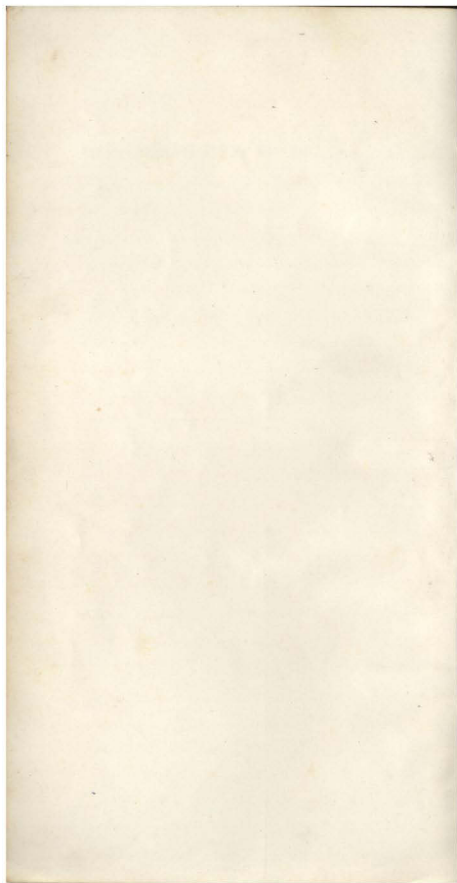

1870.

July

Lahaina, Hawaii.

Thurs. 14<sup>th</sup> This is the fourteenth anniversary of my birthday. I have been graciously spared to live fourteen years in this beautiful world, and my life now opens before me with the best of prospects, and I have very much to be thankful for. I am neither wealthy or talented, but I trust I have something of far greater value than these. I feel that I have a Heavenly Father, who cares for me, and a trust in him, which increases every day. To him would I devote my heart, my life, my strength, my all.

Fri. 15<sup>th</sup> I have studied today and performed my usual round of duties. I do not find time to do all I wish to, and at the close of each day, it does not seem satisfactorily completed. I study Latin, Algebra, and Principles of Common Things. At sunset this evening I went with Luella and Florence to see Loni, our native woman, who is sick.

Sat. 16<sup>th</sup> Another week has gone, and as I enter upon a new one, I hope that it will be spent in a more satisfactory manner than the past one. Prof. Kiggins came up this morning to give us music lessons, as is his wont every Saturday. Annie Halstead has spent the day here, and when she returned home, I went down with her, to take a portfolio, which I made for her mother some time ago.

Sat. 17<sup>th</sup> This morning Father preached from several

different texts. The sermon was addressed particularly to the Freshmen class. He explained to them the character of a well matured man, and showed them that the great aim of this school is, to educate and mature men who will be able to occupy high stations in this nation.

Mr Bishop led the Bible class this afternoon.

He is taking in course the history of the family kings. I am commencing to memorize the book of James, and recite it at family Sabbath school.

Wed. 20<sup>th</sup> Wrote a composition on, *The Benefits of Traveling*, and this afternoon went over to the chapel with my brother and sisters to the singing class. It is the second lesson that Prof. Whipple has given the students this term.

Thurs. 21<sup>st</sup> This morning Loo came to work again, after an absence of about a week. A vessel came in, bringing a large foreign mail, but to our disappointment there were no letters from Lucy and Samuel.

Fri. 22<sup>nd</sup> Mother has been quite sick today. It seems like the beginning of one of her sick turns, which she used to have quite frequently, but she has not <sup>had</sup> one for two years. This afternoon we received two large boxes of pineapples from Hawaii, and began to cut them up for the purpose of bottling.

Sat. 23<sup>rd</sup> This morning we finished cutting the pineapples, and this afternoon put up twenty-five bottles for Mother is no better, having been confined to her bed all day.

Sat. 24<sup>th</sup> Mr. Bishop preached from Ps. 11<sup>th</sup> ch. 1st to 6<sup>th</sup> ver. He described in his discourse the Great Exemplar, exhorting his hearers to embrace Him as their pattern. Father conducted the Bible class. We are now in the bosom of Exodus under his teaching. I have spent a day of real pleasure, and I hope that the sweet influences which have surrounded me, may strengthen me for the working days of this week.

Wed. 27<sup>th</sup> Wrote two notes, one to Miss H. B. Judd, and one to Lizzie Pogue. I was unable to go to singing school, for Mother is not quite well enough to have the care of household affairs yet.

Fri. 27<sup>th</sup> Mrs. Laurence came up and made a long call this afternoon.

Sat. 30<sup>th</sup> Florence is ten years old today. The students have had a feast, ~~tried~~ to celebrate their Independence day. Tomorrow, the 31<sup>st</sup>, is the Sabbath they have observed it a day before. A vessel came in from Somerville, this afternoon, bringing Rev. Mr. Fiske and his family, who are to make a visit at Mr. Bishop's.

Sat. 31<sup>st</sup> Mr. Fiske preached this morning from Rev. 2<sup>nd</sup> 14<sup>th</sup>: <sup>Let</sup> him that overcometh will I give to eat of the hidden manna. The Bible class was held by Mr. Bishop. We have commenced today to learn the shorter catechism, and recite it to Father at evening Sabbath school.

Mon. 1<sup>st</sup> Mr. and Mrs. Forbes came over and called this evening. He intends to start on journey around this island tomorrow.

Tues. 2<sup>nd</sup> Mrs. Halsestead has been up and spent a part of the day with Mother.

Wed. 3<sup>rd</sup> This evening a vessel came in bringing a large letter from Samuel. It was written from Philip Kisti. He gave a description of their journey overland, and though they narrowly escaped having trouble with the Indians, they had arrived safely at uncle Lyman's, and seemed to be enjoying themselves.

The Honolulu dentist, Dr. Whitney came to Lahaina in this vessel, accompanied by his wife. He was injured by a fall from his horse a few months ago and he wishes to recruit at Lahainaluna. He was so unwell however after leaving the vessel that he remains in Lahaina tonight.

Thurs. 4<sup>th</sup> Dr. and Mrs. Whitney came up before breakfast. They intend to stay here until he is well enough to go to Capt. Keaker's plantation for whom he is engaged to perform some dentistry.

Fri. 5<sup>th</sup> This evening we went to hear Kauealoha, the Micronesian missionary, who spoke at the chapel. He gave a brief history of the progress of the mission at Micronesia, and then intimated the students to give heed to the call which came from there for more missionaries. He was very earnest in his manner, and he shows that his

heart is in the work. He hopes to get some missionaries, and return in a few months.

Sat. 6<sup>th</sup> Dr. Whitney is worse today having intense pain in his head. Mother, Luella, and Florence went down town this afternoon. I feel much in need of a day of rest.

Sat. 7<sup>th</sup> Father preached from Co. 5. 485. and Ep. 4. 25. Mr. Bishop conducted the Bible class.

Sun. 9<sup>th</sup> Mrs. Whitney went to Lohaina with Mrs. Bishop this afternoon, to attend the christening of Mr. Mason's child.

Wed. 11<sup>th</sup> Wrote a letter to Samuel and Lucy. We have been blessed with a succession of refreshing showers this afternoon.

Thurs. 12<sup>th</sup> Went to walk this evening upon the bank above us. We are having sultry summer weather.

Fri. 12<sup>th</sup> Rose up to the Bible House with Dr. S. Mrs. Whitney. Mr. Bishop started for Waikuku.

Sat. 13<sup>th</sup> After finishing our music lessons we girls went up into, and dumbled about, in the Lohaina valley. Mr. Forbes has returned from his tour, and brought news of the burning of Capt. Hobron's sawmill at Makawao.

Sat. 14<sup>th</sup> Mr. Forbes preached from Ps. 27. 11. The Bible class was led by Father.

Mon. 15<sup>th</sup> Mr. Bishop returned today from Waikuku. Dr. Whitney has today put the finishing touches into an upper set of teeth which he has been

making for Luther, commenced filling some of my teeth, which have begun to decay.

16<sup>th</sup> Tues. Dr. Whitney continued operating on my teeth. I feel unwell, from a sore throat this evening.

17<sup>th</sup> Wed. My teeth are finished excepting one little filling, and Dr. Whitney has begun Luella and Florence's.

18 Thurs. Our guests are making preparations for going around to Capt. Moske's place in a whale boat, but the plan appears rather dubious to Mrs. Whitney.

19 Frid. They have changed their minds this morning, and think they can bear the journey over the mountain better, than Luther and Mother offering to go with them. The whole party started at about noon, their trunks going in the whale boat.

Mr. Forbes with his family started in a vessel for Honolulu this evening.

21<sup>st</sup> Sat. Kuaca preached from James 1<sup>st</sup> 21<sup>st</sup>. Mr. Bishop led Bible class. Have been reading "Element of Rome" to the children.

23 Tues. My parents returned a little after noon. They found great excitement, for all that Capt. Moske saved from his first fire has been again burned, and as these fires are incendiary, no one feels safe.

24 Wed. Wrote a composition on "Gossip," and went to singing school this afternoon.

1870

August.

26. Fri. Mother went down town this afternoon to help Mrs. Houghton, who is preparing to go to Honolulu.

27. Sat. Received a large American mail, and among others, a long letter from Lucy, written at Springfield Mass. They were intending to go from there to Boston and New York, and then to Ohio.

28. Sat. Father preached from Ep. 4.8. Mr. Bishop led the Bible class.

29. Mon. I feel unwell today, being oppressed with lassitude and weakness.

31. Wed. Mother spent the afternoon again in helping Mrs. Houghton.

September.

1. Thurs. Mr. Kedham has been up here and made a long call this evening.

3. Sat. Mr. Dwight with his daughter from Koolohai spent several hours with us. Late this P.M. some ladies called on Mother. Lono went to Lanai today, to make a long visit.

4. Sat. Mr. Bishop preached from Ep. 6.3.3. This P.M. communion service was kept in the chapel. Several young men were received by letter from various churches on the different islands I trust that I have experienced a day of blessing.

September.

5. Mon. Went to Monthly concert this evening.
6. Tues. Received letters from Miss Gads and Minnie Hobson.
7. Wed. Wrote a composition on "Sleep". Mother has spent the day down with Mrs. Waiker.
8. Thurs. Have had several refreshing showers this afternoon. We need a long drive.
10. Sat. When we children had finished our music lessons we started on horseback to take a jaunt. We first went up into Mount Ball, down on the south side, and into Kanawha valley.
11. Sat. Father preached from 1 Cor. 22. 26. Mr. Bishop conducted the Bible class. Truly our weeks are crowned with Sabbaths, and our lives would be dreary indeed without these seasons of spiritual rest and communion.
14. Wed. Wrote a letter to Lucy.
16. Fri. Received an American mail but nothing from the absent ones.
17. Sat. Harriet Achorn came up this morning, to stay until Monday morning.
18. Sat. Mr. Bishop preached from Rom. 8. 14. Father conducted Bible class. We have recited the ten commandments. Many new thoughts have been suggested to me today, and I have learned some lessons which I hope will be of much profit to me.

September.

- 21<sup>st</sup> Wed. Wrote a composition on "Habits".
- 22<sup>nd</sup> Thurs. Kuaca, who went down to Honolulu a few weeks ago to be married, arrived here this morning by a schooner, with his bride. She is a girl from Miss Bingham school, is well educated, and is much beloved by her teachers and schoolmates.
- 23<sup>rd</sup> Fri. Received letters from Samuel & Lucy, who were at Aunt Caroline's, and about to enter Oberlin. At about noon Father started for Wabeswa, having been called there to a trustee meeting.
- 24<sup>th</sup> Sat. The wind is blowing violently this eve.
- 25<sup>th</sup> Sat. It has rained all day so that we have not been able to go to church.
- 26<sup>th</sup> Mond. Father returned home this morning arriving at about ten o'clock.
- 27<sup>th</sup> Tues. Mrs. Kuaca spent the afternoon here. We are very much pleased with her.
- 30<sup>th</sup> Fri. Threefourths of this year is gone, and as I review the path in which I have been led, it is with thankfulness. I have made many failures and mistakes, but I still have a steady aim before me to which I must press yet closer. O, that the remaining quarter may be spent peculiarly for Him whom I adore!

1870

October.

- 1<sup>st</sup> Sat. Charles Baldwin from Kohala called here this afternoon.
- 2<sup>d</sup> Sab. Mrs. Bishop preached from Ps. 5.45. Her chiefly dwelt on the infinite holiness of God. The Bible this afternoon was on the ten commandments. I have today conceived of higher ideas of the greatness of my God.
- 3<sup>d</sup> Mon. Went to Monthly Concert this eve.
- 5<sup>th</sup> Wed. Wrote a composition on Composition.
- 8<sup>th</sup> Sat. This week is ended, and one which has been accompanied, with peculiar blessings.
- 9<sup>th</sup> Sab. Father preached from Ps. 66. 18. The principal heads of his sermon were:  
1<sup>st</sup> How much of the prayers which is made in the world is useless, because the petitioners regard iniquity in their hearts.
- 2<sup>d</sup> Christ's chief mission on the earth was to root out evil from the hearts of mankind, and to establish holiness.
- 11<sup>th</sup> Tues. We had the pleasure of waking this morning to find the new Kilanea in the harbor. Mrs. Moku came from Honolulu in her. Her husband died last Sabbath, and she brought the corpse with her. Mother and Father went down to call on the afflicted widow.

October.

1871

12. Wed. Louisa is thirteen years old today. Mr. Bishop and Kuasa went down to Moku's funeral which took place at 4 o'clock P. M.
14. Fri. Prof Higgins came up and gave us music lessons this afternoon, as he has to move tomorrow to a new house.
16. Sat. Mr. Bishop preached from 2 Cor. 7.10. and Father led the Bible class. Mr. Byram is very low.
17. Mon. Received a long letter from Samuel, written from Okechi, giving a description of their school and other affairs.
18. Tues. The Kitauca brought three Chinamen from Waikae who wish to enter this school. Mrs. Bishop takes one for a cook, and Mother takes the two others. Mr. Bishop started by the steamer for Honolulu this afternoon.
23. Sat. The Lahaina parish being left without a pastor by the death of Moku's Father and Kuasa have determined for the present to perform the duties of a minister. Father went down and conducted the services this morning while Kuasa preached up here. His text was from Gen. 4.1. A good name is better than precious ointment. He is a very fine speaker.

1870

October.

24. Mon. Lavin and Luella have spent the day in the woods gathering quavas and some home with over two bushels of them.
25. Tues. Received a long letter from Lucy. Mrs. Bishop returned in the steamer, bringing his sister and her two children, and also Mr. Reppind Hitchcock, school examiner.
27. Thurs. Mr. Hitchcock has been examining the schools all about, from Ohuwahu to Lahaia and Latai, for the past two days, and tomorrow he goes on towards Halehahua.
29. Sat. There has been a very large freshet down in the valley this afternoon.
30. Sab. It has been given me today to conceive in a small degree how deeply seated is the sin of my heart, and with humility and penitence I consecrate myself anew to my Saviour, in whom is my only hope, with an earnest resolve, with His help, to root this evil out of my heart more diligently, and to walk purely and steadfastly before my Ancient Witness. Father preached from Rom. 7. 13. a sermon which will be effectual I hope in the hearts of more than one of those who heard.
31. Mon. Another month gone so quickly!  
 "So teach us to number our days, that we may apply our hearts unto wisdom."

1870.

