

Hairna Feb. 17th 1858.

Dear Sister W.

I felt disappointed on receiving your letter last evening though I was somewhat prepared for it by the communication of Mr. Ohamberlain to B. S. saying that he had sent a vessel for you. I thought it very probable that the vessel would arrive at H. before you would leave, and I hope you have gone more comfortably than you would by land. If so I rejoice in the Providence which wafted it to your station though it has been a disappointment to me. We had many anxious thoughts about you especially on Thurs day evening, but felt that all would be added right concerning you. Many thanks to you for writing and expressing your feelings so freely. The letter arrived in the afternoon and the men with the horse about sunset.

You will not lose your correspondent by remembering our communications will not be as frequent. It seemed this morning as if I must write as the men were returning to H. I could hardly realize that you were not there, but suppose you are in the midst of friends at Honolulu. You will find the Spirit of the Lord there too, I hope in still greater power than you have seen in H. So there will be a great work there and not only there but all over the island. It has been my opinion for some time past that the Lord is appearing to shake this nation that a work of grace mighty and powerful will be witnessed in all these islands.
