

Hilo Nov. 18, 1830.

Dear Bro. Wilcox,

Yours of Sept. 18.  
was received 2 days since. We had  
not heard from you for a long time.  
Had not previously heard of the  
advent of master W. L.

Really we should be  
nearer Boston & New York, so far  
as letters are concerned, if we had  
a general postoffice, so that the  
mail from the coast could be  
opened at this place, then made  
to Kauai.

We have heard in various  
ways that ~~apparently~~ the eldest two  
of your sons were at Punahoa. Henry  
& Frederic went down the first oppor-  
tunity. They were 1 month behind the  
time. They went via Hau, Kona, & Lahaina.  
Had they waited for a direct opportunity  
they would have been a week or two later  
than they were.

We had a pleasant visit of  
2 weeks, perhaps, from Mr. Bond the  
latter part of Sept. I presume you have

heard from him since he left here. He had some articles which he designed to send you from Honolulu. I have heard that he finally sailed from Maui for the States without touching at Oahu.

I think the law in reference to natives leaving the islands may be beneficial to them if properly administered. But I marvelled that any man should put such reasons for the law & expect them to be swallowed by the legislature. And what is still more marvelous is, that the legislature should have swallowed it all. perhaps they passed it after a hearty meal. Surely it could not have passed had there been one wakeful Hawaiian among them. But I do not intend to trouble myself with those things in the government over which the mission have no control & care in regard to which, at best, we can have little or no direct influence. If we do our duty in our own appropriate sphere, the Lord will overrule all things for the advancement of his kingdom.

You speak of going to the U.S. with Albee. We have not heard

whether you have come to a decision in  
reference to it. If you go this fall, I  
presume you will leave we may  
weeks more elapse. What is best in  
the case you & those acquainted with  
such things can judge better than I.  
Whatever course you may adopt in  
reference to it, yourself & family will  
share in our sympathy & our  
most cordial wishes for the suc-  
cess of the undertaking.

If you go, please present  
my best regards to your parents,  
brothers, & sisters, & their families,  
as well as to all my friends who  
enquire.

Our health is about as  
usual, though Mrs. L's has not been  
quite as good the last 3 or 4 months as  
it sometimes is. Mrs. Coan has been  
pretty much laid aside for a week or  
more. He purposed to leave day after  
to-morrow on the tour of China to  
be absent 13 days. Dr. & Mrs. Wetmore,  
& H. Coan have been absent 4 weeks  
on a professional visit to Rau. They  
will probably be absent some 2 or 3  
weeks more.