November

- 2<sup>nd</sup> Wed. Write a composition on Air.
- 3<sup>rd</sup> Thurs. Went with Luella and Florence to see Father working with the boys at the <sup>head</sup> of the upper watercourse, which was entirely torn away by the freshet.
4. Fri. We girls went down in the valley to bathe, as we have not had the privilege of a bathhouse since the freshet. After dinner went up again to see the progress of the water course. Father expects to get the water down tomorrow.
5. Sat. Went down town with my parents, and called, for the first time, on Miss Florence Freeman, and also on Mrs. Halstead, to thank her for a present of a dress which she sent me yesterday.
6. Sab. Mr. Bishop preached from Rev. 3.20. This evening I expressed to my dear parents my faith in Christ, and asked their advice as to making a public profession of it. My father gently counseled me, and said that he would have me join the visible church, as he believed that I had been brought into the family of Jesus Christ. My heart is thrilled with unspeakable joy. It is so sweet to feel that "my Beloved is mine and I am His!"
7. Mon. Went this evening to Monthly Concert.

November.

9. Wed. Wrote to Lucy.
13. Sat. Father preached from 1 Sam. 16. 23.  
 Mr. Bishop led the Bible class.
15. Tues. Received letters from the absent.
16. Wed. Wrote to Samuel and Lucy.
20. Sat. Mr. Bishop preached from Ps 36. 1.  
 The last sermon which we shall hear at  
 Lahainaluna until next term. Father was  
 so ill from rheumatism, that Mr. Bishop  
 led the Bible class also.
21. Mon. Mother is preparing to have Luella &  
 I to go with Father around this island, start  
 in next Wednesday, the first day of va-  
 cation. Our vacation begins today.

December.

30. Fri. What a long time has elapsed since  
 I last communicated with you, my Journal!  
 During this time I have been to Hana, and  
 back again, which journey occupied two weeks.  
 Then two or three more were spent in preparing  
 for Christmas, and this week, I have com-  
 menced my studies again. This term I  
 take, Science of Common Things, Andrews  
 Caesar, and begin Greek. We have had a  
 vacation in music also, and this term Prof  
 Higgins has changed his day for giving us  
 lessons, from Saturday, to Friday afternoon.

1870.

December.

31<sup>st</sup> Sat. The year is ended, but is it finished? Have I reaped in this year all that I could or ought to have reaped? Have I spent every month, week, and day, of this year, as months, weeks, and days that never come back, should be spent? Alas! I am weighed, but am found wanting. As I review the past, it seems full of failures and shortcomings, and, not living up to my high privileges, but still, I review it with thankfulness. In that I have been kept throughout the year in so much comfort, and with nothing to disturb or molest. But I have a greater reason for thankfulness, for in this year my heart has been expanded, and my eyes have been opened, to see and understand my relation to my God, and I have been permitted to taste of the sweetness which springs therefrom. Surely this has been a year of jubilee to me! The past is gone never to be recalled, but the hopeful future is before me, and, though I cannot tell what it may be, yet I am perfectly content to leave it in the hands of One who has so wisely dealt out the past to me. O, that in the coming year I may live closer to him!

1871.

January.

1<sup>st</sup> Sat. This year is commenced with a Sabbath, and I hope that the influence of this Sabbath may continue through the year. Mr. Bishop preached from Ps. 90. 12, a New Year's sermon. He also led the Bible Class, for Father had to attend both services down to Lahaina, Kuaca having gone to Kaanapali.

4<sup>th</sup> Wed. Wrote a composition on "Dress".

6<sup>th</sup> Fri. Prof. Higgins has changed his day for giving us music lessons, and came up this afternoon for that purpose.

7<sup>th</sup> Sat. Miss Florence Freeman has spent the day up here.

8<sup>th</sup> Sat. Father preached from Mat. 22. 42. He shewed forth the character of the Messiah, and entreated his hearers to choose whether they would take him for their Saviour or not. Mr. Bishop led the Bible Class.

11. Wed. Wrote a letter to Samuel.

14. Sat. Another week has passed, and it has been a very busy one too. During this week, two of our Chinamen have left, but a new one which Mrs. Bishop has been trying, has come to work for us.

15. Sat. Mr. Bishop preached from Heb. 1. 26. "Separate from sinners." Father led the Bible Class.

17. Sun. One of our Chinamen came back to

day and Father engaged him to come and work for us all the time, as his object is to earn money.

18. Wed. Wrote a composition on Exercise.

We received a letter from Samuel, written from Flint, Mich. where he and Lucy are spending their winter vacation, with uncle Lyman's family. They are attending a day school, and do not intend to return to Berlin, but prepare themselves for Ann Arbor.

Thurs. 19. Mrs. Parker, Mather, and Miss Mabee made a long call.

21. Sat. Miss Florence Freeman walked up here this morning, and has spent the day with us. Father and Mother went down town this afternoon.

22. Sab. Father preached from John 31. 31.

Showing how much a man owes to his Redeemer, and how Jesus wishes us to work for him, of which with many are entirely regardless, giving themselves away to the satisfying of their lusts. I have spent a day of sweet communion.

23. Mon. Wrote a letter this afternoon, to Minnie Hobbs.

25. Wed. Wrote a letter to Mary Peckers.

26. Thurs. Went down town with Mother this afternoon, calling on Mrs. Halstead and Freeman.

1871.

January.

27. This "Went this evening to Preparatory Lecture. Father took as the subject of his discourse 1 Cor. 21, 27, 29., showing how a church member may partake worthily or unworthily of the symbols of our Lord's body.

28. Bro. Florence Freeman came up here before breakfast this morning, and we have spent the day in rambling about in the valley.

29. Sabbath I have this day made a public profession of my faith in Jesus Christ, to his, and belong to him now and for ever.

This was a solemn act, for by it I am placed under greater responsibilities to my God, my fellow men, and myself.

But oh! what unspeakable joy in the thought that God will lead me through this life, which once seemed so dreary, and that I have but to place my hands in his, and be

guided by him. Mr. Bishop preached this morning from Heb. 13. 20. "Through the blood of the everlasting covenant." This afternoon Bro. Kaker, and myself were received into this church, and also four others, from other churches.

30. Now Received a small American mail, but nothing from Lucy and Samuel.

31. Tues. The full month of this year is gone, and I think I have made progress, but oh! I hope that I will make still more in a new one.

1871.

February.

- 1<sup>st</sup> Wed. Wrote a composition on "The Hand."  
 Father, Mother and Samar went downtown.
- 2<sup>nd</sup> Thurs. Mother went down and called on  
 Carrie Dickenson who has been gone to Cal. three  
 months, and also on Mrs. P. McKee who is going  
 in this trip of the "Murray."
- 3<sup>rd</sup> Fri. Father killed 1 bullock this after-  
 noon.
- 4<sup>th</sup> Sat. Mr. Bishop exhibited his Magic  
 Lanterns this evening, to the school.
- 5<sup>th</sup> Sab. Father preached this morning from  
 John 3.1. He explained the origin and result  
 of the existence of mankind in the world.  
 He showed the resemblance of the ordinary  
 family to that of the Lord Jesus Christ, and  
 how He draws those who will come, into his  
 family so that they are called "the children of  
 God." He then exhorted those who are called  
 by this name, that they should live more  
 worthy of it. I have felt my Savior very close to me.
- 6<sup>th</sup> Mon. Louisa, Luella and I went with Thence  
 Freeman this afternoon to "Black Rock" for a  
 ride. Went to Monthly concert this evening.
- 7<sup>th</sup> Tues. Received a letter from Lucy this morning.
- 8<sup>th</sup> Wed. Wrote to Lucy and Samuel.
- 9<sup>th</sup> Thurs. Father started in the "Wittie" for How-  
 helen this evening, to attend to some business.

1871.

February.

10<sup>th</sup> Fri. As Father has gone, and I cannot re-  
vise Latin and Greek, I spend my time in  
sailing for Mother, who is preparing to go next  
week to Wailuku.

11<sup>th</sup> Sat. Edward Bishop exhibited the Magic  
Lantern again this evening.

12. Sat. Mrs. Bishop has conducted both  
services today, for Kuaca went to Oluahu.

Mr. Bishop preached this morning from  
Ec. 11. 7. I learned for a Sabbath school lesson,  
the last part of 6<sup>th</sup> chap. of Cor. O. how deep and  
rich is the Word of God! It satisfieth the  
hungry and thirsty soul, and maketh it to rejoice.

13. Mon. We received a letter from Father this  
morning. He intends to start home again  
to-night in the Steamship, but the wind blows  
so hard that Mother feels very anxious about  
him.

14. Tues. The "Kilauea" brought Esther this morn-  
ing; though her voyage was longer, because of the weather.

15. Wed. Mother exercised me from writing  
a composition today, as he wished me to help her.

16. Thurs. Father, Esther and Florence started  
for Wailuku at half past twelve this P. M.  
Father intends to return on Saturday, then  
Lorrie will go over on next Monday, and  
return with Mother and Florence, on the  
next Saturday.

1871

Febuary.

18. Sat. Father got back home again this evening before dark. He has been prospered

19. Sat. Father preached, from Ps. 51. 14. He first remarked upon the apparent negligence which is visible at the present time in this school, on the subject of religion, & thereupon urged the scholars to prepare the way that the Lord might come among us, and to remove the stumbling blocks which prevent His coming to work with power. Mon. Bishop led the Bible Class.

20. Mon. Last night at about ten o'clock we were visited by an earthquake, which was so severe as to tear down many parts of Mon. Bishop's house, and it also did some damage to our house, cracking the corner off Father's room, and pulling down the plaster, and also cracking off some plaster in the parterry. Mon.

Bishop's house appears to be scarcely inhabitable. Lorrin started early this morning for Wislaken. Luella and I spent the whole day morning in cleaning the house which was dirtied by the settling down of dust whiterwas &c.

21. Tues. This morning the steamer brought news that the earthquake was not felt so severely there in Honolulu as here, but

considerable damage was done. This afternoon Mother received a letter from Mother, and also a bag of soiled clothes brought by a boy. She wrote that Lorin was hip bound on the way over-owing to the soreness of his horses feet, that everyone was much frightened by the earthquake, though it did not do much damage!

22. Wed. Wrote to Lucy and Samuel.

23. Thurs. Today, the teachers and scholars of this school have kept as a day for prayer in behalf of schools. The teachers presided over two meetings, one in the forenoon and the other in the afternoon. I went this P. M. to the prayer meeting. I hope that the Holy Spirit may be abundantly poured out upon this school, to the conversion of many souls.

24. Fri. The steamer was much delayed in her passage down from Hawaii, by a head wind. She did not get to Bahama until this evening, but brought word that there was little injury done by the earthquake and it was not very severe.

25. Sat. Mother, Lorin, and Florence got home at about sunset this P. M. They seem pleased with their visit both in Makawao and Wailuku.



1871.

February.

26. Sat. Mr. Bishop preached this morning from Ps. 55. 1. He showed that true repentance does not consist in self reproach or confession of sin to God, neither in good works or fear of God's judgments, but in entirely forsaking our sins and seeking God with all our heart and desires, and how that where any ones does truly repent and turn to God he will surely be accepted of Him, and his sins will be freely pardoned. Father led the Bible Class. I have been fed today with spiritual food, which I trust has united my soul more closely to my God.

28. Tues. Received letters from Samuel and Lucy this morning. Dr. Kittle ridge also came up in the Steamer with Miss Carpenter, a teacher whom he got in the States, for the East Mani Female Seminary. They did not stop, but went right out to Malacca so as to get to Malacca as soon as possible.

1871. March.

1<sup>st</sup> Wed. Wrote a composition on "Hairs".  
 3<sup>d</sup> Fri. Fisher made arrangements, several weeks ago to go fore and install the church at Halepalua, and therefore if a boat comes for him tomorrow he intends to go taking Luella and I with him.

4<sup>th</sup> Sat. No boat came today from Lani and so we are still at home.

5<sup>th</sup> Sat. Father preached this morning from Col. 3. 23. He first remarked the fact that scarcely any of the high and most responsible positions in this nation are held by the natives. He then showed that the reason why the representatives of those nations which are called Christian nations have these responsible positions all over the globe, is, that they have the foundation of Christianity under them, doing all things as to the Lord. That all those who love Hawaii should do all things with their might and do it well. Mr. Bishop led the Bible class.

8<sup>th</sup> Wed. Luella's birthday. She is twelve years old. Mr. and Mrs. Needham, who came to Lahaina yesterday, came up here this evening to spend the night at Mr. Bishop's.



1871.

March.

10. Fri. Florence Freeman came up this afternoon, so as to go up to Mount Retreat with us children for a sabbath.

11. Sat. We started at about nine o'clock this morning, and arrived home again at four P.M. I think we all had a good time generally. Father started with Mr. Bishop yesterday to go to a Trustee Meeting at Makawao today, and we expect him home tonight.

12. Sab. Father reached home at about nine o'clock last night. Mr. Bishop, who went with him did not return yesterday, Kuana preached this morning. His text was Gen 41.38. Father led the Bible class.

13. Dr. Kittridge and Dr. Nichols came over the mountain today, and arrived here at about 3 o'clock this P.M.

14. The children went up in the valley with Dr. Nichols this morning and rambled about.

15. Wed. The two Doctors left this morning. Dr. Nichols starting for Wailuku by way of Hukakuloa, and Dr. Kittridge going the ordinary way over the mountain.

As we lost our recitations yesterday we omit compositions today, and take our usual studies.

1871.

March

18 Sat. Walked down to Lahaina with Luella and Florence and after staying at Mrs. Balsteads a while I went with Florence Freeman to see the Roman Catholic Cathedral. When we came home we found Mr. Pogue who came from Waialeale today.

19 Sat. Kuaea preached this morning from Rom. 3. 11. Mr. Pogue preached this P. M. His text 1. Cor. 6. 20. The leading thoughts of his sermon were: What God placed man in the world for; why man should glorify God; and how man should glorify him.

20 Mon. Mr. Pogue went to Ohuwahe this to see about a pastor for that place, and returned this P. M.

21. Tues. Mr. Bishop, who went down to Honolulu last week, came back in the Steamer this morning bringing Mr. Hitchcock with him, for the purpose of seeing what repairs are to be made on our harbor.

22. Wed. Wrote a composition on Carthage and also a letter to Samuel.

23. Thurs. Mr. Pogue went down to Honolulu tonight in the "Tanahi".

24. Fri. Mother is making some clothes for me and therefore I use my study time to help her.

25. Sat. Father & Mother went down town this P. M.

1871

March

26. Sat. Father preached this morning from Col. 3. 16. He remarked that there were three thoughts which prompted people to sing, hymns. First, because it was pleasing to the ear; second, because it is one of the forms of worship, and they use it only as a form; third, from a real desire to praise God and rejoice in Him. He then showed the uses of singing and asked his hearers to take advantage of these uses and profit thereby. Mr. Bishop led the Bible Class. I have been reading for a few Sabbaths past a book with the title 'The Power of Prayer', and account of the origin and first year of the Fulton St. and other prayer meetings, which is intensely interesting.

28. Tues. The Steamer did not come in today, and we think that she waited to bring the mail of the Cal. Steamer.

29. Wed. The Kilauea brought a large American mail; letters from Lucy and Samuel. Mother and I are very busy these days sewing for myself, for next week I am going to Whilukew to take painting lessons of Mrs. Brewster, and stay five or six weeks perhaps.

1871

April. Wailuku.

4. Miss Loring and I came over the mountain today, and arrived here to Mr. Waffing's at about dusk. Loring lost his hat on the way, but we do know that we came over well.

5. Miss Loring went to Loring's late afternoon.

6. I have done no painting today, as Mr. Loring does not know that I had come and had nothing prepared. Called on Mr. Woodhouse.

7. Miss Loring began to paint a bunch of bluish oranges which Mrs. Brewster sketched for me yesterday. Called this P.M. on Mrs. L., Mrs. & Mr. Bailey, and also on Mr. and Mrs. Alexander.

