

Kilo March 2: 1838

My dear Sister W.

We are very happy at having an opportunity to send directly to you - should have been happier still had the vessel brought us lettered directly from you. I feel no ordinary degree of solicitude to hear from you. If you have been prospered, the distresses of the voyage are past and perhaps forgotten in the kind and timely attention which you are doubtless receiving. The warm reception we received on our first arrival at these Islands, and the kindness we have since experienced from many members of the mission have made a deep impression on my mind and have made me feel more like being in the circle of my own brothers and sisters than I ever expected to feel, when I bade them farewell. I trust you will find it so.

You will receive other letters from this station by this opportunity as I need not write you at length. - The school is large - Heads so thick that I have counted them but once since you left. There were that ^{day} over 250. A. I suppose is not far from the average number. I have managed so as to be in every day as yet, but

cannot do as well by them as you & B. do. "Two
are better than one". I dare say you will find
the school noisier on your return than when you
left. It is noisy enough now, any how, but it
is pleasant to be able to say that there is very lit-
tle contention or apparent evil design among the
schools. The noise is like that of a large
Sabbath-school, where a great many are reciting
at once. When I address the children collectively
there is entire stillness. It was just so once.
Surely the Lord has done a great work a-
mong the children here, of all their deportment
in school is one evidence.

Kelelei died this morning after you left. Kono-
lio also is dead, and Mr Coe is now attending
the funeral of that woman whom he brought in
and laid on our dining-room floor in a fit the
day you left.

The work of God goes on among us. Last
night the people were in as usual to be talked to.
Mr Coe talked to them on the subject of deception.
At length a Hosikaika was called on to pray.
He began by confessing his own sins and the
sins of others in trying to deceive their teachers
themselves and God. He had not proceeded far
before he began to tremble. His power of articula-
tion failed. I stepped to the window and looked into the

room. He stood trembling violently making a deep groaning noise. At length he fell prostrate, and in a few minutes was carried out of the house.

We are constantly proclaiming "what hath God wrought" for we believe that it is God's hand that is at work and not the devil's. Satan will see his tares as he always has done and they will grow with the wheat until the last harvest. Some of the brethren tell us what we may expect the days of palaka come on. We know what we may expect - Dreadful defections - trouble in the ch. darkness in our own souls - decrease of evidence that we are ourselves converted. Can we then forever permit days of palaka to return. Neither the ~~the~~ Father, the Son or the Holy Spirit, the angels or the glorified saints wish for any return of days of palaka. Why then need we calculate upon them. Why ~~say~~ wait for days of palaka, to test the sincerity of those who appear well while under the influence of eternal things.

I must close. We are in usual health - Mr C- sets off for Dilo in two or three days, to hold Protracted meetings. You will keep him by your prayers if the heat of his tour is season.

Pohans and Namoker are married ~~and~~ and are with us. This you know was the first proposition. We endeavored to use no influence in the matter, but to have them act freely, and I think they have done so. They say so at any rate.

Though it was all settled once for Pohane to go Makai.
You will embrace the first opportunity to write.
