Dear Bro Wiley

Your note by the mail was rec^d
this P. M. and I was glad to hear that you all are
so comfortable - The baby "has the sniffles" but is
well in other respects. I am glad to hear that he
is not suffering with that much talked of & much-
dreaded diarrhoea. Mrs. W. we infer is doing
well, as neither you or Bro. J. said anything
about her in your letter to day. So I am happy to
hope that you have not suffered seriously on
account of my leaving you at the time I did. -

Mr Morgan departed this life this morning
at 5 o'clock. He has been gradually sinking since
my return. For most of the time for the last month
he has been a great sufferer. He had resided here
about 2 years. His manner of life has been
correct so far as we know & we have had our
sympathies considerably excited on his behalf.
He was not professedly pious but for the last
month or two he has manifested a good deal
of solicitude for the salvation of his soul and
we are not without hope that he truly trusted
in the Savior. He is gone, and whatever was
his character it is now fix for eternity. The
funeral will be attended to morrow.

We hope to visit Navioli soon - perhaps
next week - or week after.