11. Brought my painting from school to use to paint tomorrow.

8. Late. Painted two or three hours.

9. Late. Went and heard a sermon read by Mr. C. Bailey in the foreign church. P. M. Mrs. Minnie's Cotton's birthday.

10. Nathan, Gloria, Annie, and I went to a candy pull at Mr. Bailey's this evening in celebration of it. Received a letter from home this morning, and wrote one to home from Mrs. P.M.

14. Miss Loring worked on my picture steadily this week and it is nearly finished.

1876.

April

15 Sat. Received a letter from home by Mrs. Bailey, who went over to invite Father and Mother to go and take charge of the C. M. S. Seminary. They have decided to go. (Wrote this P. M. with Flora to ride to Waikapu and call on David Richardson.)

16 Sat. Went to the foreign church and heard a sermon read by Rev. Alexander.

17. Wrote to the dear ones at home.

I have begun today <sup>to paint</sup> a consol. calculus, and also worked a little on my other picture. Called this P. M. on Mrs. E. Bailey, who I found Mrs. Thurston, and called also on Abimee Hobson.

18 Tues. Received several letters from home.

21. Fri. My oranges are completed, and I have advanced my second picture this week.

22 Sat. Helped Mrs. Wilfong about cooking this morning, and after dinner, Flora, Nathan, Lurie and I went up in the valley for a horse back ride, and had a delightful time.

23 Sat. Went with Mrs. Wilfong and the girls to the foreign church, and this P. M. to a funeral at the native church.

1871.

April

24 Mon. Wrote letters to Lucy, and to home  
friends. The Mooi went out this evening tak-  
ing Mrs. C. Bailey who is going to Gal. &  
Dr. Nichols, who is going to Hills.

25 Tues. Received letters from home and from  
Loraine and Lucy.

26 Wed. Mrs. Bishop and Della came over  
to try to stay until Saturday at Mrs. Hedden's.

27 Thurs. My embroidery is nearly finished  
and I have sketched some perches to paint.

28 Fri. Edward Bishop came over today to  
stay with his mother tomorrow.

Mrs. Cornwall and two daughters have spent  
the day with Mrs. Wilfong.

29 Sat. Brought my peaches from school  
yesterday, and this afternoon have worked  
on Mr. Howell's directions.

30 Sat. Found a sermon read by Mr. Alexander.

1. Mon. Wrote <sup>May</sup> one day picture.

2. Tues. Received a letter from Mother.

Loraine is to come over for me on next  
Friday and we will return home Sat.

3. Wed. Called with Florence on Mr. & Mrs  
Alexander.

4. Thurs. Wrote a letter to Lucy. Did not go  
to paint until one o'clock P. M. by the order  
of Mrs. Brewster. Mr. Sharrett has spent  
the day with Mrs. Wilfong.

May. Lahaina, Hawaii.

6. Sat. Loomis went over to Waialeale for me yesterday. I invited Annie to come home with us and stay a week, and this morning she received her father's consent. We started at nine o'clock this A. M. and taking it leisurely, arrived here at about two P. M. Old Mrs. Hitchcock is here making a visit.
7. Sat. Kuaoa preached this morning, and Mrs. Bishop this afternoon.
8. Mon. Have spent the day in preparing for Examination, which begins tomorrow.
9. Tues. The Examination began at ten this morning. This evening the "Kittie" came in bringing Mr. Pogue and Miss Carpenter the teacher that came out from the States for the E. M. F. Seminary.
10. Wed. Examinations continued today.
11. Thurs. We all, excepting Mother, went down to the Exhibition at Waialeale church.
- The ten graduates delivered orations on various subjects, and received diplomas. Annie & I went to ride towards evening.
12. Fri. Mr. Pogue and Mrs. Hitchcock returned to Honolulu this evening in the "Kittie". Miss Carpenter and we children have been up to the "Dible House".
- We are to go to Moakawa week after next.

1871.

May.

13. Sat. Annie Wilfong went <sup>this afternoon</sup> home with her father, who came for her last night.
14. Sat. As it is vacation we have not the privilege of public worship on the Sabbath. I have found this day rest for both body and soul.
15. Mon. Have occupied my time in housework & sewing. Father has packed the books.
16. Tues. Sewing and packing.

June.

Mahawee.

20. ~~Thurs~~ How long it is, since I have recorded anything within your pages, my Journal! But during this long time we have been busy in the confusion of packing & moving, and settling down in this our new home. This is nearly accomplished and we are ready to take scholars as fast as they probably will come at first. The first one came today, Pokine, Ahong's daughter. Oh! what a great work is before us, that of training immortal souls! Oh, that this school may be a blessing to this nation!

21. Wed. Mrs. Wilfong and baby, Mrs. Hott and baby, Helen, and Lorrin Thirston are here to spend the day, and Mrs. Thurston will come down this afternoon after she has finished her school duties.



1871

June

- 23 Fri. We have had a good many callers today. Mr. Tompson of Hills, Pres. Alexander, Mrs. Nelson, Sharat and Father Alexander.
- 24 Sat. Miss Carpenter and I were invited to tea at Mrs. Green's, and we had a very pleasant visit. Mrs. Needham who has come up with her children to stay a month at Makawao, came and spent the afternoon here. She wishes me to give Hattie <sup>music</sup> lessons while she is here.
- 25 Sat. There were no services in the foreign church this morning, as they finished the seats yesterday. This afternoon Mr. Bishop, who came over the mountain yesterday, rode up from Mr. Baldwin's to spend the night here.
- 26 Mon. Pres. Alexander is getting up a party to go to the top of Haleakala and Miss Carpenter and Mr. Bishop have consented to go. He returned home today and is coming back tomorrow to go up with the party, ~~and~~ began to give Hattie Needham music lessons this morning.
- 27 Tues. Pres. Alexander went up today onto the mountain to make some surveys and prepare for the rest of the party.

1871

June

28 Wed. A large party, started for the top of Haleakala this P. M. but the weather looks rather dubious.

29 Thurs. Father, Lorrin and I went to the Examination of the Haleakala schools the party up the mountain came down this P. M. having had a splendid time. Mr. Bishop went right on to Hailow on his way home.

30 Fri. Went down and spent several hours at Capt. Hobson's. This evening wrote to Annie Willoughby.

Half the year is gone, and with the new half I enter upon a new kind of work. It is a greater work than I have yet undertaken, and I need much grace to aid me in it. Eph. 3. 16-21.

1871.

July.

1<sup>st</sup> Sat. The second scholar came to-day,  
 Samiit Naanao from Waikae.

2<sup>nd</sup> Sat. Mr. Green preached a "Fourth of  
 July" sermon.

3<sup>rd</sup> Mon. Milo's carpenter began school this  
 morning. Three new scholars: Koo-pila,  
 Kapeli & Lydia Sniffin. This P. M.  
 Nathan Willfong came up and said that  
 all the family were coming up to spend  
 tomorrow. Edward Bishop also came  
 over the mountain to spend ~~the~~ several  
 days here.

4<sup>th</sup> Tues. Nathan Willfong, Edward, Louisa,  
 Luella, and I went to a picnic at  
 Leilikoe, and afterwards rode through  
 the woods around back of Piihola.

Capt. Willfong, his wife & Iry came up  
 to breakfast this morning, and returned  
 this P. M. Nathan & Edward are going  
 to start in the night for the top of the  
 mountain.

5. Wed. Prof Higgins came over the  
 mountain yesterday, and today he has  
 tuned the piano and given each of us  
 girls a music lesson. Nathan & Edward  
 arrived here from the mountain early  
 in the afternoon, and the father went  
 right on to Wailuku.

1871.

July.

6<sup>th</sup> Thurs. Prof. Higginth returned to Lahaina this A.M. Mother went to a sewing society at Mrs. Hobson's this afternoon, and Edward, Miss Carpenter & I went down & spent the evening.

8 Sat. This afternoon Edward and we children took a ride in the woods out to the sawmill.

9 Sat. Miss Carpenter and I stayed at home this morning and she went with the girls to native services this P.M.

10 Mon. Edward Bishop returned home today, a new scholar came from Waikiki this morning.

12 Wed. Two scholars came today, one from Waikiki and Helelu's daughter from Molo kai.

14 Fri. I am fifteen years old today. I can scarcely realize it, but thus the days, the months, the years are going, and show us that we ought to be improving. I fear that I have not gained much in the past year, and I feel that I need Divine help for the future.

We are to have Friday for our writing day, and have been writing to Samuel and Lucy, for we have had so little time since we have been here for writing to <sup>them</sup>.

1871

July

28<sup>th</sup> Fri. During the last two weeks five more scholars have come. Two from Waikahu, two from Molokai, and one from Lahaina. No great changes have been made and nothing important has happened. A week ago today I wrote a composition on the subject: "The Nations of the Earth." Today I have written to Mary Liders, and begun a letter to Grandmother. Mother heard by the last mail of the death of Miriam Clark, my cousin.

August.

4<sup>th</sup> Fri. Kahala's daughter came this week from Waikahu to school. I commenced giving Helen Thurston music lessons today. I have written a composition today on "Lessons." Father went to Waikahu this morning. He has agreed to go down every Friday and teach a class in the Theological School.

8<sup>th</sup> Tues. A school teacher from Hamakua brought his daughter twenty years old to school today.

9<sup>th</sup> Wed. We have had a severe north storm today, and the windward side of the house has been completely drenched.

1841.

August

- 10<sup>th</sup> Thurs. Have spent the most of the day in clearing up the effects of the storm. Miss Carpenter has had no school, and this afternoon washed the girls clothes. Helen Thurston came down and reported that much damage was done by the storm at the Kaleakala school. Another scholar came <sup>today</sup> from Capt. Robinson's plantation whom Mr. Sellman is going to support here.
11. Fri. Wrote to Samuel and Lucy.
12. Sat. Went with the girls to Kalena to bathe.
14. Mon. Miss Carpenter had the girls wash today. Hereafter our writing day is to be Mon.
- 15<sup>th</sup> Tues. Mr. Parker was here to dinner today. A little scholar was brought.
16. Wed. Did not recite lesson today, for Mother wished me to help her.
- 18 Fri. Father went down to Wailuku as usual, and brought up Miss Brigham this evening. She came up to Maui last Tues. in the Steamer with Emma Napoleon one of her scholars, and has been staying at Wailuku.
19. Sat. Cleaned house as usual this forenoon, but did not go to Kalena this P. M.



1871.

August.

25<sup>th</sup> Fri. Two girls by the name of Johnston came down from Hawaii today in the Steamer to come to this school. We all enjoy having Miss Bingham here, and she seems to enjoy it herself, taking rides with Miss Carpenter, &c.

31<sup>st</sup> Thurs. A scholar was brought from Mokolani today.

September.

1<sup>st</sup> Fri. Another scholar from Waikae.

2<sup>nd</sup> Sat. The trustees of this school had a meeting here this morning. Six out of the nine were present. This P.M. Mr. Sanford of Waiuku brought his two little girls to school.

October.

1<sup>st</sup> Sat. The last quarter of this year, only remains, and I do hope to make great improvement in it.

2<sup>nd</sup> Mond. Our school has increased considerably during the past month, and now numbers 28. Miss Bingham left us last Friday for Lahaia.

3<sup>rd</sup> Tues. For a composition today, I made a translation of a passage in Cassan.

4<sup>th</sup> Wed. Maimie Weston came up this P.M. and made a long call.

6<sup>th</sup> Fri. Miss Carpenter and I went

out for a ride this P. M. which we enjoyed very much.

7<sup>th</sup> Sat. Went to Kalena with the girls.  
13. Fri. Mother and we children went down this evening to Capt. Withers on invitation, to hear some minstrels who lately came down from Cal. The music was beautiful, but they deteriorated it by acting. Two of them were blacked and dressed as negroes, and did many outlandish performances.

16. Mon. Mother went up to see Mrs Rodgers who is laid up with a hurt knee. Miss Gray made a short call.

17. Tues. Wrote a composition on, "The superiority of Man above Animals."

20. Fri. Went with Miss Carpenter, to call on Mrs. Spencer, and Withers.

21. Sat. Went with the girls to Kalena.

25. Wed. Received a long letter from Lucy. She writes from Flint, stating, that Samuel has gone to Ann Arbor. It is truly refreshing to hear from our absent ones, especially, from Lucy, she has been silent so long.

27<sup>th</sup> Fri. Father started early this morning to go down to Maalea bay to get a little girl who came down from Waile in the steamer, and came back by the way of Wailuku.

1871.

October.

and met his class as usual.

28<sup>th</sup> Sat. Went with the girls to bath.

30<sup>th</sup> Mon. Four scholars were brought today  
from Kuler.

1873.

January.

1<sup>st</sup> Nov. It is two months since I last communicated with you, and I am determined not to neglect you any longer, my journal I am determined also to improve in the performance of many things that I have neglected in the old year, and I hope this new year will be a great blessing to me. This School numbers 55 today. It is as large a number as can be taken on account of the smallness of our dining room. Mr. & Mrs. Charatt, and Mr. & Mrs. Spencer made New Year calls here today. I wrote as a completion today, a synopsis of the Second Book of Paradise Lost.

2<sup>nd</sup> Tues. Howard Johnson went home this morning. His P. M. Kate Gray and Minnie Holton calls. I become impatient with myself nearly every time I am called upon to entertain visitors, for I know so little, and am so unused to society that it is quite embarrassing to me, when I am obliged to take part in conversations.

3<sup>rd</sup> Wed. At about dark this evening Mrs. Wilfong and her daughters, Annie & Roy rode up to the door quite unexpectedly, and we have had to exercise a good deal of "storing away," to make suitable places for us all to sleep. I feel more and more the importance of maintaining a proper dignity before these scholars, for

so many of them are inclined to be very familiar, especially the half castes, if I am in the least familiar with them.

4<sup>th</sup> Thurs. Luella and Florence have omitted school today to entertain their visitors. They all went over to Mr. Green's and spent the afternoon.

5<sup>th</sup> Fri. Mrs. Willfang, and her daughters returned home this morning. I have not learned to gather up the <sup>lessons</sup> minutes, and use them to good purpose, yet I feel that I waste a great deal of time, which goes almost without my knowledge. I must be more careful.

6<sup>th</sup> Sat. I went with the girls to Kalena this P. M. but I will not undertake the management of so large a number again, for it is so hard to control them while on the way. The majority of them behaved very well but some few unruly ones tried my patience a good deal. The first week of the year is ended, but I cannot say that I am satisfied with the way I have spent some of it. I hope I have made improvement in some things, but I feel that I must make still greater improvement. I find that regular habits and a proper division of my time is a great help to me.

7<sup>th</sup> Sat. It has been windy all day, and while the girls were gone to church it began to rain so that they got wet in coming home. I have been greatly impressed with the great

love of God towards his chosen people, in reading the last chapters of Deut.

8<sup>th</sup> Mon. This is a writing day for us children, but giving music lessons & practicing, besides my other duties have taken up nearly all the time.

Emily, a girl from Waialea, ran away this afternoon at five o'clock. Father sent Kukuwa, after her but it became too dark for him to see and so he returned without her. I hope she is under shelter tonight, for it is very cold. She has been very homesick lately, which <sup>probably</sup> led her to do such a thing. It is the first case of the kind that we have had, since school opened.

9<sup>th</sup> Tues. Father went down to Waialea today and saw Emily's brother who said that he would bring her back again.

10<sup>th</sup> Wed. Oh! that I had more time at my disposal! I would wish the days to be about twice as long as they are, that I might accomplish all I desired to. I see so much to be done, and so much to be improved, and so much undone, that it makes me restless whenever I think of it. I suppose I must improve what time I have, and <sup>then</sup> make time, as it were, by using what I have now, to good advantage.

