I went to bathe with the girls.
- 25th Sat. We went to hear Mrs. Gulick preach at the church. She preached from Eph 2.13. She shew'd first the condition of the pews and Lentiles before they were brought nigh, and then dwelt on the privileges of those who are made nigh by the blood of Christ. This afternoon he explained to us children as his listeners, several passages of Scripture, and again this evening. I enjoy his conversation exceedingly, he is so earnest, and yet simple and sincere.
- 26th Mon. Luella spent the forenoon and Lorin the afternoon in the dentist's chair. Mother and Mrs. Gulick went to ride in the woods.
- 27th Thurs. Mr. & Mrs. Gulick and little Walter went to ride this afternoon with Miss Carpenter, Helen Thurston, Mrs. Green's children my sister and myself. We went to the top of Pihihi by way of Akahle and returned through the valley's mouth. He made the very roads and paths sacred by his conversation concerning Christ, the theme of all stories on which he loves to dwell.
- 30th Fri. Went with Lorin and my sisters to call on Mr. and Mrs. Green this evening.
- 31st Sat. Went to Kalena. Mother, & Miss Carpenter, Mrs. Gulick and Florence went to ride.

1873.

April

1st Sat. Christ is the Christian's rest, his Sabbath. Thus Rev. Gulick explained on our way to church. Oh! that this Sabbath might fill my heart now and then. He preached to an unusually large congregation from Acts 16: 30, 31. He considered, first, the question, What must I do, to be saved? showing that the sinner is not saved by doing but by believing. Then he dwelt on the first part of the answer, believe on the Lord Jesus Christ, and afterwards on the last part, then shalt thou be saved. Finally he put the practical question, Are you saved? He preached at the native church also this P.M. from the same text that he used last Sunday at the foreign church.

2nd. Mon. I am to have a vacation until after the examination, though I shall continue my work.
 3rd Tues. Saved. Mrs. Hobson, Sharat and Gray called this afternoon.

4th Wed. Luella went to walk with the large girls into the woods at Puanalai. Thurs. Mr. Gulick worked on my teeth this forenoon. He loves to talk during his work, and his subject is constantly the Bible and Christ. His explanation of Bible truths is at once clear and simple.

Luella went with the small girls to pick coffee at Kalina. Mrs. Sam. Key called this evening.

6th Fri. Father went to Waikoloa yesterday.

1873

June

16th Attended teachers convention, and will come home tomorrow.

18th Mr. Gulick finished his work here this afternoon and went down to Henry Park about to get a carriage to convey his wife and son to Mrs. Green's where they intend to make a short visit. He has been here more than two weeks, and how much have I enjoyed his visit! I trust I have learned much also to elucidate the Bible.

Mrs. Gulick is a jewel, she is so gentle and kind, her health is very poor however, and any exertion makes her sick. She wrote to Miss Thurston with Miss Carpenter the other day, and in consequence fainted three times during the evening.

8th Sat. Mr. Green preached this morning from Deut 32:29. He considered the verse as spoken of the unconverted, and preached accordingly, yet there was such a lack of Christ, the sinner's hope, in his discourse that I came away hungry. Mr. Gulick preached at the native church from Ps. 78:20 but I did not go as I felt quite tired this afternoon.

9th Mrs. Lettew went to Whilukw again this morning. Miss Gray called this afternoon.

10th Tues. Mr. and Mrs. Gulick and Walter rode over from Mrs. Green's at sunset in

the carriage. Lee has been operating over Frank Green's who came home tonight to spend tomorrow which is a national holiday.

11th Wed Mr. Gulick and Family came here to breakfast and then went down to Hauke to dinner, intending to go up to Waialae this afternoon. Long will I remember his visit with delight, and I have so much to thank him for so many passages of Scripture have become clear by his explanation, so many truths become plain, which before were indistinct to me.

12th Thurs Father and Mother went down to Waialae this morning, he to complete the last two days session of the Teachers convention, and she, to rest and visit Halea School Exam.

