

Hamilton May 7<sup>th</sup> 1860

Dear Husband

We got home on Sat. A.M.  
I & Clucke becalmed and head winds all the way, but I have not been so uncomfortable on a passage for years too, I suffered several sicknesses of course, when she gets a new cabin I think she will be a first-rate weather. Sammy kept on the deck, and took his meals regularly after the first night out. The Capt. had what you call a first-rate table. All that I eat was a little tea and steamed apples. I did not hear or write or say had word, Sammy went <sup>up</sup> to the Dep. and Mr. Cooke came very soon for me. At last in the mean time came down and came on board. We are Mr. & Mrs. Sturtevant guests for G.M. Mr. Cooke says she is very glad that I came before heard and that I must stop a few days and make her a visit, that she expected to hear us until a short time ago they heard that Mr. Cooke could not go up stairs and that Mr. Sturtevant had asked for our family at G.M. time. The Sturtevants have not come to claim me yet when they do I shall go.

Mrs. Chamberlain and the St. Alexanders have come. I have not seen Mr. E. Mr. Glaswell has resigned and about a dozen of the Punahou boys are wishing to go off with him on some afternoon. I have not had any chance to talk with G. or E. about their going they came to see Mr. on Sat. eve. I feel very anxious that we in some way make



make an effort for the book to go  
together but none of this matter by and by  
Mrs St. Alexander says they have felt it do not

He has not been ever attacked of asthma  
since he has been in the country

health since I commenced this letter  
Mrs Partridge and Mrs Easton has called to see

tomorrow, Mr C. B. Andrews has resigned his

I feel anxious about the baby & have not for-  
gotten him long at a time since I left  
home, you are inquired for by one and  
another I rather think that Mr Easton has the  
feeling that you ought to come up  
I hope Sutton is a good boy and keeps a  
close watch over the baby do not allow  
a tub of water to stand at the back  
door, (I mean this I mean to show to  
you & do not tell this to Sutton to dispose

no occasion to find fault -  
I intended to have got Charles's letter  
w<sup>h</sup> need it and sent it on to you.  
I am to you all, I hope healy will not  
forget to call say My Mama