11<sup>th</sup> Thurs. I think I have succeeded a little better today in using my time to advantage. I wonder how it would seem to have time hanging on one's hands, when the chief pursuit

of life is to "kill time," as is the case with so many people in the world.

15<sup>th</sup> Mon. Giving music lessons, practicing, and writing have been the "order" of the day. I finished off a letter to Lucy this afternoon. I heard today that Mrs. Wilbur had a little girl.

16<sup>th</sup> Tues. Mrs. Thurston came up in the steamer from Honolulu this morning, having been gone a month on a visit to friends there. Luella and Haunce have been off all day with Lavin, who went with the cart to get taro, guavas, &c.

17<sup>th</sup> Wed. Mother took all the girls out to walk this afternoon, and they went up to Mrs. Thurston's. Mrs. Johnson came from Waiupalakuia today to see her little girls.

18<sup>th</sup> Thurs. Miss Carpenter, Luella and I went down to Henry Baldwin's this afternoon and came home by moonlight.

19<sup>th</sup> Fri. Father started off early this morning to meet the steamer for the purpose of going to Honolulu. He intends to stay until the return of it, and do a good deal of business. This P. M. Miss Kate Gray and Miss Lewis called.

20. Sat. Mrs. Johnson is very entertaining, and moreover is so kind and true apparently that I enjoy her company very much.

She has a good many English manners, and is always perfectly at ease.

1872.

January.

21<sup>st</sup> Sat. It has been raining all day, so that it has been quite hard to keep the girls quiet and occupied.

22<sup>nd</sup> Sun. Storming all day, so that Miss Carpenter could not get her clothes out. Mother feels very anxious about Father, who was to return tonight ~~on the Steamer~~ on the Steamer.

23<sup>rd</sup> Tues. Still storming, and as the Steamer did not come we think she must have waited.

24<sup>th</sup> Wed. The storm has abated and it seems good to have some quiet. Mrs. Lays called and said that the "Kibauca" would probably start tonight.

25<sup>th</sup> Thurs. Father surprised us by coming in very suddenly about 9.50 A. M. He was from Lahaina, having left the Steamer and rode over the mountain. He did a great deal of business in Honolulu, and reports <sup>that</sup> the "Morning Star" arrived there last week from Merionia bringing Mr. and Mrs. Bingham, and some native missionaries. He says that there is deep religious feeling felt at Honolulu at the present time. Oh! that it may be blessed to many souls. Mrs. Thurston and Helen came down <sup>this evening</sup>, and Miss Carpenter read to us a journal written by Mrs. Linn on the voyage of the "Morning Star."

We received letters from Samuel and Lucy, & also other friends.

1872.

January.

26<sup>th</sup> Fri. Oh! that I was more mature, more steady, and knew better how to act. I come short every day, and feel reped with myself that I have been so thoughtless, so seemingly unkind and disrespectfull. How earnest should I be to improve!

27<sup>th</sup> Sat. Mother was sick all the mornning, and therefore at good <sup>disadvantage</sup> of the superintending of the work, fell upon me than I am accustomed; therefore I feel very tired tonight. What a blessing, that we have the Sabbath to refresh our bodies as well as our souls!

28<sup>th</sup> Sat. Again returns the day of rest.

Mother has a prayer meeting with the girls of the 1<sup>st</sup> & 2<sup>nd</sup> dormitories, every Sat. eve. All seem very willing to come, but they show so little real desire to assemble in such a meeting, and seem to regard it so lightly, that it seems almost as though they considered laughing and praying, as the same thing. Yet we hope that a few of them have some ideas of the solemnity of drawing nigh to God by means of prayer, and we hope that many more will have it yet.

29<sup>th</sup> Mon. Miss Carpenter has changed our writing day to Wed, therefore we have studied as usual today. My daily studies occupy all the time I have for them, & and I have little time for extras; so fully is my time taken up.

1872.

February.

Thurs 1<sup>st</sup> I began a composition yesterday but it was only a beginning, for I have so little time on writing days.

3<sup>rd</sup> Sat. This afternoon Mother, Miss Thurston and I went down to Mrs. Holton's to call upon her and Mrs. Gray. The former has been absent from home the last two weeks taking care of her first grand child, Minnie Bailey. Father has a foreigner working for him now by the name of Silver. He is a young man, has been a sailor several months, but was brought to Honolulu after the late calamity of whale ships up North, by ice. He boards and sleeps in Mrs. Hall's new house which he has just built, opposite here. He and Lorrin went scurvying, this P. M. and brought home a few shells.

4<sup>th</sup> Sat. Mr. Smyth came from Whelpalakua to see his daughter today. We are very much troubled by these white men breaking the quiet of our Sab. by coming to see their children, on that day.

5<sup>th</sup> Mon. I have begun to study Virgil's Aeneid, I did not finish Caesar, but have read four books of it, and Miss Carpenter thought that I was far enough advanced to begin Virgil.

6<sup>th</sup> Tues. Studied, as usual.

1872.

February

7<sup>th</sup> Wed. This P. M. Mrs. Thurston and Mrs. Thomas called. The latter is a lady from Cal. she went to the top of the mountain Moor, and is staying a short time with Mrs. Thurston.

8<sup>th</sup> Thurs. Went with Hannale and Harriet to Mrs. Thurston's, to carry her some things, and then to water the horses.

9<sup>th</sup> Fri. Father and Mother started off before daylight this morning for Wailuku, and spent the whole day there, reaching home again at 7.30 P. M.

10<sup>th</sup> Sat. Went with a part of the girls to Kalua but the Kaleakala boys bothered us by staying on the bank of the valley, so that we were quite late and did not get home till sunset. The girls behaved very well, and I was glad that they kept their dignity, and did not take notice of their insulting speeches.

11<sup>th</sup> Fri. We wrote compositions Wed and Miss Carpenter intended to have us read them last evening, as Mrs. Thurston was coming down, but she was giling and therefore we did not read them. Father went to Wailuku today, but he is going to discontinue this practice, for he has so much to do at home. Mrs. Bailey wishes Luella to go down and stay with her a few days. Luella wishes to go very much.

1872. February.

17<sup>th</sup> Sat. Walked up to Mrs. Thurston with Florence, to see if Luella could go down with Lorin Thurston to Wailuku where he goes to school next Monday.

19. Mon. Lorin Thurston called at seven o'clock this A. M. and as Luella was all ready they started immediately. Mrs. Thurston & Helen came down this evening, and we read our compositions.

23. Fri. Lorin Thurston came home this P. M. and brought a letter from Luella to us. She seems to be of use to Mrs. Baily and therefore she stays here longer than she intended. Mrs. Thurston came down this evening and went with Miss Carpenter to take a moonlight ride, and call on Mrs. Prof. Alexander who is staying at Makawo for a time.

24. Sat. Mr. Smyth of Ulupalukua sent for his daughter, and she went home this afternoon. We are very glad to have her go for she has proved to be a bad girl. Mother went to walk with the girls this P. M.

24. Wed. Miss Carpenter and I are going down to Wailuku to hear a reading by a Mrs. Pounceford, who has given one or two readings there lately.



1872.

March

4<sup>th</sup> Mon. Miss Carpenter and I were intend-  
ing to go to the reading Wed. eve. and then  
stay in Wailuku until Fri. afternoon, &  
then come up with Luella. We enjoyed  
the reading very much, and also our visit,  
but as we were starting for home, Fri.  
we discovered that Mother's horse, which  
Miss Carpenter had ridden up in valley  
the day before, was lame, and it was  
concluded that I should stay down until  
today and come up with Father Alexander.  
My horse was not to be found however, this  
morning and I was obliged to borrow one  
5<sup>th</sup> Tues. Kekueva was sent down to the  
bay, this morning to take a horse to Mr.  
Theodore Gulick who is coming here to  
fill some teeth for us. Mr. Gulick arrived  
a little before dinner, and Kekueva at  
dark. The latter has seen to Wailuku  
and got Mother's horse. Mr. Gulick  
examined my teeth this P. M. but only  
found one filling to be done, which he  
immediately did.

6<sup>th</sup> Wed. Mr. Gulick polished the filling  
he put into my tooth yesterday, and  
cleaned my teeth this morning, and worked  
on David's and Florencio's during the  
day, and spent the evening at Mrs. Thurston's.

1872.

March.

8<sup>th</sup> Fri. Luella's birthday. She is 15 years old. Capt. Hobson came up here to the Seminary today for the first time since school was opened. Mrs. Henry Baldwin also called. Mr. Gulick found two small cavities on the inner surface of my teeth and tried to fill one with gold, but he did not succeed and therefore put a bone filling into both. I have learned to esteem him very highly even in his short stay with us, as an active and devoted Christian man. I believe that he is one who fulfills the injunction of Christ to all his disciples, "Abide in me."

9<sup>th</sup> Sat. Mr. Carpenter went with the girls to Kalua today.

10<sup>th</sup> Sat. Mr. Gulick preached at the foreign church, by invitation of Mr. Green. A little boy in the Haleakala school died of lock-jaw last night, and the funeral took place this P. M. at the native church. This eve. Mr. Gulick addressed the girls, and later I enjoyed an hour with him in examining different passages of Scripture, which time I enjoyed exceedingly.

11<sup>th</sup> Mon. Father and Mother took a long ride this afternoon, with three of the girls. Minnie Hobson called on me. Mr. Ruford Hitchcock, who is in Makawao at present,

was here to supper and to spend the night Pali and his wife from Ebor are here also. He addressed the girls this evening.

13. Wed. We received letters from Samuel and Lucy last evening and today I have written some today. Mr. Gulick has finished all our teeth, and is working on Carrie & Hannah Johnsons today, he intends to return to Honolulu this week. Mr. Curtis Lyons is in Maheauas now, and boards here.

14<sup>th</sup> Thurs. Mr. Gulick went down to Wailuku this afternoon, so as to go from there to the Steamer, tomorrow morning.

16<sup>th</sup> Sat. Went to Kalina with the girls, and immediately after coming back, started down to Capt. Roberts with Miss Carpenter, and spent the evening there.

17. Sat. It has rained all day and as the girls could not go to the church, Father had service here with them, at the house.

22. Fri. We received a large box of things sent from Boston as a present to the Seminary, containing books, Bibles, mottoes, Scripture texts, pictures, tracts, &c. It is a very valuable box, sent by different individuals through the influence of Miss Rice. A handsome brown clock arrived yesterday for Lavin, as a

premium for getting subscribers to the Youth's Companion.

23. Sat. It has been stormy, all the week, and only at short intervals that we have had any pleasant weather at all.

Father and Mother were obliged to go down to Capt. Hobson's to acknowledge a deed this P. M., and Lavinia & Florence accompanied them. They got very wet coming home.

25. Mon. O! the pride of the human heart! It seems as though the more I try to overcome it, the more excited and vain are my thoughts, and yet I despise myself for it. "God resisteth the proud, but giveth grace to the humble." I must have less of my own righteousness and more of Christ's, & strive to tread in the footsteps of the meek and lowly Jesus.

26. Tues. Mr. Bishop of Lahainaluna called here yesterday and ate dinner with us. It seemed good to see him, he is so genial, and such a earnest friend of this school, and speaks so encouragingly of it. Mrs. Johnson of Uluhalakua came today to make a visit here. Mother, Lavinia, and Olive have spent the day at Capt. Hobson's.

30. Sat. Mr. Johnson came today, to spend the Sabbath, I suppose.

1872.

April.

1<sup>st</sup> Tues. Mr. James Alexander and his wife called this afternoon. We received letters from Lucy and Aunt Caroline.

2<sup>nd</sup> Weds. Mr. Dwight and his daughter, Heulie, Parath's father, Kaiie, Sorcass' father, and Motaia from Moolokai, came today to visit the school.

May.

29<sup>th</sup> Wed. This is the first day of vacation, which is to continue to the first of July. The scholars have been departing to their several homes since last Friday, and only three are left. Mrs. Bishop, & Johnny came over from L-hua Sat. and staid here over the Sabbath, on their way to Hana. Mr. Bishop invited us all to visit them next week before they go down to Honolulu. Miss Carpenter left us this morning for Kahului to go to Honolulu by the boat, where she is to spend the vacation.

June.

1<sup>st</sup> Sat. We have been quite busy sewing this week. We four children intended to go to L-hua early Mon. morn. and stay until Wed. Mother thinks she cannot leave, though I wish very much that she could go.

2<sup>nd</sup> Sat. We all went to church this morning excepting Luella. I intend to go every Sat. this vacation, as we have no service at home.

1872.

July.

14<sup>th</sup> Sat. Ah! my journal, thou art sadly neglected, and I must strive to treat thee in a more comely manner, while I begin a new year of my life. Today I enter my 17<sup>th</sup> year, and as it begins with a Sabbath, I hope that a sacred influence may pervade and hallow whatever I undertake during this year that is consistent with my Masters will.

15<sup>th</sup> Mon. Last Saturday Mother went to Ulu-pala-hua to spend a week in recruiting. Florence & Luella began studding this morn. but I will not commence for a week yet, or longer if I am of any aid to Mother. There are 37 girls here now, but they come in very slowly.

16<sup>th</sup> Tues. Today I have done considerable sewing, but it seems very tiresome to spend all ones strength in preparing food to eat and clothes to wear! The girls are taught sewing two after noons in the week, and singing two afternoons.

17<sup>th</sup> Wed. Commenced giving music lessons.

18<sup>th</sup> Thurs. It astonishes me that these girls know so little about the Bible, and are so indifferent to it. I think however that I have got one girl to take an interest in this precious book. Oh that it might be very precious to her, and that many might learn the value of it, and become wise unto salvation! We need Gods Spirit more than anything else.



1872. July.

- 17<sup>th</sup> Fri. Mr. Kavanagh went to Ulupalukua this P. M. to return with Mother tomorrow.
- 20<sup>th</sup> Sat. Mother got home a little afternoon, very tired from her long ride, but after a good visit.
- 22<sup>nd</sup> Mon. I don't wish to begin my studies this week, for I feel that I can assist Mother in her many cares. Annie Willoug and Lousaina-Lake have spent the day here.
- 24<sup>th</sup> Wed. Mother took charge of the washing yesterday and the ironing today, while I looked after affairs upstairs.
- 26<sup>th</sup> Fri. Mrs. Holton called this afternoon, found the larger girls in the dining room, Mother teaching them how to cut dresses, went into the kitchen, remarked how clean it looked, &c. I propose to begin studying on Mon. I have begun to read Watts Improvement of the mind, and like it.
- 27<sup>th</sup> Sat. Went with the girls to Kalua, and afterwards, went to ride with Wife, Carpenter, and wending up by calling on Mrs. Thurston. I remember that three years ago a lady in Lahaina in speaking of how little I went from home, asked me when I would begin to go out more. I replied, "When I am sixteen years old." But I feel so little, and less inclined to go, <sup>now</sup> as I did then, and this is the first time I have set foot off from the premises since my birth day. I have no inclination to be constantly "on the wing".

1872

July.

28<sup>th</sup> Sat. How cold my heart has been today! The reaction from yesterday's exertion has made me feel dull and senseless. Truly, the spirit is willing, but the flesh is weak, and too often the spirit yields to the flesh!

29<sup>th</sup> Sun. Mother has been sick in bed nearly all day with her poor head. There is nothing that depresses my spirits, or much as to see Mother low spirited, and just at dusk this evening, my long pent-up, tired feelings, burst forth in a flood of hot and bitter tears. How childish! How selfish!

30<sup>th</sup> Tues. Began the day with a kind of steelial feeling such as I commonly have after shedding <sup>many</sup> tears, but it has worn off and I feel more like myself now. Mother is much better, and has been able to oversee the washing corner. It is Florence's 12<sup>th</sup> birthday.

August.