13th Fri. Father and Mother returned tonight.

14th Sat. Went to Kalihi. Luella and Florence went to See Baldwin's to get some patterns, and Miss Carpenter went part way for the ride.

15th Sat. Went to hear Mrs. Green. She preached from John 2:10, a sermon against intemperance and lewdness.

20th Fri. We have been busy preparing articles to be sold at our examinations, for the last days.

Mother Bailey dined here today. She is going to live a while with her son Charles on his ranch.

23rd Sun. Florence and I went down to Waialae on sat. afternoon, and stopped at Laie Millong

In the evening we called on Mr. and Mrs. Gulick, and had an exceedingly pleasant time. Sabbath morning we went with Capt. Willoughby's family to hear Mrs. Gulick preach. Her text was Mat. 17: 5. - This is my beloved Son in whom I am well pleased; hear ye him. He spoke first directly about Jesus, then he showed what it is to know Jesus, finally he put the question, Do you know Jesus?

Florence and I returned home this forenoon. Mrs. Bailey spent a part of the day here. There is to be a Trustee meeting here tomorrow and Mrs. Bailey came up to attend it. Mr. Bishop also arrived before supper, from Laramie with Johnny.

24th Sust. Eight of the Trustees met here this A.M. Mrs. Thurston spent the afternoon here, with Helen.

25th Wed. Mr. Bishop went home today, while Johnny remains a few days longer. Minnie Hobson, who had just come home from Pinedale to spend her vacation, called this afternoon with Kate Gray.

27th Fri. Mrs. Bailey spent a part of the day.

28th Sat. Miss Carpenter went to spend a few hours with Mrs. Bailey. Luella and I called at Grove Ranch. All Capt. Hobson's family except Minnie have gone to stay a month at Cheyenne.

29th Sun. Mr. Green preached from Job 27: 5 & Job.

30th Mon. The subject of his discourse was, "Duty is a privilege to an innocent mind."

-st Tues.

July.

Went this afternoon to Roman's meeting. Mrs. Bailey comes over and Lucia rode with her to the church in her carriage.

10th Thurs. Our examination day. Several hundred were here, including both natives and foreigners. The exercises began at 9:30 A.M. and lasted until 1 o'clock P.M. In the dining room one of the tables was arranged for the fancy articles to be sold, and the other two were loaded with refreshments, also for sale. Immediately after the examination there was a rush for the dining room and for more than two hours those who sold the things were kept busy. Many of the girls went home for a short vacation, and tonight there are only 19 left.

11th Fri. Nearly 200 dollars were cleared in the fair yesterday. It is to be used to buy an organ for the school room. Two more girls went home today. Peter Amy, who is here now did our family washing, and the girls did a part of theirs. This P.M. the large girls went to ride.

12th Sat. The girls rode over to the Wilder place and gathered figs and strawberry quavas.

13th Sat. I stayed at home this morning, but went to church with the girls this P.M. I partook of the Lord's Supper today, the second time only.

1873.

July.

since I joined the church. The reasons of that absence from the Lord's table are best left obscure, but, thanks be to God, they are no longer valid. Oh that I might live in constant communion with my blessed Redeemer.

14th Mon. Father's and my birthday. I gave him a pair of slippers which I bought at the fair, and in the evening he sent me a note for 50 dollars, for teaching a drawing class, as it said. My parents are very generous and indulgent to me; their unworthy daughter.

15th Tues. Miss Carpenter is going to Honolulu this week to visit at Mrs. Gulick's. ~~Ende~~ We have been assisting her in making two new dresses and a wrapper. Some of the girls went up on the mountain with Suelia and Florence and gathered a lot of cherries and strawberries. Miss Arms has gone to Hauku to make a visit.

16th Wed. Yesterday I finished letters to Lucy and Samuel and today I wrote to Lucy Fariss, and began a letter to Fanny Gulick.

Mother and Miss Carpenter want to ride though the weather was misty. Alra Willfong was to be married this evening, and I suppose she is called Mrs. Gibbons this hour.

