This has been an interesting day. A full house of (apparently) attention occurs. More than 100 were examined yesterday. Eight of our boys among the number.

There has been three deaths since you left. Kielei - Honolulu & a man at Kihua. Surely the Lord is dealing with our people in a peculiar manner & we are ~~often~~ admonished to be up & doing - to work while the day lasts.

Henry has had an attack of his old complaint, but is better now. He talks much about Wilcox - sometimes he sits the chairs at the table for you & asks for the bell to ring for you to come over.

And then again he says "Schoone -  
& Wilcox Honolulu." He does not fully under-  
stand that you are gone.

Frederick has got two teeth since you left,  
& has cried a good deal about it too.

We have not heard from Waimoa since  
you left. — Long to hear from Honolulu.

Expect to hear that many mighty works are  
done there. Do tell us all you can that is  
cheering & don't forget to pray for us. Indeed

I know you will not. Some body wraps so  
I must close. — Mr L. is out to prayers — has  
written a hearty line I believe.