3<sup>rd</sup> Sat. Now that I have begun studying I find scarcely any time for writing. Went with the girls to Kalewa. Mother, Miss Carpenter, Mrs. Thurston went this P.M. and called on Mrs. Holton, Baldwin and Alexander. Luella, Florence and Helen walked down to Mrs. Wilbur's.

6<sup>th</sup> Tues. Mrs. W. W. Hall and family, with Miss Lucy White, and young Dimond came up from Honolulu in the Steamer today, and they are going to stay a few weeks at the "Carper" house. They arrived late, and ate supper here.

1872.

August.

14<sup>th</sup> Wed. Father and Mother spent the day at Waialua. Mother's ear and head have troubled her so much of late that she felt that she ought to consult the doctor. Dr. Saunders has but lately begun to practice on Maui, and Mother said that he seemed like a very pleasant man.

Mon. W. W. Hall, young Dinwood and Henry Baldwin started yesterday to go to Kaupohaha the crater. Mrs. Hall and Lucy White spent this eve. here, played, sung, played "puzzles" &c. 15<sup>th</sup> Thurs. I recited the first fall number of lessons today that I <sup>study</sup> have this term. I know it worries Mother to see me spend any extra time in recreations, and she tries to plan so that I will have more studying time, still I wish to relax her as much as I can under the circumstances, and improve my time whatever it is. Mrs. Hall dined here today.

16<sup>th</sup> Fri. Mother and we children went to an entertainment given at the foreign church by a Prof. Plummer, who is traveling for his health, and consented to come to Makawae for a night. He recited poetry, comic pieces, &c. and his power of changing his countenance in acting out different characters was truly wonderful. I enjoyed the evening exceedingly.

17<sup>th</sup> Sat. Something has got into me, that I cannot account for. I feel so restless, and yet

I cannot tell what I want, so hungry, longing for something, yet I know not what will satisfy me. The excitement of last evening's entertainment roused me in such a manner that I cannot think of it without having that same hungry feeling. It has rained some today.

18<sup>th</sup> Sat. Raining all day, so that the girls did not go to church. Mr. Bead brought up from Waikapea, Harrie and Hannah Johnson who came down from Hawaii on the ship, with their brothers who are going to the Kalakala school.

19<sup>th</sup> Mon. Have studied nearly all day.

Mr. Bailey came from Waialua today, and intends to spend some time in Mahaloa, occupied in surveying land.

October.

24<sup>th</sup> Thurs. Received two letters from Lucy, one written from Orelin where she and Sam were finishing up the visiting of their summer vacation, and the other a journal letter written after their arrival at Amherst, giving her first impressions of college life. Dr. Saunders and Dr. Brooks called today to see little Mary Burr who has been sick several weeks, and ate dinner here.

25<sup>th</sup> Fri. Mother went down to Waialua this morning with Mrs. Thurston to

Stay until Noon. Mrs. Hitchcock spent the day at Mrs. Wilburs.

26<sup>th</sup> Sat. It has been raining all day so that we did not go to Kalona. Several girls are unwell.

27<sup>th</sup> Sat. Raining, but Corrin and Luella started for church, though they found only two persons there, Mr. Lays, and <sup>Mr.</sup> Henry Alexander, so that they had the pleasure of coming back in the rain. Of course the girls did not go to meeting.

28. Mon. Mrs. Hitchcock who has been making a visit here of several weeks, went to Waituku this A.M. on her way to the Steamer for Hawaii. Mother returned this eve. from Waituku, but a farther short visit has not done her much good, as she has suffered a good deal of shivering.

29<sup>th</sup> <sup>Nov</sup> Tues. Sister sent yesterday to Waikuku for the Dr. for Mary Beers was alarmingly worse, and Du Brooks came up today. She seems some better, and she thinks her attack was a kind of crisis to her sickness, from which she will continue to improve.

November.

30<sup>th</sup> Sat. Went with girls to Kalona.

31<sup>st</sup> Sat. Went to church this morning.

1<sup>st</sup> Tues. The weather seems sultry and preparing for a rain, though the day has been good for drying clothes.

2<sup>nd</sup> Tues. We have had a hard Kona rain today, which has sent the water into the cisterns.

3<sup>rd</sup> Wed. Miss Anna, three of the girls and

myself went with Miss Carpenter nearly to Kauhū, when, beginning to rain we started back while she went on to Sam Alexanders, where she expects to stay and come up to meeting next Sunday on her way back.

9<sup>th</sup> Sat. Rained this P. M. so I did not go to bath. Messrs. Rodgers & Silver called down this eve.

10<sup>th</sup> Sat. Miss Carpenter came up to church on her way home but got caught in a rain so she did not stop to meeting.

11<sup>th</sup> Mon. Raining all the afternoon.

13<sup>th</sup> Tues. Mother got the clothes out this evening, but after hanging in the rain all day they were put to soak, until more favourable weather.

14<sup>th</sup> Tues. Went up with several large girls to get <sup>some</sup> slips from Mr. Kavanagh to plant in the fence on the side of the road for a hedge. Sam Alexanders recently sent up over thirty young cedars in boxes, which if they grow and live will make a fine avenue.

15<sup>th</sup> Fri. Mrs. Gray called today and also Mr. Kavanagh and Mrs. Brun. Mr. Beers came this A. M. to see Mary, and after dinner went down to Waipā to get her mother, and another relation, who had landed from the Kiimanu there.

16<sup>th</sup> Sat. Mr. Beers and train went to Matiko this afternoon, to return to Mōlokai. Miss Carpenter took Mary on horseback to see Mrs. Thurston this P. M. accompanied by Luella and Florence.

November.

- 17<sup>th</sup> Sat. Raining, so we did not go to church.
- 18<sup>th</sup> Tues. Washing day, but it has rained hard all day, so the clothes had to be left until another day.
- 20<sup>th</sup> Wed. This P.M. Mother, Miss Sims and I went up to Mrs. Thurstone to call, and then Miss Sims and I went ~~to~~ took a ride which proved a very pleasant one.
- 21<sup>st</sup> Thurs. Took a long walk with the larger girls.
- 25<sup>th</sup> Mon. We received a large American mail this morning, & this P.M. I went with Mother & Miss Ann to call on Mrs. C. Baldwin & Mrs. James Alexander. We had hoped to see Father Alexander, but were disappointed, for he has just returned from a voyage to the Hawaiian Islands, and he had left for Wallispen with his wife. We then called on Mrs. Hobson, Miss Gray & Minnie Hobson, the former of whom has been making a visit at Hon., and the two latter have just returned from "the boat" whither they went five months ago. Minnie has been homesick and is glad to get home. Father left today to go to Molokai for the purpose of attending the meeting of Presbytery.
- 28<sup>th</sup> Thurs. Hawaiian National Holiday, also Thanksgiving, in celebration of this great day, we had a grand dinner, the Kalakala teachers, and Mrs. Tharvest, granting us their presence. This evening assembled in the parlor, the girls enjoyed a social hour in singing, playing, chatting &c. which ended the <sup>day</sup>.

1873.

January.

1<sup>st</sup> Wed. A new year opened before me, with bright and pleasing prospects. With deep gratitude for the blessings that have surrounded me during the year that is past, I enter upon the new one with the warmest promise to live a higher and better life, through the assistance of them in whom I trust, who is very faithful. I think I have for some time past lived too narrow a life, too selfish, and too limited, the natural result of which is still egotism and pride with which I have to contend. We had a very pleasant celebration here, John Bulch, with his wife, and little business girl, came up from Wailuku that day, and continued with us until the 31<sup>st</sup>, which day our "Woman's Society" met, and listened to Mr. Bulch as he gave some account of their labor in Lehina.

2<sup>nd</sup> Thurs. The girls this morning finished the large ironing which they had not time to complete yesterday. I have given one music lesson and painted a little, a sprig of peash-flowers. The trees are literally covered with blossoms at present.

3<sup>rd</sup> Fri. Began to give drawing lessons to a class of six girls, to whom Father wishes me to teach the rudiments of drawing. Also, began teaching Sarah and Keatie Akana music, besides teaching Carrie Johnson and Lulla. Mrs. Keavandagh said "Goodbye" to us this eve. We have not yet heard who will take his place. A little girl was brought to school from Wailuku.

1873.

January.

4<sup>th</sup> Sat. Went with the girls to Kealema.

5<sup>th</sup> Sat. Mother has spent the whole day in her room resting as quietly as possible under the circumstances, and I am glad she has done so for of late she has been much worn, and needs rest.

I hope this year that each Sabbath may be spent in learning more of the Bible, and of my God.

6<sup>th</sup> Mon. Mr. Brock called today. This afternoon Annie and her Willfong came up from Wailuku to stay until Thurs.

7<sup>th</sup> Tues. Lulla & Florence don't study now while their company remains. They have been to Mr. Grant's & eaten dinner bringing back some elegant robes.

8<sup>th</sup> Wed. The girls have gone to ride in the woods.

9<sup>th</sup> Thurs. Annie and Wey went home this morning, though the weather looked somewhat threatening.

10<sup>th</sup> Fri. Rained considerably during the day. I gave a drawing lesson this afternoon. Three lessons a week are all that can conveniently be taught.

11<sup>th</sup> Sat. Raining, so I did not go to Kealema.

12<sup>th</sup> Sat. We went to church and heard a sermon from Rev. Thos. Gulick, who is now visiting the Islands before he goes to his future missionary field in Spain. He preached from Deut. 32. H. showing the superiority of the Christian's refuge above any other, as displayed in the conduct of enemies themselves. It was pure enjoyment to listen to him, he was so animated.

1873.

January.

13<sup>th</sup> Mon. Began to study Rhetoric. I will recite twice a week. My book is Rudenbo's; borrowed from Mr. Moran.

14<sup>th</sup> Tues. Finished off letters this evening to Lucy.

The new king was enthroned on the 9<sup>th</sup>. There are some doubts as to whether he will control his appetite for drink so as to be able to fulfil his duties in a proper manner, but he has chosen good ministers.

15<sup>th</sup> Wed. Mr. and Mrs. Gulick called and spent nearly an hour and a half here. <sup>They</sup> Mother took them around the house, and they took such a

hearty interest in everything, and seemed so cheerful and full of life, that it seemed a real pleasure to see them. May they be prospered in their work.

16<sup>th</sup> Thurs. Mother and Florence went up to Mrs. Thurston's this evening. Mrs. T. arrived home last night, after a vacation of several weeks.

17<sup>th</sup> Fri. Luella and I went up to Mrs. Thurston's and spent about two hours this P. M.

18<sup>th</sup> Sat. Went to Kalama with the girls. Mother & Miss Carpenter went down to Bear River while Luella and Miss Arms called on Mrs. McLeer and Mrs. Brown.

19<sup>th</sup> Sat. Mr. Green preached from 2 Cor. 3: 18.

20<sup>th</sup> Mon. A large American mail arrived today. Three letters came from Samuel and Lucy. The latter gave quite an account of their laborious studies, which tax all their powers to conquer, and are very fatiguing.

21<sup>st</sup> Tues.

January.

It had been raining all day so that the drying of the clothes was postponed until tomorrow.

22<sup>nd</sup> Wed.

Mrs. Cooper has given me permission to go to their house while they are away during the week, and practice on their cabinet organ.

25<sup>th</sup> Sat.

Went to Kalena with the girls, after words to Mrs. Green to borrow some books.

Mrs. Thurston has spent the afternoon here.

26<sup>th</sup> Sat.

Went to hear Mrs. Green preach.

27<sup>th</sup> Mon. Mrs. Green & Laura called this afternoon.

29<sup>th</sup> Wed. Mother took the girls up to Mrs. Thurston to call.

Mrs. James Bailey and little boy are visiting here, & recovering their health.

30<sup>th</sup> Thurs. Mother spent the day at Capt.

Hebron, and towards night Father, Miss Ann, Julia and I went down, and came back with her.

Mother Bailey is visiting there.

31<sup>st</sup> Fri. Miss Carpenter had gone down to Capt.

Hebron, to make a short visit.

February.

1<sup>st</sup> Sat. Mrs. Thurston and Mrs. J. Bailey with her little boy have spent the afternoon here. It was so windy, I did not go to Kalena.

2<sup>nd</sup> Sat. Went to foreign church. Miss Car-

penter came up to Church, and then home with us.

3<sup>rd</sup> Mon. Mrs. Hebron, Kate Gray, Mrs.

Cornwell, and Miss Everett called. The lat-

ten wishes to go up on Kealeakala with a party going up tomorrow morning. Some of Willson's came up from Waikuku to go, and near dark a Mr. and Mrs. Kennedy will have, some California people, who lodge here tonight, and go in the same party tomorrow. Julia's, three went down to Mrs. Webb's to the christening of their baby, this evening by Bishop Willis and Whipple.

4<sup>th</sup> and the party started for the mountain at 3 or 4. A. M. and got back at 1 P. M. having had fine views and pleasant weather.

We heard this afternoon of the death of Jennie Armstrong, by typhoid fever. It will be a great affliction to the parents to lose their oldest child.

8<sup>th</sup> Sat. Miss Lydia Bingham came up from Waikuku today, to make a visit at the Seminary. I went with the girls to Kalama, Kati Camp and Luvaina Lake. Mrs. Baldwin and Mrs. Shepherd called while I was gone.

- Sat 9<sup>th</sup> Went to church with the others.  
 10<sup>th</sup> Mon. Mrs. Bailey and Mr. and Mrs. Green called this afternoon.  
 15<sup>th</sup> Sat. We have had a good deal of rain this week but it has been delightful today. Miss Carpenter, Miss Amos and Miss Bingham went down to Henry Baldwin's this morning and then to other places taking a winter long ride. I went with the girls to Kealahou. The rain has filled it up so that it is overflowing and running down the valley.  
 16<sup>th</sup> Sat. Another beautiful day. Went to church.  
 17<sup>th</sup> Mon. Made preparations for getting up a party to the top of the mountain. We are all going except Father and Mother, and Harriet and Hannah Johnson are going with us. The plan is to rise at one o'clock tomorrow morning and go up in time to see the sunrise.  
 18<sup>th</sup> Tues. Two o'clock this morning found us on our way up the mountain. We soon overtook Mr. Silver and Mrs. James Bailey who had started from the Kealahou School, to accompany us. We reached the top just in time to see the sunrise. The morning was unusually warm, though there was frost on the mountain. We started back at nine o'clock and, taking it leisurely, reached home at four P.M. We are all pretty well exhausted.

19<sup>th</sup> Wed. An American mail came last night. Simons's letter dated Dec. 31<sup>st</sup> 1872 was received with others. It was written during the vacation at the Christmas holidays. He was remaining at Snow Harbor, while Lucy had gone to Sintonville to spend the vacation. He enclosed in his letter a photograph of his club consisting of four Messrs. Castle, Crocker, Peck and himself.

20<sup>th</sup> Thurs. A very cold day. This morning the therm. at 52°. There has been snow on the mountain all day. Mother and Miss Bingham are spending the afternoon and evening at Mrs. Thurlstone. Mrs. Hitchcock has just brought a new teacher to that school called Mr. Clark.

21<sup>st</sup> Fri. Mrs. Nelson sent up for Miss Bingham to go down and make her a visit.

Miss. Ann's men with her. We are having very cold weather now. Mr. Silver spent last night on the mountain and brought down a quantity of snow this morning. This evening Della and I made some ice cream. Mrs. Quiley & Mrs. Gunn called this P.M.

22<sup>nd</sup> Sat. Mother has been quite sick today. She was troubled her head so that I took the girls to Kealima as soon as possible after dinner, and kept them there as long as possible.

23<sup>rd</sup> Sat. Mother still poorly. I did not go to church.

24<sup>th</sup> Mon. Miss Bingham and Miss Spunt returned yesterday, going to church on their way.