17th Thurs. Miss Carpenter went down to Kahului this morning to sail in the Moi tonight. I went to bathe with a part of the girls this

- P. M. and then to the Wilcox place, to get figs.
- 19th Fri. The larger girls started for a mountain party this morning at 3 o'clock, and came down this afternoon. They seem to have had a pleasant time.
- 19th Sat. Fuller and Florence went with the girls to Lihue. P. M. I went and visited Mrs. Bailey and Luella and Florence went somewhere they came back from Kalena.
- 20th Sat. Mrs. Green preached from John 6. 37. the last sermon I have heard from her. Three of the girls went with us to the foreign church. This P. M. I went with the girls to native church.
- 21st Mon. We did considerable cooking this A. M. in preparation for having the kitchen floor painted, which Peter Ama did this afternoon. Mrs. Smith of the Board of Education called, and went over the Seminary this forenoon.
- 25th Fri. I have spent the last few days in preparing sewing, cutting &c. Father Mother and Halei went to Lihue this afternoon.
- 26th Sat. Went to Kalena with the girls.
- 27th Sat. Went to native church this P. M. with the girls. Father went to Leokea this morning. The people of that place sent for him to go and administer the sacrament. He did not return until late this afternoon, and this evening told us about the meeting. Twenty persons were admitted into the church and several baptized.

1873

July

1st Mon Spent the forenoon in cleaning the pictures in the parlor, library room, the dining room and Mother's rooms. This afternoon, went with the girls to bathe in a pond below Alalele.

30th Wed. Mother and Mrs. Thurston went to call at Grove Ranch and Sunny Side. It is Lucy's birthday. She and Luella spent the afternoon at Mrs. Wilbur's 31st Thurs. Several girls have come back. Luella and Florence went with them to bathe this P.M. below Alalele.

August

1st Fri. Nine girls came back today making our number 37.

2nd Sat. Went with the girls to bathe and got fish. A native woman named Meareape, and her little boy came in the steamer from Hawaii today, to stay here a few weeks.

3rd Sat. Went with the girls to church.

1st Mon Several girls came today and Father commenced teaching school this morning. A large American mail arrived this afternoon. Among the letters was one to me; from Lucy, written at Flint where she is spending her summer vacation. She sent photographs of the University Hall and grounds.

1873.

August.

12th. Sat. Spent week. P. Anna who had painted up and put down again the matting. It looks greatly improved. Mother received a letter from Miss Carpenter yes. today in which she says she is improving and will come back in two weeks.

Father and Mother teach school. I teach Luella & Florence in arithmetic. Florence in grammar and Lorin and Luella in Latin. John ^{Smith} came from Hawaii last week to live here a while, and work for Father. Mrs. Hale returned to Hilo today taking home Annie Kaapia.

14th Thurs. Mrs. Black & her boy and Bella Cornwell came this afternoon to stay here and go up on the mountain with a party tomorrow. They went up this evening to a "Magic Lantern" show given by Mr. Clark.

15th Fri. The party started from here about noon. This P.M. we arranged the parlor, which P. Anna painted Wed. and he cleaned and painted mother's room this P.M.

16th Sat. Our guests came down from the mountain this P.M. and spent the evening at Mrs. Chastellier.

17th Sun. Went to church with Mrs. Black and Florence this morning and with the girls this afternoon.

1873.

August.

18th Mon. The ladies returned to Waikapu this morning. We covered a lounge for Miss Carpenter this afternoon. Later this P. M. Dr Adams, Seagoon of the Costa Rica his wife, and a young man by the name of Lee came and asked for lodgings to night with the intention of going up on the mountain in time to see the sun rise tomorrow morning.

19th Tues. It was raining this morning so that the party did not get started until 9 o'clock. A short note came by the "Moai" from Miss Carpenter saying that she would come up to Maui in the Steamer.

