

Hawaii Dec. 9th 1857

Dear Sister,

I received your note of the
20th last Friday and this week on
Tuesday I believe, the other. As we
shall send on Monday I had time to
write a few lines. You mentioned
in your first that you were keeping
house are you in a house by your
self or with one of the brethren?
The phenomenon of the sea you men-
tioned was witnessed at Kawaihau
and also at Honolulu but I be-
lieve no one was injured at these
places. I was rejoiced to hear
that the Lord is reviving his
work at Hilo and my prayer
is that it may spread and ex-

tend all over the field and over
islands. It is indeed refreshing to
see such scenes and hear such
things as we are permitted to in
this land of darkness. The work
is still going on among us. B. L. re-
turned from H. the day I wrote
you last. He said it was the most
interesting tour he had ever per-
formed. The Spirit accompanied
his labors. Since his return he has
spent several days in conversing
with people from all parts of H.
and also from Kawaiihae and
he on the shore. Yesterday he was
conversing with the people of the
mea but did not finish. He pre-
viously had the names of 240 in 50
which he considers as converts.

for the church and he found
about 80 yesterday who thought
were converted. 18 were received
into the church last Sabbath
having been pronounced some
time previously. The people could
not all get into the house at
the Sabbath and it was very
much crowded. I should think
there were about 300 at the fe-
male prayer meeting on Satur-
day. I wanted the power of ut-
terance to speak to them freely,
but could not say a great deal
to them, I am encouraged how-
ever as I can perceive that I
am learning. It is rather try-
ing to be where there is so much
to do and not be able to do it.

With regards to the health, Dr. J. said I was doing well as
far as the lungs, but you can see how busy I am that
is concerned for you and me and I had heard of you.

Mon. morn. Yesterday the meeting house
was crowded and some of the church pro-
posed to hold a meeting at another place,
with those who could not get in, which
they did. B.S. commenced pronouncing
the candidates for admission to the church
but in account of the number only a part
of the names were read. \$10 in all. Do let
me know how the work is going on among
you please. Let us be made abundant in prayer
with carefulness. Your sister
