

Jan 6th 1851.

Dear sister W.

I will give you the first date this year & date also this evening altho I know there are over 20 dozen things I ought to be doing - I was very sorry to learn by yours of the 30th that you had not received letters which have sent very soon after the sailing of the ~~treasure~~ on the 9th of Dec - Mrs. Dole & others made but hope before this you have rec'd the package. It must be very trying to have so seldom we had a little experience in the matter when our eldest was at Worcester in the spring -

We had a pleasant visit with your husband. We have so little leisure that without one stays some time we have no opportunity of having much visit.

He was cheerful & kindly but appeared perplexed somewhat by Mr. Eastles plan to have the operations performed here & he appeared happy & full of life.

You have our earnest wishes that this year success of all your plans for him & that both may have a speedy & safe return.

Mr. Wilcox expressed much solicitude for you all especially in case the cholera should reach the Islands. Let me hope yet we hope that we may be spared.

We have thus far enjoyed very good health in our great family but have a little influenza among us now. Charles has had a touch but is well again.

Both Charles & George seem to be very healthy & appear happy. Georges face is like the summer sun always bright & pleasanter - but sometimes carries play where it ought not to be, but always bears a word of reproof on the subject. They are industrious usually in school & when I have had occasions to reprove them they have always appeared to make an effort to do as I wished. I hear their lessons in spelling in reading & a Bible lesson. Charles is the best spelled in his class - & George does very well. Miss Smith says they are improving in Music. too ^{the} ~~the~~ ^{indeed} She devotes nearly all her evenings

Miss Smith gives all her time to the school scarcely reserving ~~though~~ to keep her own clothes in order - as to write a note to a friend & this is the reason Mrs. Doherty's note do not receive a reply. She ^{has} always made Mrs. Dale & myself do all the reporting to parents. Sarah & Edward are well & doing very well. I believe pleasant members of the family - indeed we have a pleasant family but the constant

burden & care seem at times almost insupportable. My Duties & labors hardly allow me time to leave home once a fortnight even for a ride.. Our natives have both been sick of late but are better now -

Mr. Rice has nearly regained his health but says it will ^{not} be practicable for him to visit Hawaii next vacation with your sons - He would like to go but it is the former busy season he has attended to your requests respecting the new Years gift for C. B. G. & Songs to have mentioned before that I rec'd a note from you just after I sent the one you mention in your last. You speak in that of people in regard to the path of duty. I trust that you more full satisfied in your course & that the result will confirm you in your decisions.

It is quite a time of health at Honolulu & the French do not alarm us. Indeed we have peace on our borders & an abundance of earthly blessings & those I fear satisfy too many as it is a time of great indifference to religious truth. The Word of God seems to fall powerless especially ~~among~~ the foreign population though ^{we} of us are feeling that it is high time for another church at H. A. pastor devoted to the foreigners -