20th Wed. The party spent the night on the mountain, had a fine view this morning, got down to dinner, and went to Wailuku this afternoon, by express-man. Miss Carpenter came up this forenoon from Wailuku where she spent the night. Mr. Castle ate dinner here. An American mail came this afternoon, but all from Lucy was a few letters written by Samuel to her, on his tour in California for books. One was written from Wyoming, Ill. where he was sick of fever & ague. Mr. Theo Gulick sent me a very good letter by Miss Carpenter.

1873.

August.

21st Thurs. The washing was delayed this week on account of the rain and the girls ironed today. Father Neostes and Florence went to Kankakee this afternoon.

23rd Sat. Went to Helena with the girls.

24th Sat. Went to the foreign church this morning. Mr. Green preached from Acts 2:37.

25th Mon. Commenced teaching a class in Arithmetic.

27th Wed. Mrs. Hobson and Anna Bailey called.

28th Thurs. commenced reciting to Miss Carpenter. Went to Lucy and to Mr. Gulick.

29th Fri. Mrs. Hobson brought Mrs. Pogue up in her carriage to make a visit her.

30th Sat. Rainy all day so that we did not go to bathe. This afternoon Mr. Sharatt came up in his buggy with his little boy and Willie Bailey. Mrs. Pogue wished to call on Mrs. Green, so Willie drove her over, while Mr. Sharatt staid to supper. There was a magnificent sunset this evening; the whole western sky was glowing with brilliant light.

31st Sat. Went to the foreign church with Miss Carpenter and Mrs. Pogue.

Mr. Green preached from Acts 2:37, 28, 29. Another month is gone, and as I enter a new one, I hope to make more improvement.

September.

- 1st Mon. Mrs. Harcost and Mrs. Everett came here to dinner. Later, Mrs. Gray came in her carriage and took Mrs. Poole back to Groce Ranch.
- 2nd Tues. Mother and Miss Carpenter rode up to Mrs. Thurston this evening.
- 3rd Wed. Florence and I went out for a little horseback ride this afternoon. The American mail today brought a long letter from Lucy, also one written by Samuel and a postal card from him.
- 4th Thurs. Wrote to Lucy this P. M.
- 5th Fri. Fannie Weeks' mother came today in the steamer from Hawaii to make a visit.
- 6th Sat. Mother, Miss Carpenter and Mrs. Thurston went to Capt. Hebron's this afternoon and returned in the evening. Inella and Florence spent the time with Helen Thurston. I went to Kalena with the girls this evening. I had a good talk with Father. He gave me some new ideas on education, and great ones also.
- 7th Sun. Mr. Silver has staid here to day. It was rainy this morning so none of us went to church. I went to the native church this P. M. Mother has been quite unwell.
- 8th Tues. Miss Maggie Faray, Mrs. Thurston's niece came in the steamer from Honolulu.

17th Tues. We all went with the girls to the woods at Paia and spent the day. Mrs. Thurston and family went later, and we had a delightful time, picnicing under the trees.

- 20th Sat. Went with the girls to Kalena.
- 21st Sat. Went to hear Mr. Green preach.
- 23rd Tues. It is rainy so that the clothes have not dried.
- 24th Wed. Ironing went hard on account of weather but the girls got through with it late. Florence and I walked down to Mrs. Willards. Miss Gray was calling there.
- 25th Thurs. The "Mei" brought a mail from Honolulu. I received a letter from Mr. Theo Gulick.

- 16th Thurs. Visited Lake, and Miss Polly Night, from Mono, called this afternoon. South winds are having now and many of us have taken cold in the change of weather.

- 18th Sat. Mrs. Thurston and family came down to dinner and spent the afternoon.
- 19th Went with Father to Reckea where he called to administer the Sacrament. Several were received into the church and several children baptised. We were gone all day. Starting after breakfast.
- 20th Fri. Father Alexander ate dinner with us to day. He reported to us another grand-daughter by Emily Baldwin, Mrs. Wilbur called this P.M.
- 21st Sat. Did not go to Kalena because of rain. An American mail arrived today from the Murray the first we have received for more than seven weeks. We receive a letter from both Samuel and Lucy, written soon before the close of their summer vacation, the former at Ann Arbor and the latter at Lentownville.
- 22nd Mon. The oil paints for which Mother sent to San Fran by Mrs. Adams arrived today.
- Mrs. James Alexander is going to teach Luella and I and also Minnie Hedron. I rode down and called on Minnie and then on Mrs. Alexander. She will not be ready to begin before two weeks, as she is going to Valdaluca for a visit first. Miss Mary Wright came up to make a visit of a day or two.
- 23rd Tues. Maggie and Helen came down to play croquet, this afternoon.

