Raihua Sept. 21<sup>st</sup> 1837

My dear Sister, Your note just came to hand with other communications from N. & when I tell you that it comes about three o'clock P.M. that previously I had not set up my today, except occasionally to peep into the cook room, & that hour I am writing - you will think that it did me good - & that is a just conclusion - Altho. I have not written before, yet be assured my sympathy has been as copious as if I had. I do sympathize with thee in distress, & make it in my power, would allay your pain, & administer to you what I but this is not practicable - I can only commit you to Him who knows & felt you suffer & what you need. Do not be discouraged but by good comfort. If you cannot accomplish for the natives by actual effort all you would, pray the more & you will be helped. I am satisfied that to press forward, & go beyond the bounds of prudence is not only injudicious, but set in accordance with duty. I am well aware that this is contrary to nature. We all of us love ease, yet that there is necessity for caution on the part of the people Missionaries in a debilitatory climate, until the constitution becomes adapted to the change, I am fully persuaded. It is the voice of reason. Mrs. Van Duzee when I was on my way home was doing a great deal. I think every hour of the day was crowded with Lecture labors - Not long since

she and her husband were here. Then she had relinquished her daily school. Her health is delicate, & probably will be for some time to come. You ask me how I like housekeeping? Of course it is pleasant to have a place that I can call home. I feel that I am not in any sense of the word a wanderer. It is pleasant to offer the morning and evening sacrifice upon our own altar, we commenced housekeeping two weeks ago, but are not yet settled. Patients are numerous. Our medical case is the window seats & the floor, altho' we have had a carpenter ever since we have been here. My domestics are freshmen in kitchen affairs, as well as my self. We are studying Hawaiian with Thomas Hopper daily, & twice a week spend over eve, with Mr. Thurston for the same purpose. Mr. D. children take lessons in drawing daily from 4 to 5 PM at our house. They are about commencing Chemistry with us. The case of their education that would otherwise devolve upon their Mother, she is going to convert to the benefit of the nation in School. Will commence next week, as soon as I get a little confidence in my self relative to the language, I intend to take all kinds of girls select them from the different schools.

We are very much rejoiced to meet Mr. Be. & his family again! They staid two days. I think you must have been more surprised than ever we were, upon their arrival. Mrs. Costa seems quite well, I told you that I was not well but said so now. Yesterday I was attacked with a most distressing headache which turned in suddenly, & quite subdued me. Today I was obliged to服take medicine which together with letters I think is going to restore me.

With regard to pecuniary pressure I feel  
much for Hts, on account of the School  
Mr. Lyman it seems is strong but his  
heat is not diminishing in size, in these  
days. I hope all who can, will follow his  
example. I do not yet know what will  
be done this side of the Isd. In this village  
just as the Gen. letter reached us, one of the  
principle schoolhouses took a leak to capsize  
& the people are just commencing an effort  
to build a stone one in its place. The Teachers  
here are holding a meeting in reference to their  
own affairs & have come to the conclusion that  
unless remuneration comes from some source they  
shall discontinue their labors at the next  
examination. What the result will be we cannot  
tell. The medical Department it seems  
to sustain itself or not be sustained. a  
These are dark times but I trust it will be  
day before long. Light will break in from  
some quarter. We will not be disheartened  
but take courage & go on, trusting in Him  
under whose banner we are enlisted.

The pumpkins all arrived in safety.  
They look nobly. Have you had any pump-  
kin pie? May I let it stand do you good.  
I sent it & I would prescribe a pill of patina  
three times a day, & a tablespoonful of good  
<sup>not whisky</sup> spirits ~~Champagne~~ once in two hours.

Hoping to hear from you often, & wishing  
an affectionate remembrance to your husband & all  
at the station