26<sup>th</sup> Wed. Mother, Miss Bingham, Florence Loring, Mrs. Thurston, and Helen went after dinner to a valley in Hamakua to see some falls. While they were gone we had a severe thunder storm, which however did not reach them, and they came home dry.

28<sup>th</sup> Fri. Mrs. Linn invited Miss Carpenter, Miss Bingham, Miss Spunt and myself to tea last night. It was a very pleasant visit. This morning Miss Bingham, Miss Carpenter and Loring rode down to Waialuku, the former in Long Linnings' wagon, and the two latter on horseback. Tomorrow they expect to go from there to ~~Thana~~, Miss Bingham by steamer and Miss Carpenter and Loring over the mountain. In a week Miss Bingham intends to return to Honolulu, and after two weeks Miss Carpenter will come back here.

I will have a vacation while she is gone. Mr. Carranagh came in suddenly upon us last evening. He has come to settle up his affairs at Maikawaas preparatory to leaving the country for Japan. He spent this evening in the basement sorting and packing his things. Father has bought several articles, and he has given a number of old books to us.

1<sup>st</sup> Sat. Mrs. Kavanagh departed this morning. Went with the girls to Kalina. Soon after my return Messrs. Willfong and Mrs. Armstrong rode into the yard in a wagon. They are going to spend the Sabbath here. They said that Mrs. Theodore Gulick came to Washku yesterday by the "Navi." His family will probably follow soon to continue on Maui a few months.

2<sup>nd</sup> Sat. Taught the girls their Sat. Sch. lessons and went to church with them this P. M.

I have not done such a hard day's work for a great while, and am thoroughly wearied tonight.

3<sup>rd</sup> Mon. Messrs. Willfong & Armstrong spent a part of the afternoon at Mr. Green's, and later Mrs. Thurston and Helen came down to tea.

4<sup>th</sup> Tues. We finished the washing in good season. Lorin got back from L-duna at 8<sup>00</sup> this A. M.

5<sup>th</sup> Wed. Mother and Mrs. Thurston have spent the day at Henry Baldwin's. His sister Emily is visiting there now, who is to be married to Mr. Atwater, Lahaina, in a few weeks. Father did not have school with the girls and they finished the ironing before noon.

6<sup>th</sup> Thurs. Father's and Mother's "Tin Wedding" Lorin gave them a few presents which he had obtained at Lahaina.

7<sup>th</sup> Fri. Mother made over a hundred

turnless of jelly today. I am preparing  
 to go down to Waikuku tomorrow with  
 some girls, and stay until Monday.  
 10<sup>th</sup> Mon. I went to Waikuku Saturday, and  
 staid at Capt. Willfong's, while the three girls  
 went to Waikuku that is Mary Ann, Keala  
 and Hannah Johnson. That afternoon  
 I made calls did shopping, &c. Sabbath  
 morning, attended the foreign church, and  
 heard Mr. Gulick, the pulpit from John 3. 7.  
 "Ye must be born again." The chief heads of the  
 Sermons were, 1. Who are addressed in the text,  
 2. The necessity of the new birth. 3. What it is  
 to be born again. He then propounded these  
 two questions, How can a man be born again?

13<sup>th</sup> Thurs. Father went down to Waukegan to teacher's convention this morning to return on Sat. We received letters from Miss Carpenter today, this P. M. made over 52 tumblers of jelly. Mrs. Gray and Louisa Lake ate dinner here.

14<sup>th</sup> Fri. Florence has been sick a few days with a strange eruption on the skin. Luella and I, also some of the girls are affected by the same. We cleaned Laurin's room this morning, and Mr. Sevier has been white-washing it. Carrie Wilcox has come here to school.

15<sup>th</sup> Sat. The disease proves to be the chicken-pox. Florence suffers a good deal. Miss Carpenter and Mr. Forbes came up with Father this afternoon, having spent last night at Waukegan.

16<sup>th</sup> Sat. Mr. Forbes preached at the foreign church, but neither of us girls went, for fear of spreading the chicken-pox.

17<sup>th</sup> Mon. Mr. Forbes returned to L-hima.

24<sup>th</sup> Mon. It has been stormy for the last few days, though it cleared up yesterday sufficiently to go to church comfortably, yet people did not go out much. Mrs. Smith and a Mrs. Cooke who came Sat. spent the Sabbath here. They will go back to Hawaii on the steamer tomorrow.

25<sup>th</sup> Tues. A. Miss Parks who is traveling on the Islands came up from the steamer today and will stay in Makawao a few days.

Mrs. H. Baldwin called this afternoon with Capt. Hallet and his wife, the captain of the "Morning Star". Lorrin Thurston came up on the "Libania" to spend his vacation at home, also Meinmie Hobson, Mrs. Chickering a Punahele teacher, and Mrs. The. Gulick, to join her husband at Waikuku.

## March.

26<sup>th</sup> Wed. Capt and Mrs. Hallett and Mrs. Chickering came up this afternoon to spend the night here, and go up on the mountain tomorrow accompanied by Miss Park.

27<sup>th</sup> Thurs. The weather was dubious this morning but the party went up, though we fear that they are having a hard time tonight as it is quite stormy down here.

28<sup>th</sup> Fri. Mrs. Chickering came down this morning and reported that the rest of the party were going to remain on the mountain another night. We made 144 tumbblers of jelly today.

29<sup>th</sup> Sat. The party came down this morning completely drenched. They had a hard time last night, and started down early this morning.

30<sup>th</sup> Sat. Miss Annis, my mother and sisters Capt and Mrs. Hallett went to church though it was rainy.

31<sup>st</sup> Mon. Kate Spay and Minnie Robson called this afternoon. Mrs. Bishop came in upon us at breakfast very unexpectedly, and left again for home at about 10:30 A. M. Our guests went over to Mrs. Green's to tea. It has been a magnificent day. The first quarter of the year is gone. I have had wonderful and blessed experiences during this time for which I praise my God.

1<sup>st</sup> Tues. Capt and Mrs. Heallet went down to Mr. Baldwin's this morning.

2<sup>nd</sup> Wed. Father, Mother and Miss Park took a long ride going to Heaiku by way of Midsouth, and were gone nearly all day. Capt. Heallet and his wife had just arrived at Sam. Alexander's house when they reached there.

We are having very cloudy weather, and for the last two evenings, magnificent sunsets.

6<sup>th</sup> Sun. Went to Woman's meeting at the church this afternoon. Capt. his wife, and Miss Park spent the evening at Capt. Hobson's.

7<sup>th</sup> Wed. Our guests went out riding to a water-fall maaka of Piholo.

the two former to make a short visit and return and the latter on her way to Honolulu. We four children were invited to a party at Capt. Hobron's in celebration of Missie's birthday. We had a very pleasant time, playing games &c. until after nine o'clock. 11<sup>th</sup> Sat. Mrs. Bailey turned his face homeward this afternoon.

12<sup>th</sup> Sat. Went to Kalena with the girls. We received an American mail and three letters from our absent ones. Lucy has been sick, first with congestion of the lungs, and immediately after with an abscess in her ear. She sent her picture, which is very fine.

1<sup>st</sup> Thurs. We went last evening to see Elocutionary entertainment given at the foreign church by a Mrs. Demorest who is traveling. He is very young, not appearing over 20 years old, and over-acted his pieces, though he seems to have the elements of a good Elocutionist, and may prove this after a few years.

The girls have had a holiday today. Father equiped three ox-carts and a few of the girls rode on horse-back, and went to the woods at the Garden place, which Father has recently bought in company with Mrs. Cooke, from Hawaii. There is a plantation of three thousand trees, from which we picked several bushels of coffee, and then had a picnic under the Kew-wood trees. Miss Carpenter was there all day, and Luella, Florence and Helen went over during the forenoon. Mother and Mrs. Thurston, here at the Sem., were making jelly.

Mrs. Hobson and Miss Gray called this P.M. 3<sup>rd</sup> Sat. Father and Mother went down to Manukū and were gone all day. On account of the rain, we did not go to Keolu.

10<sup>th</sup> Sat. Miss Carpenter went down to Capt. Hobson this forenoon. After dinner I went with the girls to Keolu, and then to Capt. Hobson with Maria Wilson and returned in the evening with Miss Carpenter.

11<sup>th</sup> Sat. Went to hear Mr. Green. He preached from Mal. 3. 10.

12<sup>th</sup> Mon. Seventeen Seabainaduna students including four of this year's graduates called in this morning to visit the school and house. The yearly examination of Se-luna occurred last week. Father has a few boys from there to work for him during the vacation.

17<sup>th</sup> Sat. Went with the girls to Halenal.

18<sup>th</sup> Sat. It was rainy this morning, but Sewella Laurin and Miss Bruns went to church. I regretted much when they returned that I had not gone, for Mr. Theo. Gulick preached. He is at H. Baldwin's house with his family. I went to the native church this afternoon with Miss Carpenter and the girls, and we got quite wet in going.

19<sup>th</sup> Mon. Father and Mother went down and called at Capt. Hobson's and H. Baldwin's.

20<sup>th</sup> Tues. Miss Carpenter and I called this P.M. at Henry Baldwin's, and <sup>also on</sup> Mrs. J. Alexander. Mr. Gulick is operating there now, and expressed his intention to come up here with his family this week. He came to Neakawac last Thursday.

23<sup>rd</sup> Fri. Mr. Gulick and his family came up this afternoon to make a visit with us. Miss Carpenter and Mother were gone to ride in the woods when they came.

24<sup>th</sup> Sat. Mrs. Gulick has been operating on Abigail's teeth today. I went to bathe with the girls.

25<sup>th</sup> Sat. We went to hear Mrs. Gulick's preach-  
at the church. She preached from Eph 2. 13.  
She showed first, the condition of the Jews and  
Gentiles before Christ was brought nigh, and then  
dwelt on the privileges of those who are made  
nigh by the blood of Christ. This afternoon  
he explained to us children, as his listeners,  
several passages of Scripture, and again  
this evening. I enjoy his conversation exceeding-  
ly, he is so earnest, and yet simple and sincere.

1st Sat. Mr. Gulick finished his work here

I enjoyed his visit! I trust I have learned

He spoke first directly about Jesus, then he showed what it is to know Jesus, finally he put the question, Do you know Jesus? Florence and I returned home this forenoon. Immediately after the examination there was a rush for the dining room and for more than two hours those who sold the things were kept busy. Many of the girls went home for a short vacation, and tonight there are only 19 left.

11<sup>th</sup> Fri. Nearly 200 dollars were cleared in the fair yesterday. It is to be used to buy an organ for the school room. Two more girls went home today. Peter Amay, who is here now did our family washing, and the girls did a part of theirs. This P.M. the large girls went to ride.

12<sup>th</sup> Sat. The girls rode over to the Wildcat place and gathered figs and strawberry guava.

13<sup>th</sup> Sab. I stayed at home this morning, but went to church with the girls this P.M. I partook of the Lord's Supper today, the second time only.

- 25<sup>th</sup> Fri. I have spent the last few days in preparing sewing, cutting &c. Father, Mother and Kelli went to Pullhu this afternoon.
- 26<sup>th</sup> Sat. Went to Kalma with the girls.
- 27<sup>th</sup> Sat. Went to native church this P. M. with the girls. Father went to Leckia this morning. The people of that place sent for him to go and administer the sacrament. He did not return until late this afternoon, and this evening told us about the meeting. Twenty persons were admitted into the church, and several baptized.

1873

July.

29<sup>th</sup> Mon Spent the forenoon in cleaning the pictures in the parlor, living room, the dining-room and Mother's room. This afternoon, went with the girls to bathe in a pond below Alaala.

30<sup>th</sup> Tues. Mother and Mrs. Thurston went to call at Grove Ranch and Sunny Side. It is Francis's birthday. She and Luella spent the afternoon at Mrs. Wilbur's.  
31<sup>st</sup> Tues. Several girls have come back. Luella and Florence went with them to bathe this P. M. below Alaala.

August.

1<sup>st</sup> Fri. Nine girls came back today making our number 37.

2<sup>nd</sup> Sat. Went with the girls to bathe and get fish. A native woman named Margaret Nape and her little boy came in the steamer from Hawaii today, to stay here a few weeks.

3<sup>rd</sup> Sat. Went with the girls to church.

4<sup>th</sup> Mon. Several girls came today and Father commenced teaching school this morning. A large American mail arrived this afternoon. Among the letters was one to me, from Lucy, written at Shint where she is spending her summer vacation. She sent photographs of the University Hall and grounds.

1878.

August.

12<sup>th</sup> Sat. Last week P. Ama white washed painted <sup>our bed room</sup> ~~up~~ up and put down again the mattress. It looks greatly improved. Mother received a letter from Miss Carpenter yesterday in which she says she is improving and will come back in two weeks.

Father and Mother teach school. I teach Luella & Florence in Arithmetic, Florence in Grammar and Lorin and Luella in Latin. John ~~Smith~~ <sup>Smith</sup> came from Hawaii last week to live here a while, and work for Father. Mrs. Kape returned to Keolu today taking home Annie Kaapia.

14<sup>th</sup> Thurs. Mrs. Black & her boy and Bella Cornwell came this afternoon to stay here and go up on the mountain with a party tomorrow. They went up this evening to a "Magic Lantern" show given by Mr. Clark.

15<sup>th</sup> Fri. The party started from here about noon. This P. M. we arranged the parlor, which P. Ama painted Wed. and he cleaned and painted mother's room, this P. M.

16<sup>th</sup> Sat. Our guests came down from the mountain this P. M. and spent the evening at Mrs. Thurston's.

17<sup>th</sup> Sat. Went to church with Mrs. Black and Florence this morning and with the girls this afternoon.

1873.

August.

18<sup>th</sup> Nov. The ladies returned to Waikapeu this morning. We covered a lounge for Miss Carpenter this afternoon. Later this P. M. Dr Adams, Surgeon of the "Costa Rica" his wife, and a young man by the name of Lee came and asked for lodgings to night with the intention of going up on the mountain in time to see the sun rise tomorrow morning.

19<sup>th</sup> Tues. It was raining this morning so that the party did not get started until 9 oc. A M. A short note came by the "Mori" from Miss Carpenter saying that she would come up to Maui in the Steamer.

20<sup>th</sup> Wed. The party spent the night on the mountain, had a fine view this morning got down to dinner, and went to Wailuku this afternoon, by express-man. Miss Carpenter came up this forenoon from Wailuku where she spent the night. Mr. Castle ate dinner here. An American mail came this afternoon, but all from Lucy was a few letters written by Samuel to her, on his tour in canvassing for books. One was written from Wyoming, Ill. where he was sick of fever & ague. Mr. Theo. Gulick sent me a very good letter by Miss Carpenter.

1873.

August.

21<sup>st</sup> Tues. The washing was blated this week on account of the rain and the girls ironed today. Father, Mother and Florence went to Hankow this afternoon.

23<sup>rd</sup> Sat. Went to Helena with the girls.

24<sup>th</sup> Sat. Went to the foreign church this morning. Mr. Green preached from Acts 24: 5.

25<sup>th</sup> Mon. Commenced teaching a class in Arithmetic.

27<sup>th</sup> Wed. Mrs. Hobson and Anna Bailey called.

28<sup>th</sup> Thurs. Commenced reciting to Miss Carpenter. Wrote to Lucy and to Mr. Gulick.

29<sup>th</sup> Fri. Mrs. Hobson brought Mrs. Poque up in her carriage to make a visit here.

30<sup>th</sup> Sat. Rainy all day so that we did not go to father. This afternoon Mr. Sharatt came up in his buggy with his little boy and Willie Bailey. Mrs. Poque wished to call on Mrs. Green, so Willie drove her over, while Mr. Sharatt staid to supper. There was a magnificent sunset this evening; the whole western sky was glowing with brilliant light.