I received a letter from Mrs. Bullock, & Miss C. gone from Miss McClellan saying that she would come to Meekawas right back 17th. Mr. Sam Alexander sent men down to the bay to help load the vessel and the capt. has consented to go tomorrow on Mrs. Thurston's account.

18th Sat. Mrs. L. & Helen went to Kahului and the vessel sailed at 4 P.M. Mr. S. Anderson's family also went to Honolulu. Maggie and David Tapu are to spend nights here during Mrs. L's absence.

19th Sat. A. M. Preache a sermon ready by Rev. Green on John 6:10. P. M. At the Native church the Lord's Supper.

20th Mon. Stormy, so that Maggie did not come down tonight.

21st Tues. Received sad news from Honolulu. Robert Thurston died last Friday. Mrs. L. did not reach Honolulu until Monday. Her body was kept on ice until she should see it. The funeral was appointed for this P.M. What sorrow has fallen on that

household! God help them in their deep affliction, Maggie is greatly grieved, and she did not come down this evening.

22nd Wed. On account of stormy weather the washing was not done until today, and ironing is delayed until tomorrow.

Only ten girls are left and more are to go tomorrow. Mrs. Bailey came up yesterday to stay till Sat.

10. Fri. Mrs. Bailey & Fearn went into the woods to seek ferns. Mr. Gulick operated on Gov. Kapina.

11. Sat. Miss Carpenter went to Hilo with Mr. Bailey & intending to go to Hawaii by the steamer, to spend her vacation. P. Mr. Negishi went with Mr. G. and called on Mrs. J. Bailey and the Fears.

12. Sun. Mrs. G. preached from John 1:21 a real gospel sermon. Pakukula, who is staying here with her husband, went to church with the girls P.M.

13. Mon. Washing. P. Mr. Luella & L.

went with Mr. Gulick to the Wilcox place among to call at Mrs. Green's houses. Evening. Mrs. G. finished my teeth, and is doing work on those of Luella & Florence, with some work from others who require it. I hope there will be many who will have him do dental work for them in order that he may make a longer visit. I am 18 today. Mother gave me a gold ring, and Father automatic me very much by a note for \$200.00 I hope I may grow more in the image of Jesus as I grow older in natural life. P.M. Florence & C. Wilcox rode to the saw-mill with Mrs. Gulick.

15 Wed. Lived at P.M. Mrs. & Mrs. Alexander called. Mrs. S. rode out alone visiting C. Bailey's ranch. We hope that Mrs. S. may be the means of leading him to Jesus, and that the Spirit will show him a Divine Savior.

16 Thurs. Mrs. Eliza Alexander came up from Haiku and had her teeth examined. She has considerable work to be done. P.M. Mrs. G. went to Mrs. Green's dinner. Luella went alone to parish.

Because I was not able to get a stretcher made for a new picture, this eve. spent a delightful time with Mrs. G. in reading the Bible.

17 Fri. Mrs. J. Badley began to have her teeth filled. P.M. Rode down to Haiku, as far as Mrs. Spencer's with Mrs. G. who went there to dinner. Eve. Wrote to Mrs. Gulick.

19 Sun. Mr. Green preached at the Foreign church on John 4: 9 P.M. Went with the girls to meeting and heard Mrs. Gulick speak from 1 Corin 6, vs 12.

20 Mon. At Mr. Washington's painting. Brought home my picture. Began painting from a little chamois fruit.

21st Tues. Mrs. Green's family, Mrs. Green & Mrs. Mrs. Gulick, Goyne & Lorin started for the top of the mountain.

