Dear Sir: Milcox;

Your note  
of the 14<sup>th</sup> inst. is before  
me. The deed for the  
land in Lapele is  
ready, & Mr. Cattle (who  
has just been in my  
office) says he will  
lend down the money,  
as soon as he can  
attend to it. Then  
the deed will be sent  
to you.

No action has as yet

been taken on your  
husband's application for  
the land in Waiohi; &  
the govt. will not sell  
the mision pasture  
without Mr. Johnson's  
approval. The mauka  
part might be sold,  
& you had better send  
up Mr. Pease opinion  
of its value per acre.  
The govt. is rather reluc-  
tant however to sell  
any more land in  
Waiohi, as it has  
but little there.

My family is well.  
We are lovely, as we expec-  
-ted to be, but God has  
been very gracious to us  
in keeping us all in  
good health.

If the question of wives  
leaving their husbands to  
visit America should  
come up before Genl.  
Meeting, I shall vote  
against allowing any  
more such doing here  
-after. I don't like it.  
It is not fair, & ought  
to be effectually stopped.  
What do you think?  
You will say vice versa.