31<sup>st</sup> Sat. Went to the foreign church with Miss Carpenter and Mrs. Poque.

Mr. Green preached from Acts 26: 28, 29.

Another month is gone, and as I enter a new one, I hope to make more improvements.

1873. September.

1<sup>st</sup> Mon. Mrs. Hearcock and Mrs. Everett came here to dinner. Later, Mrs. Gray came in her carriage and took Mrs. Poove back to Grove Ranch.

2<sup>nd</sup> Tues. Mother and Miss Carpenter rode up to Mrs. Thurston's this evening.

3<sup>rd</sup> Wed. Florence and I went out for a little horseback ride, this afternoon. The American mail today brought a long letter from Lucy, also one written by Samuel and a postal card from him.

4<sup>th</sup> Thurs. Wrote to Lucy this P. M.

5<sup>th</sup> Fri. Hattie Wick's mother came today in the steamer from Hawaii to make a visit.

6<sup>th</sup> Sat. Mother, Miss Carpenter and Mrs. Thurston went to Capt. Robinson's this afternoon and returned in the evening. Suella and Florence spent the time with Helen Thurston. I went to Kalaena with the girls. This evening I had a good talk with Father. He gave me some new ideas on education, and great ones also.

7<sup>th</sup> Sat. Mr. Silver has staid here today. It was rainy this morning so none of us went to church. I went to the native church this P. M. Mother has been quite unwell.

8<sup>th</sup> Sun. Miss Maggie Hearay, Mrs. Thurston's niece came in the steamer from Honolulu.

1873. September.

to make a visit at Mrs. Thurston's.

11<sup>th</sup> Thurs. Father started at 10 o'clock to go to Lahama and attend court, but at the top of the mountain he met Mli returning from that town saying that the court had adjourned on account of the non-arrival of the governor.

Father immediately turned back and reached home at 8 o'clock this morning.

This evening Luella, Florence and I went and called on Maggie Hardy.

13<sup>th</sup> Sat. The children went with Helen, Maggie and Laura down to Kapiki valley in the lake basin and spent a few hours.

We had a fine bath and a picnic on the rocks under the trees.

14<sup>th</sup> Sat. There were no services at the foreign church for Mrs. Green went to preach at Lake.

15<sup>th</sup> Mon. Mrs. Sam Darrow called this P.M.

16<sup>th</sup> Tues. Mrs. Thurston and Maggie came down to dinner and then went to our ranch with Mother, Alf, Carpenter, Luella and Florence, and spent the afternoon.

18<sup>th</sup> Thurs. We all went with the girls to the woods at Pisonai and spent the day. Mrs. Thurston and family went later, and we had a delightful time, picnicking under the trees.



1873.

September.

- 20<sup>th</sup> Sat. Went with the girls to Kalina.
- 21<sup>st</sup> Sat. Went to hear Mrs. Green preach.
- 23<sup>rd</sup> Tues. It is rainy so that the clothes have not dried.
- 24<sup>th</sup> Wed. Evening went hard on account of weather but the girls got through with it late. Florence and Luella walked down to Mrs. Williams. Miss Gray was calling there.
- 25<sup>th</sup> Thurs. The "Mevi" brought a mail from Honolulu. I received a letter from Mrs. Theo. Gulick.
- 26<sup>th</sup> Fri. Mrs. Meiff's carpenter and I went to Kaiker this afternoon and called on Mrs. Alexander and Mrs. Dicky.
- 27<sup>th</sup> Sat. Went with the girls to Kalina. Mother and Meiff's carpenter also went to latter. Luella and Florence went with Mrs. Thurston's family to a bathing place in the woods.
- 28<sup>th</sup> Sat. Went to foreign and native church. Mrs. Green gave a part of his story of his missionary work, this morning. They occupied a long time at the native church with their Sunday school exercises, reviewing the first eleven chapters of Mat.
- 30<sup>th</sup> Tues. Peter Gray made a long call this afternoon.
- Three fourths of this precious year is gone!

1873.

October.

1st. Wed. Leulla and Florence went up on the mountain with a party from the Healeskaala school. They are spending the night on the mountain, and will return tomorrow.

2nd. Thurs. The mountain party returned this afternoon. Mother, Miss Carpenter and I attended Woman's Board meeting at the church. Mother and Father then went to Heales and returned in the evening.

3rd. Fri. Rode up to Healeskaala to call on Maggie Hardy, but they were all playing croquet.

4th. Sat. Went to Kalena as usual.

8th. Wed. We were much disappointed to hear that the steamer "Costa Rica" had not arrived in Honolulu though due a week since.

10th. Fri. Miss Carpenter and I rode down and called at Grove Ranch.

12th. Sat. Went to the native church but Mr. Green was not able to be there on account of sickness. Aukana conducted the services.

14th. Tues. The mail from Honolulu brought a report that the "Costa Rica" was wrecked at the "Golden Gate" in going to San Francisco. No lives lost, and the mails saved.

16th. Wed. Luraina Lake and Miss Polly Weight from Honolulu called this afternoon. South winds are blowing now and many of us have taken cold in the change of weather.

1873.

October.

- 17<sup>th</sup> Fri. Mrs. Thurston and Maggie called.
- 18<sup>th</sup> Sat. Mrs. Thurston and family came down to dinner and spent the afternoon.
- 19<sup>th</sup> I went with Father to Reska where he called to administer the Sacrament. Several were received into the church and several children baptized. We were gone all day, starting after breakfast.
- 24<sup>th</sup> Fri. Father Alexander ate dinner with us today. He reported to us another grand-son by Emily Baldwin. Mrs. Wilbur called this P. M.
- 25<sup>th</sup> Sat. Did not go to Kalena because of rain. An American mail arrived today from the "Keuray" the first we have received for more than seven weeks. We receive a letter from both Samuel and Lucy, written soon before the close of their summer vacation, the former at Amherst and the latter at Kentonville.
- 27<sup>th</sup> Mon. The oil paints for which Mother sent to Samtham by Mrs. Adams, arrived today. Mrs. James Alexander is going to teach Luella and I and also Meinmie Helton. I arde down and called on Meinmie and then on Mrs. Alexander. She will not be ready to begin before two weeks, as she is going to Wadiluker for a visit first. Miss Mary Wright came up to make a visit of a day or two.
- 28<sup>th</sup> Tues. Maggie and Helen came down to play croquet, this afternoon.

1873

October

29<sup>th</sup> Wed. Mary Weight returned to Mrs. Cines. Mother and Miss Carpenter spent the evening at Mrs. Thurston.

30<sup>th</sup> Thurs. Mrs. Wilbur, on her way to a picnic with Mrs. Thurston's family, got caught in a shower and stopped here and spent the remainder of the day. Father started for Sa-haing to go to court.

31<sup>st</sup> Fri. Mother and Miss C. went down to the new store near Henry Baldwin's house, for a ride. Father returned this evening.

November.

1<sup>st</sup> Sat. Florence went down to Wai-lu-ku to attend Mary Alexander's school. She will board at Father Alexander's.

3<sup>rd</sup> Mon. Lorian went down with the cart to fetch furs from Wai-hee.

4<sup>th</sup> Tues. This evening I went with Father and all the girls to a "magic lantern show" given by Mr. Clark at the native church. Wrote a long letter to Lucy and also one to Mr. Gulick.

5<sup>th</sup> Wed. Lorian returned late last evening. He brought a note from Florence.

It was rainy yesterday so that the clothes were not dried until today.

6<sup>th</sup> Thurs. Kalei was married today at 2 o' P. M. to a native of Wai-hee.

1878. November.

They were married by Father in the school room, all the girls being present. After the ceremony cake was passed around, and a short time was spent in a social manner. The couple were obliged to walk down to the store to reach their wagon by which they were to be conveyed to their home, and Miss Carpenter accompanied them with the first grade & second classes of girls as far as the store.

7<sup>th</sup> Fri. The clothes were ironed today.

8<sup>th</sup> Sat. Went with the girls to Kalaena.

Miss Carpenter spent the day at Capt. Kalaena.

10<sup>th</sup> Mon. During the past week I have had a vacation in my studies. I finished the 6<sup>th</sup> book of Virgil the week before and today I commence Cicero de Amicitia. I also begin the 9<sup>th</sup> book of Loomis' Geometry. I have added two names to the list of my music pupils recently. Mary Ann and Abigail.

12<sup>th</sup> Wed. Mary Wright called to say "Goodbye". We received a note from Florence by mail.

13<sup>th</sup> Thurs. Messrs. Alexander and Baldwin called and ate dinner here.

14<sup>th</sup> Fri. Mothers went down with Mrs. Thurston to Waialua to stay until Monday.

We received a note from Florence written yesterday.

1873 November.

15<sup>th</sup> Sat. Luella and I took our first lesson in painting today. It rained hard this morning, but after it ceased we started for Sunday School. We reached Mrs. Hendersons at noon and painted three hours.

16<sup>th</sup> Sat. Rainy all day. Sarah, Luella and Robert Smith went to church this A. M. and as no one else was there he held services with the three alone.

17<sup>th</sup> Mon. Weather returned this morning.

18<sup>th</sup> Tues. Luella and I went down to paint again just after breakfast and staid till noon. Mamma was there today and we went home with her and ate dinner. Mrs. Weston and Mrs. Sharatt and family were here this afternoon.

19<sup>th</sup> Wed. Father went to Wailuku to attend the meeting of Presbytery.

I received a letter from Mr. Kitch by the mail. We expected an American mail today but were disappointed.

20<sup>th</sup> Thurs. Father returned this evening.

22<sup>nd</sup> Sat. Mr. Poque came up from Wailuku to make us a visit.

23<sup>rd</sup> Sun. Mr. Poque was invited to preach at the foreign church but it rained and therefore he addressed the girls.

1873 November

This morning here, and preached at the native Church this afternoon.

24<sup>th</sup> Mon. Old Mr Gray died last night quite unexpectedly.

25<sup>th</sup> Tues. Mr. Poquet went to Lahaina this morning. A few of us went down to Mr. Gray's funeral. Quite a number were present.

28<sup>th</sup> Thurs. Mrs. Thurston and family went to Honolulu by the Moei to stay until Jan. I sent off letters to Lucy and Samuel and one to Mr. Gulick.

We have just received an American mail with a long letter from Lucy Core from Fanny Gulick came to me also. Mother is quite unwell with a sore knee. Luella and I went down to paint. Meinie was not there.

29<sup>th</sup> Sat. Florence came home last night to stay over Sunday.

December

1<sup>st</sup> Mon. Larim went down with Hloaung. They started at two A. M. for the weather looked dubious and threatened rain so bad. We have had rainy weather all this week and it was with difficulty that the washing was finished.

2<sup>nd</sup> Tues. Went to church with Miss Carpenter.



1873 December

8<sup>th</sup> Mon. Sent off a letter to Lucy. Father informed me very suddenly this morning that he did not wish me to study for a few weeks, and I shall have more time to help Mother.

11<sup>th</sup> Tues. Finished a letter to Fanny. Gales A box arrived from Boston containing Bibles, books, scriptures, cards, pictures and other things for which Mother sent to Miss Rice, for Christmas gifts.

12<sup>th</sup> Wed. Luella and I finished our first pictures today, quite satisfactorily. We have taken 8 lessons, two a week. My picture is "Fallen Leaf Lake", Cal. & Luella's is Lake George. Luella will paint next a snow scene from one Merriam has just completed, and I am to copy our chromo "Autumn".

15<sup>th</sup> Mon. Carrie and Hannah gathered up the chest to go home. It is said that there is no money to pay for them.

17<sup>th</sup> Wed. Luella and Mary Ann went down to Wailukee.

18<sup>th</sup> Thurs. Florence came home with Luella and Mary Ann. Miss Alexander's school had an exhibition today, and it is to have a vacation of a few weeks. It is probable that Florence will not return for lack of money.

1873.

December.

20<sup>th</sup> Sat. Went to Kalama. Owing to the late rains there is a great stream rushing through the valley, - largest I have seen before in that river.

21<sup>st</sup> Sat. Mrs. Green has been sick and there were no services at the foreign church. This afternoon a shower came up very suddenly and the girls got wet in coming home from church.

22<sup>nd</sup> Sun. Father and Mother went to Waialua to stay till Wed. Father attends the Teachers Convention.

23<sup>rd</sup> Tues. Raining all day, so that we could not wash.

24<sup>th</sup> Wed. Father and Mother came home this evening. He will go down again tomorrow.

25<sup>th</sup> Thurs. The girls have had a grand time this A. M. they pulled candy, and this evening the dining room was cleared and we all played games.

26<sup>th</sup> Fri. We are to have a vacation of a week, and a few girls went home today.

27<sup>th</sup> Sat. Miss Carpenter went to Waialua to make a short visit. Luella and I went down and took a painting lesson, bringing home our first pictures.

28<sup>th</sup> Sat. Went with the girls to native church.

31<sup>st</sup> Wed. The year is gone! Phil. 3:13, 14.

1874. January.

1<sup>st</sup> Thurs. Luella, Louisa and I were invited to a little "Luau" party at Mrs. Harreco's. Miss Amy Boardman who has recently returned from the States was there and also Mrs. Hibber. We had a very pleasant time.

2<sup>nd</sup> Fri. I have been preparing to go to Honolulu, when a vessel comes to Kihului as one is expected to take Capt. Keobron's family to Oahu. The "Meoi" went ashore on Molo kai in a storm a few days since.

3<sup>rd</sup> Sat. All but three of the girls returned from their homes today. Miss Carpenter will remain in Waipahu till Mon. Florence walks with the school to the job of "Pickols" and to Kalahe.

4<sup>th</sup> Sat. Went with the girls to church this P.M.

5<sup>th</sup> Mon. It was pleasant this morning and therefore Mother had the washings done as pleasant days are so scarce now. Wrote a note to Newboan this evening.

6<sup>th</sup> Tues. Mrs. Thurston and family returned home today by the steamer from Honolulu. The "Misty" came in to Kihului yesterday & I will probably go in her to Honolulu tomorrow.

1874

January.

Wed. 7<sup>th</sup> Went down by Capt. Johnson's expecting to go down with them in the Mary Ellen but they had decided to wait for the steamer, so I returned by another.

Thurs. 8. Received this P.M. that the steamer would sail tomorrow, and Lorrin and I went down to Waikuku to Mrs. Bailey's.

Fri. 9. Called on Miss Alexander, & Mrs. G. Bailey and spent part of afternoon with Mrs. Phillips. Lorrin returned home.

Sat. 10. Rode in express to Merakea, went aboard the steamer about 9 A.M. Reached Lahaina at 11. Mrs. Bishop insisted on me up to L-luna but no horse. Spent this afternoon at Mrs. Girvin's. Annie and Lucy were there. Minnie went ashore after lunch. At 4:30 P.M. went off to steamer quite stormy.

Sun. 11. After a very rough passage we arrived at Honolulu at near 10 A.M. Rode up to Kawaiahae Sem. in Punahele express with Clara Shipman. Miss Ingraham welcomed me. Bathed, and soon Miss McCully and Clara Moseley came from church, both greeted me warmly. After lunch Clara sang and read from Bible. At 3:30 P.M. went with Clara and the girls to a funeral at Kawaiahae church. Mrs. Barker's address from 1 P.M. to 4:7.

17. Sat. Miss Ingraham drove out and brought me back to Kaysville. P. M. Rode into town and stopped, then, to Mrs. Atherton's for a Lottie play. Clara and I spent a part of the eve. at Mrs. Coates, then went with the girls to "cookie party" at Mrs. Cook's.
18. Sun. Clara, and I rode with the Coates to Fort St. Sab. School. At church, Mrs. Spear preached from Eph. 2:8. It rained all day so that we did not go out again. Read a precious little pamphlet, "Musings on the Spirit is the Teacher."
19. Mon. Mrs. Jones sent for carriage for me to go and make her a visit. P. M. Rode to town with Mrs. Jones. Dined at home.