22 Wed. Father, Mother & Rachel rode down to Haiku in Mrs. Green's carriage which is to be repaired very. Father rode the horse back this eve. The mountain party returned this P.M. having had a fine time. They were especially successful in finding beautiful specimens of silver-swords. Mr. Green & Lorin descended the crater, & did not reach here till dark.

July.

Mrs. H. Alexander came up to have dental work done while she stays here a few days. Mrs. Heavey, Amy B., Dorcas Richardson with her brother and sister & Keifs Hutchinson called.

23. Thurs. Rev. I worked all day on Mrs. Alexander's teeth, putting in silver fillings. P.M. Mr. & Mrs. Willfong rode up from Heikin to spend the night here. Walked over to Mrs. Green's with Mrs. Willfong & in the evening Mrs. & Mrs. Green called here. Mrs. Tellman also called.

24. Fri. Capt. & Mrs. Willfong returned this A.M. Mrs. Alexander went home this P.M. Mrs. Gwlick & we girls called in the forenoon, Mrs. Needham, and at Mrs. Wilfong. They family returned today to the house which they used to occupy. We did not see her because she had retired.

25. Sat. Luella went with a small party to spend the day in ^{Amherst} Wm. came up.

26. Sun. Mr. Mrs. Spear preached. I did not go. P.M. Had a pleasant meeting with the high girls.

27. Mon. Mother returned this P.M. Lorin & I are expecting to go to Seijo by the steamer tomorrow. Spent the day in making preparations.

1874

July Heilo.

27 Wed. We reached here this A.M. at 11 o'clock after a passage, somewhat rough, but otherwise quite agreeable. We are to stay at Ed. Hitchcock's while we remain in Heilo, probably two weeks. After a delicious bath, and lunch I wrote home and then called at Miss Loam's where Miss Carpenter & Clara Mosley are staying. Saw Miss Haven who leaves today with Frank Damon on the steamer for Honau. Eve. Went to a festival in the new school-house, where refreshments were sold for the purpose of getting means to pay for desks etc. Miss Arms called to see me this P.M. Meet Mrs. Lydgate this eve. and he kindly offered to assist me in marking my ferns.

28 Thurs. Florence 14th birthday. A.M. Did a little sewing. After lunch went with Clara & Mary H. up to David Hitchcock's house, where we got Ella to go with us to Waialuku valley. We bathed and then rambled about for ferns. Eve. Went with Lorrin to prayer-meeting. Mrs. Lyman conducted. The special subject - trusting in the Lord. Only a few were there, but I was

1874

refused. John Lygate expressed such a simple trust, and seemed to have such freedom from bondage, that I was both surprised and delighted.

31st Fri. Mr. Ed. H. went to Papachio yesterday to answer an inquest, and returned this morning at 10^o. An aged man & his wife were murdered probably last Mon. by one who wished to secure their money. The guilty one has been suspected but not yet detected. A. N. visited the Union School.

August

1st Sat. Rained this A. M. After lunch went to call at Mrs. Coan's and was asked to stay to dinner. Called on Miss Ams. After dinner went with Clara, Lorin and the children to ride, going on the seashore out as far as Cocoanut Island, then up to the Cemetery angular.

2nd Sun. Went to the foreign church this A. M. Dr. Wetmore read a sermon on Luke 3:12. addressed to children. P. M. attended communion service at Mrs. Coan's church. Eve. Went to Monthly concert meeting. John Lygate in the chair. 3rd Per. 2. Roman Catholic countries especially considered.

1874

August

3 Aug. A. M. Went up to David Kitchcock's. Ella took me around in the garden, and gave me several different kinds of seeds. P. M. Went with Rely H. to "Regina's" falls, and then went to see Thukapee, in the valley. After dinner called on Mrs. Fred. Lyman, & Miss Richardson coming back, I met Em. Napoleon, after walking a little ways we met Mrs. Coan. Miss C. & Clara, and we went with the two latter to Philuku bridge. I was asked to spend the night at Mrs. Coan's, and I accepted.

4 Tues. Rode up to Pepe falls, with Clara, Ella & Lorraine. We staid some time, and gathered beautiful ferns. I borrowed a mule from Rufus Lyman's and rode astride.

5 Wed. A. M. Was asked to go with the Coans to Cocoanut Island, but it rained and the party was given up. During the day I went later and visited Mrs. Lyman's school. After lunch I went with Clara to call on Lily Lydgate and see Mrs. Lydgate's school. After dinner called with Clara at Mrs. Tolson's and David Kitchcock's.

1874.

August.

Mr. Ed H. went again to the scene of the murder yesterday morn. & returned this evg. Loran & I expect to go and visit the volcano tomorrow. The horses started at 6.30 A.M. and after a long ride (29 miles) we reached the Volcano about at 2.30 P.M. Had a sulphur bath, which was very refreshing. The weather was foggy early in the evening, but later it cleared away and we could see the fires of the volcano, quite distinctly in the distance.

7th This At 8 A.M. we descended into the crater, went to the south lake, Halemaumau, where we could see the fire in three different pits, the one near which we stood, showing the most activity. After watching it some time we went to the Devil's pots where the lava flowed in an underground stream, which could be seen through holes or caves on the surface. Turning them in a different direction we crossed on an overflow of lava to a large cave, which had evidently been a huge under ground cavern, but

1874

August.

the surface fell in at one place, by means of an earthquake. Here we found stalactites & stalagmites of black lava, of all shapes and sizes, many of them covered with salt crystallizations. We were in the crater six hours in all. Soon after returning to the Volcano House, Mrs. Cude with Lora Hitchcock, Sally King and Miss Payne arrived there from Kauai on their way to Hilo.

After dinner Mrs. Stackpole, a young man living there, went with me to find some fine, and to visit the sulphur beds, where were the most exquisitely delicate crystals of sulphur in the steam holes, as fine as snow. In the eve. the girls had a jolly time, toasting bread at the open fire place and playing "Jack alive." Mrs. Gillmor, our kind host, brought in strawberries, and we enjoyed a delicious treat.

8:30 A.M. Set out on our return from the Kilauea at 5:30 A.M., and rode leisurely to favor our horses. The other party which started at 7 overtook us at the woods seven

August

1 miles from Heilb. I am very little fatigued by the excursions etc. Called with Loring at Mrs. Coans and Dr. Hyatt's. The latter was called away soon after we went in, and John Lydgate called while we were there. He expects to go on a surveying excursion Newf. to be absent several days so that he will not be able to mark my ferns for me.

9 Sun Went to Sun. Sc. at the native church - afternoon attended at the foreign church. D. Hitchcock read a discourse on Rom. 12:11. P. Mc. went to Sun. Sc. at the same church.

10 Mgr. Mrs. Hitchcock is unwell, and I helped about the housework this A.M. After lunch went to Mrs. Coans to visit until Wednesday. Eve. Called at Dr. Hyatt's and he showed us one of his fern collections of also some most beautiful Lusaj ferns which had been given to him.

11 Tues. A.M. Went up to Mrs. Hitchcock and arranged my ferns, for tomorrow marked some of them. Made some tilted edging for Miss' ferns. P. Mc. Went to supper at David's Lt. with

Mrs. & Mrs. Com. Miss C. of Clara.
 12 Wed. Went with Miss L. & called at Fred. Lyman's. The little boy then guided us to see the "Water-falls" in the valley. We rambled around and then came up into Mrs. Reed's gardens, and looked at his plants. Went to David Hile and got dried blue &c. and then called on Martha Lyman and Emma P. Mr. Meiss C. took me to call at Mrs. Meiss' to see his stuffed birds, and pictures & then to Mrs. A. K. Lily Buffins' sister I was very much pleased to find such nice boys & so neatly kept by her. The "Reliance" arrived at 2.30 P.M. bringing the representatives from Legislature. George Castle came up to teach in the foreign school. P.M. packed my trunk. At 3 o'clock dined at Mrs. Com. Miss C. of Clara went down town with us, as it was early we waited a while at Mrs. Lydgate's, and then going down towards the wharf we waited at a store again. Finally the steamer got off at 6 o'clock, an hour later than we had expected.