23. Fri. Rode down to the mission and then up the valley calling on Mrs. Thurston & at "Loa Dove," Mary Johnson called. Wrote to my sisters, Mother and Carrie Johnsons. Saw heard Dr. Hoffman play on Mr. Healle's piano.

24. Sat. Went out with Mrs. Jones and the Healle to Waikiki where the children had a sea bath. Saw returning. I stopped at Ryden's for dinner, about to see Carrie Castle, then rode out with Clara and called on Meinie & Miss. Char. Berlin Ella Paris & Mrs. Curtis and Julia. Did not go out anywhere in the evening.

18 Sun. Mr. Grear preached at the foreign church on John 4: 9. P. M. went with the girls to meeting and heard Mer. Gulick speak from 1 John 5: 11 & 12.

20 Mon. A. M. Washing. P. M. Painting. Brought home my picture. Began painting from a little chromo of fruit.

21<sup>st</sup> Tues. Mr. Grear's family, Mrs. Green & Frank Mer. Gulick, Hayneet & Lavin started for the top of the mountain.

22 Wed. Father, Mother & Rachel rode down to Hailuku in Mr. Green's carriage which is to be repaired there. Father rode the horse back this eve. The mountain party returned this P. M. having had a fine time. They were especially successful in finding beautiful specimens of silver, woods. Mr. Grear & Lavin descended the crater, & did not reach here till dark.

July.

Mrs. H. Alexander came up to have dental work done while she stays here a few days. Mrs. Heavest, Amy B., Dorcas Richardson with her brother and sister & Miss Hutchinson called.

23. Thurs. Morn. I worked all day on Mrs. Alexander's teeth, putting in silver fillings. P.M. Mr. & Mrs. Willfong rode up from Heavest to spend the night here. Packed over to Mrs. Green's with Mrs. Willfong & in the evening Mr. & Mrs. Green called here. Mr. Tellman also called.

24. Fri. Capt. & Mrs. Willfong returned this A.M. Mrs. Alexander went home this P.M.

25. Sat. Mr. Guelick & we girls called on the Freed, Mrs. Friedman, and at Mrs. Wilford. The family returned today to the house which they need to occupy. I did not see her because she had retired.

25. Sat. Luella went with a small party to spend the day in <sup>Amie & W. came up</sup> Hamarua.

26. Sun. Mr. Streat preached. I did not go. P.M. Had a pleasant meeting with the little girls.

27. Mon. Mother returned this P.M. Lavin & I are expecting to go to Heilo by the Steamy tomorrow. Spent the day in making preparations.

1874 July Heils.  
 29<sup>th</sup> Wed. We reached here this A. M. at 11 o'clock after a passage, somewhat rough, but otherwise quite agreeable. We are to stay at Ed. Hitchcock's while we remain in Heils, probably, two weeks. After a delicious bath, and lunch I wrote home and then called at Mrs. Coan's where Miss Carpenter & Clara Mesdley are staying. Saw Miss Haven who leaves today with Frank Damon on the steamer for Kona. Ev. Went to a festival in the new school-house, where refreshments were sold for the purpose of getting means to pay for desks. Miss Sims called to see me this P. M. Met Mrs. Lydgate this eve. and he kindly offered to assist me in marking my ferns.

30 Thurs. Florence 14<sup>th</sup> Saturday. A. M. Did a little sewing. After lunch went with Clara & Mary H. up to David Hitchcock's house, where we got Ella to go with us to Waialuku valley. We bathed and then rambled about for ferns. Ev. Went with Loren to prayer meeting. Med. Lyman conducted. The special subject - trusting in the Lord. Only a few were there, but I was

refreshed. John Lygates expressed such a simple trust, and seemed to have such freedom from bondage, that I was both surprised and delighted.

31<sup>st</sup> Fri. Mr. Ed. H. went to Papacko yesterday to coroner August, and returned this morning at 1 o'clock. An aged man & his wife were murdered probably last Mon. by one who wished to procure their money. The guilty one has been suspected but not yet detected. A. M. visited the Union School.

August

1<sup>st</sup> Sat. Rained this A. M. After lunch went to call at Mr. Coan's and was asked to stay to dinner. Called on Miss Arms. After dinner went with Clara, Lavin and the children to ride, going on the seashore out as far as Coconut Islands then up to the Cemetery in Quaker.

2<sup>nd</sup> Sat. Went to the foreign church this A. M. Dr. Wetmore read a sermon on Luke 2:12, addressed to children. P. M. attended communion service at Mr. Coan's church. Eve. Went to Monthly Society meeting. John Lygates in the chair.

3<sup>rd</sup> Sat. Roman Catholic countries especially considered.

1874

August

3 Mon. A. M. Went up to David Hitchcock's. Ella took me around in the garden, and gave me several different kinds of seeds. P. M. Went with Rocky to "Kegimboon" falls, and then went to see Waikapu, in the valley. After dinner called on Mrs. Fred. Lyman of Meigs Richardson County back. I met Em. Napoleon, after walking a little ways we met Mrs. Coan, Meiff. C., & Clara, and we went with the two latter to Hagiluku bridge. I was asked to spend the night at Mrs. Coan's, and I accepted.

4 Tues. Rode up to Pepe falls, with Clara, Ella & Lorian. We staid some time, and gathered beautiful ferns. I borrowed a mule from Rufus Lyman's and rode astride.

5 Wed. A. M. Was asked to go with the Coan's to Coconut Island, but it rained and the party was given up. Lorian & I went later and visited Mrs. Lyman's school. After lunch I went with Clara to call on Lily Lydgate and see Mrs. Lydgate's school. After dinner called with Clara at Mrs. Goldson's and David Hitchcock's.

1874. August.

Mr. Ed. H. went again to the scene of the murder yesterday-morn. & returned this eve. Loring & D. expect to go and visit the volcano tomorrow.

6<sup>th</sup> Thurs. Started at 6.30 A.M. and after a long ride (29 miles) we reached the Volcano House at 2.30 P.M. Had a sulphure bath, which was very refreshing. The weather was foggy early in the evening, but later it cleared away and we could see the fires of the volcano, quite distinctly in the distance.

7<sup>th</sup> Fri. At 8 A.M. we descended into the crater, went to the south lake, Healemausmanu, where we could see the fire in three different parts, the one near which we stood, showing the most activity. After watching it some time we went to the "Devil's pots" where the lava flowed in an under-ground stream, which could be seen through holes, or caves on the surface. Turning them in a different direction we crossed on an old flow of lava to a large cave, which had evidently been a huge under-ground cavern, but

the surface fell in at one place, by means of an earthquake. There were found stalactites & stalagmites of black lava, of all shapes and sizes, many of them covered with salt crystallizations. We were in the crater six hours in all. Soon after returning to the Volcan House, Mr. Buda with Cora Hitchcock, Sally King and Miss Papke arrived there from Kani on their way to Heilo.

After dinner Mr. Stackpole, a young man living there, went with me to find some fungi, and to visit the sulphur beds, where were the most exquisitely delicate crystals of sulphur in the steam holes, as fine as snow. In the eve. the girls had a jolly time, toasting bread at the open fire place and playing "Jack alive." Mr. Silliman, our kind host, brought in strawberries, and we enjoyed a delicious treat.

8 o'clk set out on our return from the Heilaneas at 5.30 A.M. and rode leisurely to farm our horses. The other party which started at 1 o'clock overtook us at the woods seven

writes from Heils. I am very little fatigued by the excursions. Eve. called with Louisa at Mr. Coan's and Dr. Wetmore. The latter was called away soon after we went in, and John Lydgate called while we were there.

He expects to go on a surveying excursion fresh, to be absent several days so that he will not be able to mark my ferns for me.

9. Sun. Went to Sun. Sc. at the meeting church - afterwards attended at the Foreign church. D. Hitchcock read a discourse on Rom. 12:11. P. M. went to Sun. Sc. at the same church.

10. Morn. Mrs. Hitchcock is unwell, and I helped about the housework this A. M. After lunch went to Mr. Coan's to visit until Wednesday. Eve. called at Dr. Wetmore's and he showed us one of his fern collections of also some most beautiful Quercus ferns which had been given to him.

11. Tues. A. M. Went up to Mr. Hitchcock's and arranged my ferns, afterwards marked some of them. Made some tatted edging for Miss Anna. P. M. Went to supper at David's. Wet.

1874

August

Mr. & Mrs. Coan. Meigs Co. of Clara.  
 12 Wed. Went with Meigs Co. & called  
 at Fred Lyman's. The latter by their  
 guides, took us to see the "Meigs" falls  
 in the valley. He rambled around  
 and then came up into Mrs. Reed's  
 gardens, and looked at his plants.  
 Went to David Hill and got slips  
 of wood &c. and then called on Mother.  
 Lyman and Emma. P. M. Meigs Co.  
 took me to call at Mrs. Meigs's to  
 see his stuffed birds, and pictures  
 of them to Mrs. Akar, Lily Sniffen's  
 sister. I was very much pleased to  
 find such nice boxes & so neatly  
 kept by her. The "Keilauca" arrived  
 at 2.30 P. M. bringing the representa-  
 tives from Legislature. George Castle  
 came up to teach in the foreign school.  
 P. M. Packed my trunk. At 3 o'clock dined  
 at Mrs. Coan's. Meigs Co. of Clara  
 went down town with us; as it  
 was early we waited a while at  
 Mrs. Lydgate's, and then going down  
 towards the wharf we waited at a  
 store again. Finally the steamer got  
 off at 6 o'clock, an hour later than  
 we had expected.

August

13. Thurs Sailed at Punaiahi & after wards at the Keau landing. P. M. Sailed along a most barren & rugged coast of "Paahoe". Stopped at four different places during the night. 6 Land Representatives, one of which was Kealakekua, Kai.
14. Fri. At daylight, bearing Kauraiha beautiful view of Mauna Loa, Hea-lalaia & Mauna Kea, and a brilliant sunrise. At 8 A. M. anchored at Kauraiha. Lorrin & I went ashore. Frank Damon, who had come from Waianua the day previous met us at the wharf and took us upstairs in Mers. Chillingworth's store. After a pleasant respite from the voyage, of one or two hours, we went off to the Steamer, Mers. Damon on his way to Honolulu. At Meahukona Mers. H. Logan & Letara. Night came aboard, the former bouncer for Waikiki. The Capt came across the Keaukai channel entirely by sail and reached Meahukona at dark. We lay there all night and the next morning.
15. Sat. Mers. & Mers. Wilder came on board at 10c. from Capt. Mers. Keel

We reached Makalaea at 10 A.M.  
Found Kaholua with horses for us.  
Reached home at 1 P.M. Mrs.

Black & Mary Siders are visiting here.  
Luella had gone with them to ride.  
36 girls have returned.

16 Sun. Father went to Keokea to  
preach. I had meeting with the  
girls at 11 A.M. and went to  
church with them. Mr. Father reached  
home this eve. quite exhausted.

17. Mon. Helped Mother some in sew-  
ing, cutting patchwork, &c.

18 Tues. Luella went with our guests  
to the top of the mountains, Mr.

Rodgers <sup>and Miss</sup> Meagie, also in the party.

19. Wed. The mountain party returned  
at noon. - a very successful excursion.

20 Thurs. Mr. Treat and family were  
up to dinner. P.M. Mrs. Black rode  
down to "Grove Ranch." Grandma  
Bailey, who has come up to Charles's  
ranch spent the afternoon. Mrs. Peter-  
scot & Amy called. Mr. Black came  
near eve. from Lahaina to go down  
with his wife to Honolulu.

21 Fri. Mr. & Mrs. Black, Mr. Siders & Mrs.  
Treat's family went down on the Moei.

August.

- 22 Sat. Went with the girls to bath.
- 23 Sun. Went to the native church with the school thro P. M.
- 24 Mon. Mr. Bailey came up to stay till Wed. P. M. Cleaned Miss C's room.
- 25 Tues. Mr. Bailey went out to gather ferns. He wished me to go with him but a horse could not be found. This eve. he returned with his case full of most beautiful specimens of many kinds.
- 26 Wed. Mr. Bailey left after breakfast. An auction sale of Leo Loy's goods. Father went to it & purchased a lot of things. Ever. Master to Mrs. Coan.
- 27 Thurs. Luella & Florence & Lorin began studying again this week, reciting to Mother.
- 28 Fri. Mrs. Giles & her children came up from Mrs. Hibbs. to make a visit here.
- 29 Sat. Miss Carpenter returned from Hills on the Steamer, & reached here this P. M. Mr. Giles came up from Nailwukus to spend Sunday with his family.
- 30 Sun. He did not go out to meeting.
- 31<sup>st</sup> Mon. Mrs. Hibbs came up to dinner, & spent part of the afternoon. Miss C. began teaching. Mr. Hatchcock called.

1874 September

1<sup>st</sup> Tues. Miss Karen & Lottie Alexander called on their way from the mountain horse to Sunny Side. P. M. Mother went up to call state with Mrs. Bailey.

Flourish & I went to Calcalala school to see Mr. Hitchcock's farms, & to call on Maggie, American mail. Long letters from Ann. & Lucy, 26 pages in all. I received a letter from Hanson Gulick also.

2<sup>nd</sup> Wed. Went with Miss Mary & Charles Alexander & Miss Coon far into the woods. After reaching the house built of bark where the bulldock hunters sometimes camp out, we formed a picnic & then went on through the dense woods & underbrush in a track which had been cut through the Hamakua.

We reached Kapuai hill, near Kipiki valley at sun-down. Here the rest of the party turned off on the road to Hainu & I rode home alone. I spent the evening in arranging my ferns for pressing. I found several kinds which I had not got before.

3<sup>rd</sup> Thurs. Mrs. Giles went down to Grove Ranch Tues. & returned today.

She has recently lost her baby, but has been led to rejoice in Jesus, & seems very happy.

September.

4<sup>th</sup> Fri. Luella & I went to call on Miss Boardman, but she had gone to Hamakua to get shoes and we met her on our way home. We called at Mrs. Harcourt's afterwards.

5<sup>th</sup> Sat. Mrs. Kilg & her children returned to Hailuku. We attempted to go to Kealana this P. M., but were prevented by the rain. The King, Keafakana, arrived at Napuwaa late in the day, & he called here this eve. after visiting the Kealiakala School.

6<sup>th</sup> Sun. His Majesty attended services at the native meeting-house this P. M. & later started with his train, to go to Uluhalakua, whence a vessel is to convey him to Honolulu.

7<sup>th</sup> Mon. Tutu & Neothu rode to Hailuku.

8. Tues. Mrs. Bailey came up from Hailuku.

9. Wed. Florence & I went up on the mountain side with Mrs. Bailey a ferning.

10. Thurs. Mrs. Harcourt & Amy B. were here to tea. Recd. from Mrs. Gulick.

Mr. Bailey returned home.

11. Sat. Went with the girls to see Pahukula, gather figs & bathe in the valley.

13 Sat. Florence & Luella went to meeting with Miss C.

14. Mon. Luella & I began painting again.



September.

- 15 Tues I began to copy Mr. Bailey's Bierstadt's Sunset: to paint at home.
- 16 Wed. Florence & I went this P. M. into the valley back of Pihlo, to gather ferns.

- 26 Sat. Painted again on my picture. Miss C. went with the girls to Kyalua. Father & Florence went to Wailuku, he, expecting to preach there tomorrow. Timae Kuaca is here now making a visit. Wrote to Mary Hitchcock.