August

13. Thurs. Launched at Punalulu & after wards at the sea landing. P. M. sailed along a most barren & rugged coast of "Ipalohoe". Stopped at four different places during the night. To name, Representatives, one of which was Kealakekua bay.
14. Fri. At daylight, bearing Kauai, beautiful view of Mauna Loa, Hiva-lae & Mauna Kea, and a brilliant sunrise. At 8 A.M. anchored at Kawailoa. Lorrin & I went ashore. Frank Damon, who had come from Waimea the day previous met us at the wharf and took us upstairs in his cabinning everything stored. After a pleasant respite from the voyage, of one or two hours, we went off to the steamer, Mr. Damon on his way to Honolulu. At Mehuokon Heist &c began & letara night came a-farad, the former course for Hailea. The Capt. came across the Hawaian channel by sail and reached Ma-kena at dark. We lay there all night and the next morning 15. Sat. Mr. & Mrs. Wilder came on board at 7 A.M. from Capt. Mahees

 He reached Hatalala at 10 A.M.
 Found Kahoolawe with horses found.
 Reached home at 1 P.M. Mr. Hers.
 Black & Mary Siders are visiting here.
 Luella was gone with them to ride.

 preach. I had meeting with the
 girls at 11 A.M. and went to
 church with them & Mr. Father reached
 home this eve. quite exhausted.

 down to "Grove Ranch" Grandma
 Bailey, who long comes up to Charley's
 ranch spent the afternoon. Mrs. Han-
 ecost & Amy called. Mr. Black came
 near eve. from Lahaina to go down
 with his wife to Honolulu.
- 21 Fri. Mr. & Mrs. Black, Mr. Siders & Mr.
 Great's family went down on the steamer.

August.

- 22 Sat. Went with the girls to father.
- 23 Sun. Went to the native church with the school thru P. Ma.
- 24 Mon. Mr. Bailey came up to stay till Wed. P. Ma. cleaned Miss C's room.
- 25 Tues. Mr. Bailey went out to gather ferns. He wished me to go with him but a horse could not be found. This eve. he returned with his case full of most beautiful specimens of many kinds.
- 26 Wed. Mr. Bailey left after breakfast. An auction sale of Lee Louie goods. Father went to it & purchased a lot of things. Even Master to Mrs. Cran.
- 27 Thurs. Luella & Florence & Loren began studying again this week, according to Meotus.
- 28 Fri. Mrs. Giles & her children came up from Mrs. Vibens. to make a visit here.
- 29 Sat. Miss Carpenter returned from Kilo on the Steamer, & reached here thru P. Ma. Mr. Giles came up from Wailuku to spend Sunday with his family.
- 30 Sun. I did not go out to meeting.
- 31 Mon. Mrs. Vibens came up to dinner, & spent part of the afternoon. Miss C began teaching, Mr. Hitchcock called.

1874

September

1st Tues. Miss Karen & Lottie Alexander called on their way from the mountain house to Sunny Side. P. W. Morris went up to call back with Mrs. Bailey. Florence & I went to Haleakala School to see Mr. Hitchcock's ferns, & to call on Maggie, American mail. Long letters from Sam. & Lucy, 26 pages in all. I received a letter from Harry Gillick also.

2nd Wed. Went with Miss Mary & Charles Alexander & Miss. Goan far into the woods. After reaching the house built of bark where the cattle sometimes camp out, we fanned & picniced & then went on through the dense woods & underbrush in a track which had been cut through by Hamakua. We reached Opuhi hill near Kipiki valley at sun down. Here the rest of the party turned off on the road to Waikuk & I rode home alone. Spent the evening in arranging my ferns for preserving.
